## World Mission Sunday

**This October, we are celebrating World Mission Month, a month dedicated to the life-giving work of missionaries around the world.**

This year, we walk hand-in-hand with the Church of Ethiopia and the local communities towards providing life-changing opportunities to those most in need.

Pope Francis, in his 2022 World Mission Sunday message, invites everyone to answer the call to be missionary, sharing that "Mission is carried out together, not individually...".

Through the Pontifical Mission Societies' international network, with our supporters, we are answering the call to help build brighter futures. Working at a grass-roots level and closely collaborating with the local communities, we aim to find sustainable solutions which will bring hope to those in most need.

To encourage missionary action among youth and schools in Australia, Catholic Mission continues this year with its flagship program, Socktober. The program cultivates a passion for students to rise up, engage their local community and take action against poverty through the world game of soccer. It provides young people in Australia with the opportunity to lead in Mission, encouraging them to think not only of what they will do to help, but why they will do it.

## THE WORD AND LIFE this week

**Why should we preach?** Jesus, the first missionary, made a permanent arrangement for inviting all men throughout the ages to share God's love and salvation: "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptising them in the name of the Father, and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit and teaching them to observe everything I have commanded you" (Mt 28:19). This is why the Council Fathers of the Second Vatican Council declared that the Church of Christ "is missionary in its origin and nature". Hence, it follows that the mission of the Church is the mission of every member of the Church, and is not reserved for the priests, the religious, and the active missionaries alone. Thus, every Christian is a missionary with a message to share—the message of God's love, liberation and eternal salvation.

**How are we to accomplish this goal?** The most powerful means of fulfilling this goal is by living a truly Christian life—a life filled with love, mercy, kindness, compassion and a forgiving spirit. Mr Ghandi used to say: "My life is my message". He often challenged the Christian missionaries to observe the "apostolate of the rose". A rose does not preach. It simply radiates its fragrance and attracts every one to it by its irresistible beauty. Hence, the most important thing is not the gospel we preach, but the life we live. This is how the early Christians evangelised. Their Gentile neighbours used to say: "See how these Christians love one another". The Christ they recognised and accepted was the Christ who lived in each Christian.

**Prayer is the second means of missionary work.** Jesus said: "Without me you can do nothing". Therefore, prayer is necessary for anyone who wishes to accept Jesus as Lord and Saviour. In his message for World Mission Sunday 2004, Pope John Paul II stressed the fact that the Holy Spirit would help us to become witnesses of Christ only in an atmosphere of prayer. Since missionaries are weak human beings and since witnessing to Christ through life is not easy, we need to support them by our prayers. In his message for 2007 Pope Benedict reminds us "The harvest is plentiful, but the labourers are few", the Lord said "pray therefore the Lord of the harvest to send out labourers into his harvest" (Lk 10:2).

This week Catholic Mission offers us the opportunity to be part of a life-changing program which aims to help prevent malnutrition, especially in babies and young children, and help disadvantaged families provide food for their loved ones. The Deberety Goat Rearing Centre is a dram of the local Church and community in Emdibir. When established, the Centre aims to provide nutritious goats milk for families in need, like Neela's, so that babies like Ajani can be healthy and strong.
