## **God's Commandments or Human Traditions?**

## "This people pays me lip-service but their hearts are far from me"

True religion does not consist in scrupulously performing certain rituals and saying empty words for prayers. The essence of true religion is loving God, recognising His presence in our neighbours and doing them loving service. True religion lies in loving our neighbours as ourselves and not simply in keeping the laws and traditions in the Bible and in the Church.

The **first reading** points out the characteristics of true religion as a) God's closeness to His people and the intimacy of people with their God and b) the pursuit of God's justice in society. The observance of the Law was considered a sign of commitment and obedience to God, enabling the Israelites to lead lives better



than their 'pagan' neighbours. In the **second reading**, James defines true religion as translating the love of God into action by putting into practice the spiritual and corporal works of mercy, thus doing deeds of loving kindness for the vulnerable and needy members of the community. In other words, people of true religion glorify God by caring for those who are unable to care for themselves.

In today's gospel lesson our attention is drawn to a debate between Jesus and the Pharisees on the subject of "Tradition". Jesus warns them against the tendency to equate traditional "human precepts" with God's will. He blames the scribes and the Pharisees for giving undue importance to external observances in the name of "tradition", while ignoring the Law's real spirit. True religion should focus on the essentials. In particular, Jesus criticises Pharisaic observance of ritual washing and declares that it is our inner motivations and dispositions that reflect our purity or impurity.

Prayer for Australia: Lord you place deep in our hearts the love of Mary Help of Christians. Through her prayers grant wisdom to our leaders and integrity to our citizens. Under her protection may Australia be granted harmony, justice and peace. We ask this through our Lord Jesus Christ your Son who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God for ever and ever, Amen.

A reading from the book of Deuteronomy

Moses said to the people: 'Now, Israel, take notice of the laws and customs that I teach you today, and observe them, that you may have life and may enter and take possession of the land that the Lord the God of your fathers is giving you. You must add nothing to what I command you, and take nothing from it, but keep the commandments of the Lord your God just as I lay them down for you. Keep them, observe them, and they will demonstrate to the peoples your wisdom and understanding. And indeed, what great nation is there that has its gods so near as the Lord our God is to us whenever we call to him? And what great nation is there that has laws and customs to match this whole Law that I put before you today?'

### Gospel Mk 7:1-8. 14-15. 21-23

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark

#### All: Glory to you O Lord

The Pharisees and some of the scribes who had come from Jerusalem gathered round Jesus, and they noticed that some of his disciples were eating with unclean hands, that is, without washing them. For the Pharisees, and the Jews in general, follow the tradition of the elders and never eat without washing their arms as far as the elbow; and on returning from the market place they never eat without first sprinkling themselves. There are also many other observances which have been handed down to them concerning the washing of cups and pots and bronze dishes. So these Pharisees and scribes asked him, 'Why do your disciples not respect the tradition of the elders but eat their food with unclean hands?' He answered, 'It was of you hypocrites that Isaiah so rightly prophesied in this passage of scripture:

This people honours me only with lip-service, while their hearts are far from me.

The worship they offer me is worthless, the doctrines they teach are only human regulations

You put aside the commandment of God to cling to human traditions.'

He called the people to him again and said, 'Listen to me, all of you, and understand. Nothing that goes into a man from outside can make him unclean; it is the things that come out of a man that make him unclean. For it is from within, from men's hearts, that evil intentions emerge: fornication, theft, murder, adultery, avarice, malice, deceit, indecency, envy, slander, pride, folly. All these evil things come from within and make a man unclean.'

## THE WORD AND LIFE ... this week

- 1) We need to keep the spirit of the Church's laws and practices. For example, our Sunday obligation is intended to encourage us to worship God in the parish community, to offer our lives to God, to ask his pardon for our sins, to thank God for His blessings, to present our needs before Him and to receive divine life and strength from Him by receiving Holy Communion. Our daily prayers are meant to thank God for his blessings, to present the family's needs before God, to ask pardon for all our sins, and to maintain the spirit of unity and love in the family.
- 2) Let us avoid the tendency to become cafeteria Christians: As the Pharisees did we too show the tendency to add to or subtract from God's laws given in the Bible and taught by the Church. Some of us pick and choose certain commandments to follow, ignoring the others as we do in a cafeteria. For example some actively do corporal and spiritual works of charity, but avoid Sunday Mass and remain unfaithful to their obligations attached to the gift of their sexuality or the sacrament of marriage. Others are interested in fulfilling only the "minimal obligations" of the faith. They come to Mass late and leave early. They make an effort to avoid serious sins, but do not go to confession even when they fall into mortal sins.
- 3) Let us accept the challenge to become listeners and doers of God's word as St James instructs us: Let us ask the question how the Sunday or daily readings are affecting or changing our lives to discover whether we are being attentive listeners to, and doers of God's word. We become more fully Jesus' family members, only when we consistently "hear the word of God and do it" (Lk 8:21). When we receive Jesus in Holy Communion today let us ask him for the grace to become the doers of his word as he was the doer of his Fathers' will.

Archbishop's Office 24<sup>th</sup> August 2021

Dear Fathers, Deacons, Pastoral Leaders and Mr Ross Fox, I have mentioned to you before that a grass roots pastoral initiative in our parishes is growing re Caring for Creation.

Some of our parishioners have been enthused by the encyclical of Pope Francis: Laudato Si (2015). They are now seeking further engagement with our parishes in bringing forward some of the vision of the encyclical into practical reality. It has my support and prayers.

Recently, I led a liturgy on the grounds of St Peter Chanel's Yarralumla (21 May 2021) to celebrate the fifth anniversary of Laudato Si. The Aboriginal community joined us, along with a good variety of age groups from the Archdiocese. We planted a tree to symbolise the launch of this Caring for Creation initiative in the Archdiocese.

The Caring Groups are offering to help people be connected by pairing up those who are willing to contact others during lockdown.
