In just a few weeks, our Archdiocese will be hosting **Robert Falzon** for a series of talks and events around the topic of fathering in today's world. We believe that this is a timely topic to explore especially as Pope Francis has dedicated this year under the patronage of Saint Joseph.

Robert Falzon is a husband, father, businessman, published author and co-founder of menALIVE. He has been awarded many business accolades including: *Australian Marketing Institute* Marketer of the Year; *Telstra* QLD Small Business of the Year; *Australian Institute of Management* Owner Manager of the Year; and *Ernst and Young* Entrepreneur of the Year Finalist.

In 2007, Robert sold his primary manufacturing business to focus in a full-time volunteer capacity on working with men through menALIVE - a National Catholic Ministry to Men. Since the founding of menALIVE in 2003, this work has delivered 450 events across 26 dioceses (ours included) and numerous schools in Australia and NZ reaching more than 30,000 men.

In 2011 Robert had his first book published. With more than 4000 copies of "How to Grow a Men's Ministry" in many men's hands and in Australia, this has become a very useful resource. His second book was co-authored with Dr Peter O'Shea – "The Father

Factor" which was published in 2014. In this book the authors studied the scientific research around the impact of Fathers on families, children, and society. Robert's third and current book was released in late 2020. "Raising Fathers" subtitled "Fathering from the frontline – 12 men's stories". In this book Robert invites 12 men to tell their stories of being fathered and their experience of fathering. The stories are powerfully important, impacting, informative and instructional.

On Tuesday 2 March 2021, Robert will be unpacking the stories and themes of his latest book at a special evening event (5:30pm-7:00pm) in the Haydon Hall (Ground Floor, St Christopher's Pastoral Centre) behind the Cathedral. Jesus was Tempted by Satan, and the Angels Looked After Him

"..It is written, "One does not live by bread alone, but by every word that comes from the mouth of God."

The primary purpose of Lent is spiritual preparation for the celebration of Jesus' death on Good Friday and his resurrection on Easter Sunday. The Church tries to achieve this goal by leading her children to "repentance," a type of conversion. Repentance leads us to reorder our priorities and change our values, ideals and ambitions, with the help of fasting, prayer and mortification. Hence, the Church ordains fasting and abstaining on assigned days of Lent. All Lenten observances are also intended to lead us to our annual solemn renewal of baptismal vows on Holy Saturday. Through baptism we are called to live justly, to love God with all our being, to love our neighbour as ourselves, and to build the kingdom of God by our acts of charity. That is why the three readings chosen for today refer to baptism directly or indirectly.



The Spirit drew Jesus out into the wilderness and he remained there for forty days, and was tempted by Satan.

The first reading describes how Noah's family was saved from the waters of the deluge by God's special providence and how God made His first 'friendship covenant' with mankind. Noah's rescue from the flood symbolises how we are saved through the water of baptism which cleanses us of sin and makes us one with Christ. Today's psalm is an exquisite penitential prayer humbly acknowledging human insufficiency and our radical dependence upon God and His mercy and forgiveness. The psalmist lists some of the characteristics of the life resulting from this repentance: truth, compassion, love, kindness, goodness, uprightness, humility and justice. In the second reading Peter shows us how Noah's episode prefigured baptism. In the gospel, we are told how Jesus, immediately after His baptism, faced and defeated the tempter, prepared by His forty days of prayer and penance in the desert.

Entrance Antiphon: When he calls on me, I will answer him; I will deliver him and give him glory, I will grant him length of days.

Communion Antiphon: One does not live by bread alone, but by every word that comes forth from the mouth of God.

Prayer for Australia: Lord you place deep in our hearts the love of Mary Help of Christians. Through her prayers grant wisdom to our leaders and integrity to our citizens. Under her protection may Australia be granted harmony, justice and peace. We ask this through our Lord Jesus Christ your Son who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God for ever and ever. Amen.

Prayer after Communion: Lord, we thank you for coming into our hearts in Communion. We believe you are truly present in the Blessed Sacrament. You are our life and our hope. Draw us more deeply to yourself and transform our hearts through your abiding love. May we come to know Sunday as a special day of faith, the day of our Risen Lord. May our celebration of the Eucharist on Sunday consecrate this day to you.

O Sacrament Most Holy, O Sacrament Divine, All Praise and All Thanksgiving be every moment thine.

Christ himself, innocent though he was, died once for sins, died for the guilty, to lead us to God. In the

body he was put to death, in the spirit he was raised to life, and, in the spirit, he went to preach to the spirits in prison. Now it was long ago, when Noah was still building that ark which saved only a small group of eight people 'by water', and when God was still waiting patiently, that these spirits refused to believe. That water is a type of the baptism which saves you now, and which is not the washing off of physical dirt but a pledge made to God from a good conscience, through the resurrection of Jesus Christ, who has entered heaven and is at God's right hand, now that he has made the angels and Dominations and Powers his subjects.

"...7. Because of the importance of the word of God, the Church invites us to pay special attention to the ambo from which it is proclaimed. It is not a functional piece of furniture, but a place that is in keeping with the dignity of the word of God, in correspondence with the altar: in fact, we speak of the table of

God's word and the table of the Body of Christ, referring both to the ambo and especially to the altar. The ambo is reserved for the readings, the singing of the Responsorial Psalm and the Easter Proclamation (Exsultet); the homily and the intentions of the universal prayer can be delivered from it, while it is less appropriate to use it for commentaries, announcements or for direct singing. 8. The books containing the readings from Sacred Scripture stir up in those who hear a veneration for the mystery of God speaking to his people. For this reason, we ask that care be taken to ensure that these books are of a high quality and used properly. It is never appropriate to resort to leaflets, photocopies and other pastoral aids as a substitute for liturgical books." (Page 2 Document regarding the Sunday of the Word of God)
