ASH WEDNESDAY MASSES: Ashes will be distributed at the 9:15am and 5pm Masses on Wednesday, 14 February. Lent is a penitential season of prayer, self-denial and helping others. In this way, the whole Church prepares for Easter with those who are to be baptised. Other celebrations in Lent (eg, marriage) must take into account the spirit of penance: musical instruments are only used to sustain singing and floral decorations are very simple.



- Ash Wednesday is a Holy day of Obligation; and
- The Law of fasting binds those who have completed their eighteenth year, until the beginning of their sixtieth year (CCL 97, 1251-52).

PARISH FINANCE STATUS ENDING 2023

There's both bad news and not so bad news relating to Moruya Parish finances for the year 2023.


We budgeted for a deficit of \$17,370 after shaving off every bit of possible fat from our static expenses and came home with a total deficit of \$19,508 just \$2,138 over budget.

This compared to budget over-runs of up to \$30,000 over recent years. Included in the not so bad news is an income increase of \$1,012 over the projected budget. Most appropriations were within single dollars of their estimates with the major blowout being our insurances which went up from the previous year by \$7,072. This was due to the disbandonment of the Catholic Insurance Company following a large number of major payouts.

The bad news is that once again we've been forced into covering the \$19,508 deficit out of our dwindling cash reserve which should be conserved for emergency maintenance, and which has now become quite vulnerable due to deficit over-runs of recent years. The bottom line is, that for our Parish to survive, we must find a way to generate more income. We can't keep asking our limited and already extended congregation to keep digging deeper into their shrinking pockets although increased contributions would greatly alleviate the shortage.

So if anyone can come up with any ideas please let Fr. George or myself know. I have an adage, "There's no such thing as a bad idea, some are just better than others."

Jesus heals a leper

Jesus "stretched out his hand and touched him"

The liturgy of the word this Sunday contains the Christian teaching on the need for social acceptance even when people are different from us. The **readings** today tell us that it is purity or holiness of a soul coming from God that cleanses our lives. The **first reading** teaches the theme of freedom from bodily and ritual impurity as a sign of internal holiness. This freedom is symbolised by the precautions against contracting leprosy given in the first reading and the healing of the leper described in the **gospel**.

The **first reading** shows the ancient Jewish attitude towards leprosy and the rules for quarantining lepers. This provides a background for Jesus' healing of a leper.

In today's **Responsorial Psalm**, the psalmist exhorts us to rejoice in the Lord because He purifies us from our sins "I confessed my faults to the Lord, and you took away guilt". The **psalm** serves as a mini-treatise on reconciliation, covering the meaning of the spiritual leprosy of sin and showing how we are forgiven by a sacramental encounter with God. "I turn to you, Lord, in times of trouble and you fill me with the joy of salvation". In today's **epistle**, St Paul strongly encourages us to testify to our healing from the leprosy of sin by living changed lives, expressed in our doing "everything for the glory of God" and for the salvation of others. Today's **gospel** describes how Jesus heals a leper liberating him both from the disease of leprosy and from the unjust and inhuman social isolation and ostracism to which the lepers were subjected.

Entrance Antiphon: Be my protector, O God, a mighty stronghold to save me. For you are my rock, my stronghold! Lead me, guide me, for the sake of your name.

Communion Antiphon: God so loved the world, that he gave his Only Begotten Son, so that all who believe in him may not perish, but may have eternal life.

Prayer after Communion: Lord, we thank you for coming into our hearts in Communion. We believe you are truly present in the Blessed Sacrament. You are our life and our hope. Draw us more deeply to yourself and transform our hearts through your abiding love. May we come to know Sunday as a special day of faith, the day of our Risen Lord. May our celebration of the Eucharist on Sunday consecrate this day to you.

O Sacrament Most Holy, O Sacrament Divine, All Praise and All Thanksgiving be every moment thine.



The man went away, but then started talking about it freely and telling the story everywhere, so that Jesus could no longer go openly into any town, but had to stay outside in places where nobody lived. Even so, people from all around would come to him.

THE WORD AND LIFE this week ...

These include homosexuals, alcoholics, drug addicts and other marginalised groups including single mothers, migrant workers and the mentally ill. God's loving hand must reach out to them through us. Jesus wants us to touch their lives. Let us re-examine the barriers we have created and approach God with a heart that is ready to welcome the outcasts in our society.

St Valentine, officially known as St Valentine of Rome, is a thirdcentury Roman Saint widely celebrated on 4 February and commonly associated with "courtly love". Although not much of St Valentine's life is reliably known, and whether or not the stories involve two different saints by the same name, is also not official, it is highly agreed that St Valentine was martyred and then buried on the Via Flaminia to the north of Rome. In 1969 the Roman Catholic Church removed St Valentine from the General Roman Calendar because so little is known about him. However, the Church still recognises him as a Saint, listing him in the 14 February spot of Roman Martyrology. St Valentine is the Patron Saint of lovers, epileptics and beekeepers.
