Jesus appreciates the widow's mite

God measures us on the basis of our inner motives and intentions hidden behind our actions

Today's readings invite us to make a total commitment to God's service with a humble and generous heart free from pride and prejudice.

The first reading and the gospel today present poor widows who sacrificially gave their whole lives and means of livelihood to God, symbolising the supreme sacrifice Jesus would offer by giving his life for others. In the reading from the First Book of Kings, a poor widow, who had barely enough food for herself and her son, welcomed the prophet Elijah as a man of God, shared her food with him and received her reward in the form of a non-stop supply of food during the famine.

Today's psalm is the first in the final group of Hallel psalms. Here the psalmist praises God for His loving-kindness toward the needy, including widows.

In the gospel, Jesus contrasts the external signs of honour sought by the scribes with the humble, sacrificial offering made by a poor widow and declares that she has found true honour in God's eyes. The poor widows in both the first reading and the gospel gave away all that they possessed for the glory of God. Here Jesus contrasts the scribes, who carefully cultivated their reputation for holiness while hiding dishonest and profitable dealings, with a poor widow, who really was holy, a positive model of humble generosity and the true religious spirit. In contrast to the external signs of honour sought by the scribes, the widow found true honour in God's eyes. The second reading tells us how Jesus, as the High Priest of the New Testament, surrendered his life to God his Father totally and unconditionally, as a sacrificial offering for our sins—a sacrifice far beyond the sacrifices made by the poor widows.



Prayer after Communion: Lord, we thank you for coming into our hearts in Communion. We believe you are truly present in the Blessed Sacrament. You are our life and our hope. Draw us more deeply to yourself and transform our hearts through your abiding love. May we come to know Sunday as a special day of faith, the day of our Risen Lord. May our celebration of the Eucharist on Sunday consecrate this day to you.

O Sacrament Most Holy, O Sacrament Divine, All Praise and All Thanksgiving be every moment thine.

Liturgy of the Word

First Reading 1 Kgs 17:10-16

A reading from the first book of the Kings

Elijah the Prophet went off to Sidon. And when he reached the city gate, there was a widow gathering sticks; addressing her he said, 'Please bring a little water in a vessel for me to drink.' She was setting off to bring it when he called after her. 'Please' he said, 'bring me a scrap of bread in your hand.' 'As the Lord your God lives', she replied, 'I have no baked bread, but only a handful of meal in a jar and a little oil in a jug; I am just gathering a stick or two to go and prepare this for myself and my son to eat, and then we shall die.' But Elijah said to her, 'Do not be afraid, go and do as you have said; but first make a little scone of it for me and bring it to me, and then make some for yourself and for your son. For thus the Lord speaks, the God of Israel:

"Jar of meal shall not be spent,
jug of oil shall not be emptied,
before the day when the Lord sends
rain on the face of the earth."

The woman went and did as Elijah told her and they ate the food, she, himself and her son. The jar of meal was not spent nor the jug of oil emptied, just as the Lord had foretold through Elijah.

A reading from the letter to the Hebrews

It is not as though Christ had entered a man-made sanctuary which was only modelled on the real one; but it was heaven itself, so that he could appear in

the actual presence of God on our behalf. And he does not have to offer himself again and again, like the high priest going into the sanctuary year after year with the blood that is not his own, or else he would have had to suffer over and over again since the world began. Instead of that, he has made his appearance once and for all, now at the end of the last age, to do away with sin by sacrificing himself. Since men only die once, and after that comes judgement, so Christ, too, offers himself only once to take the faults of many on himself, and when he appears a second time, it will not be to deal with sin but to reward with salvation those who are waiting for him.

In his teaching Jesus said, 'Beware of the scribes who like to walk about in long robes, to be greeted obsequiously in the market squares, to take the front seats in the synagogues and the places of honour at banquets; these are the men who swallow the property of widows, while making a show of lengthy prayers. The more severe will be the sentence they receive.'

He sat down opposite the treasury and watched the people putting money into the treasury, and many of the rich put in a great deal. A poor widow came and put in two small coins, the equivalent of a penny. Then he called to his disciples and said to them, 'I tell you solemnly, this poor widow has put more in than all who have contributed to the treasury; for they have all put in money they had over, but she from the little she had has put in everything she possessed, all she had to live on.'

R. Praise to you Lord Jesus Christ

Entrance Antiphon: Let my prayer come into your presence. Incline your ear to my cry for help, O Lord.

Communion Antiphon: The Lord is my shepherd; there is nothing I shall want. Fresh and green are the pastures where he gives me repose, near restful waters he leads me.

THE WORD AND LIFE this week ...

1) We need to appreciate the widows of our parish: Widows (and widowers), in addition to their deep grief, often suffer from economic loss, from the burden of rearing a family alone. They frequently become isolated from their former friends who promised their support lavishly at the funeral. Hence, let us learn to appreciate the widows and widowers of our parish community. Their loneliness draws them closer to God and to stewardship in the parish. They are often the active participants in all the liturgical celebrations, offering prayers for their families and for their parish family. Frequently, they are active in the parish organisations, as well as in visiting and serving the sick and the shut-ins. Hence let us appreciate them, support them, encourage them and pray for them.

2) We need to accept Christ's criteria for judging people: We often judge people's value or worth by what they possess. We give weight to their position in society, their educational qualifications, and their celebrity status. But Jesus measures us in a totally different way on the basis of our inner motives and the intentions hidden behind our actions. He evaluates us on the basis of the sacrifices we make for others and on the degree of our surrender to God's holy will. The offering God wants from us is not our material possessions, but our hearts and lives. What is hardest to give is ourselves in love and concern, because that gift costs us more than reaching for our wallets.
