"The eyes of the blind shall be opened and the ears of the deaf unstopped"

The central theme of today's readings is an invitation to us to become humble instruments of healing in Jesus' hands by giving voice to the voiceless and caring love to the needy and the marginalised in our society. The readings also invite us to open our ears to hear the word of God and to let our tongues be loosened by the Holy Spirit to convey the good news of God's love and salvation to others.

The first reading (Is 35:4-7) reminds us that God's eyes are constantly focussed on the God especially cares for the helpless. "frightened, the blind, the deaf, the lame, the mute", and He encourages the powerless to "be strong and fearless". This is why, in today's second reading (James 2:1-5), the apostle gives us some basic and challenging principles of social justice. He exhorts Christians to show no partiality based on external appearance and to practice God's "preferential option" for the poor. He warns the faithful against scorning or hsaming the poor whole showing special consideration to the rich. Today's psalm sings of a God who give sight to



the blind, raises up those who are bowed down and welcomers strangers. **Today's gospel** describes how Jesus, by healing a deaf and mute man, fulfilled Isaiah's Messianic prophecy, "The eyes of the blind shall be opened and the ears of the deaf unstopped". The ailments listed by Isaiah are symbolic of our interior illnesses: blindness to the needs of our neighbour, unwillingness to hear God's voice and the inability to speak words of praise and gratitude. Through this miracle story, Mark also reminds us that no one can be a follower or the Lord without reaching out to the helpless ("preferential option for the poor").

Prayer for Australia: Lord you place deep in our hearts the love of Mary Help of Christians. Through her prayers grant wisdom to our leaders and integrity to our citizens. Under her protection may Australia be granted harmony, justice and peace. We ask this through our Lord Jesus Christ your Son who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God for ever and ever, Amen.

My brothers, do not try to combine faith in Jesus Christ, our glorified Lord, with the making of distinctions between classes of people. Now suppose a man comes into your synagogue, beautifully dressed and with a gold ring on, and at the same time a poor man comes in, in shabby clothes, and you take notice of the well-dressed man, and say, 'Come this way to the best seats'; then you tell the poor man, 'Stand over there' or 'You can sit on the floor by my foot-rest.' Can't you see that you have used two different standards in your mind, and turned yourselves into judges, and corrupt judges at that?

Listen, my dear brothers: it was those who are poor according to the world that God chose, to be rich in

faith and to be the heirs to the kingdom which he promised to those who love him.

Gospel Mk 7:31-37

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark

Returning from the district of Tyre, Jesus went by way of Sidon towards the sea of Galilee, right through the Decapolis region. And they brought him a deaf man who had an impediment in his speech; and they asked him to lay his hand on him. He took him aside in private, away from the crowd, put his fingers into the man's ears and touched his tongue with spittle. Then looking up to heaven he sighed; and he said to him, 'Ephphatha,' that is, 'Be opened.' And his ears were opened, and the ligament of his tongue was loosened and he spoke clearly. And Jesus ordered them to tell no one about it, but the more he insisted, the more widely they published it. Their admiration was unbounded. 'He has done all things well,' they said 'he makes the deaf hear and the dumb speak.'

THE WORD AND LIFE ... this week

Life messages: 1) We need to help Jesus to heal the deaf and the mute today. Jesus desires to give us his healing touch in order to loosen our tongues so that he may speak to the spiritually hungry through us. He invites us to give him our hearts so that he may touch the lives of people in our day through us, just as he touched the lives of millions through saintly souls like Francis of Assisi, Vincent de Paul and the Blessed Mother Teresa. Jesus' compassionate touch will help us to hear the cries of the poor and the sick. It will teach us to show kindness, mercy and consideration to others. His healing touch will also help us convey peace and hope to those around us.

2) We need to allow Jesus to heal our spiritual deafness and muteness. We may find it hard to speak to God in prayer and harder still to hear Him speaking to us through the Bible and through the Church. Hence, let us imitate the dumb man in the gospel by seeking out Jesus, following him away from the crowd, and spending more of our time in coming to know him intimately as we study Holy Scripture and experience him directly in our lives in personal prayer.

'It's the little things that mean a lot'

1) <u>The Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary, 8 September</u>: This feast originated in Jerusalem around the late fifth century, near a site venerated as Mary's birthplace (the Church of St Anne). The Liturgy invites us to rejoice, for the birth of Mary means that the birth of Jesus, our Saviour, is coming near. Mary's birth prepared for the mystery of the redemption. 'When the fullness of time at last arrives, Mary comes into the world as the dawn of the New Covenant'.

2) <u>The Exaltation of the Holy Cross, 14 September</u>: The bronze serpent on a standard is a well known symbol of the medical profession. Its origins go back to the time when God healed the repentant Israelites in the wilderness through a bronze serpent that Moses fashioned and placed on a standard. In the Gospel, Jesus applies this image to his own crucifixion. By being lifted up on the cross he will bring healing and eternal life to all who believe in him.

3) <u>**Our Lady of Sorrows, 15 September**</u>: The Gospels testify to the fulfillment of Simeon's prophecy to Mary that 'a sword will pierce your own heart' (Lk 2:35). With a mother's love, she accompanied her son through his passion, crucifixion and death: 'At the cross her station keeping, stood the mournful mother weeping, close to Jesus to the last.' The 'Seven Sorrows' of Mary includes the moments when his body was taken down from the cross and when he was buried.
