FINANCE REPORT: Included with this Bulletin is a Finance Report update so Parishioners are aware of the Parish's financial situation. Here is a brief summary of the report:

Salaries and insurance premiums are the major expense items and the remaining ones include basic running costs such as electricity, phone, rates, church requisites etc which are all essential and leave virtually no room for adjustment. As can be seen there is no provision to allow for extraneous costs such as maintenance, general purchases and unplanned miscellaneous items. The projected budget deficit for the year is \$17,330 however that is based on there being no unforeseen crisis. We are fortunate in having a small cash reserve from an earlier bequest, that can cover the shortfall, however this cannot be sustained indefinitely. If we cannot improve our income situation, ultimately the Parish will become insolvent. Should this occur it is unlikely the Diocese will be able to subsidise us and we could be in danger of losing our Parish Priest. The Finance Committee is exploring other income sources but we encourage our congregation to try and dig a bit deeper for the weekly collections. We realise we are living in difficult times and it is a big ask. We know you can only do your best but it is becoming a matter of survival. We will report on the finances again at the end of June. An extra \$5 a week would make a big difference. Pentecost Sunday - YEAR A -

Feast of Pentecost

Today's first reading from the Acts of the Apostles describes in detail, the miraculous transformation that took place during the first Pentecost. The disciples experienced the power of the Holy Spirit as it flooded them like tongues of fire. As a result of this experience, the frightened apostles were transformed into brave witnesses of Jesus, powerfully proclaiming Him as the promised Messiah-the Lord and Saviour of all mankind. On this occasion, the Jews and proselytes from other countries, who knew very little of Aramaic or Hebrew, miraculously heard the Word of God in their own languages. The Holy Spirit gave this "power of



tongues" to the apostles in order that their message could reach every heart. He empowered the early Christians to radiate the love of Christ and be witness to their strong faith. This "anointing by the Holy Spirit" also supported the early Christian martyrs during the period of brutal persecution that followed. St Paul in his letter to the Corinthians explains how the sharing of the various spiritual gifts of the Holy Spirit enriches the Church. The Holy Spirit of Pentecost-the Third Person of the Blessed Trinity-is indeed best described as the Love of God who manifests Himself in the lives of ordinary men and women. This love is expressed through signs, which are often referred to as the gifts, fruits and charisms of the Spirit. St Paul lists them in his Letter to the Galations "What the Spirit brings is ... love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self control" (5:22). He continues "Since the Spirit is our life, let us be directed by the Spirit "(5:25). In other words, when we see any of the above qualities showing forth in someone's life, we can be pretty certain that the Holy Spirit of God has found a receptive home within that person. Today's Gospel relates to how the risen Jesus gave his apostles a foretaste of Pentecost on the evening of Easter Sunday by appearing to them and inviting them to carry on the mission given him by his heavenly Father. He then empowered them to do this by breathing upon them and saying "Receive the Holy Spirit". On the day of the Pentecost Jesus would fulfil his promise to send the Advocate or Paraclete who would enable them to fulfil Jesus' commission of preaching the gospel to all nations. Today's gospel passage also tells us how Jesus gave His apostles the power and authority to forgive sins. "Receive the Holy Spirit. For those whose sins you forgive, they are forgiven; for those whose sins you retain, they are retained". These wonderful words which bind together inseparably the presence of the Holy Spirit and the gift of forgiveness are referred to directly in the Sacrament of Reconciliation. But they have a much wider meaning. Those words indicate the power we are all given of being the agents of forgiveness in the world today, which is often fiercely judgemental and vengeful.

When Pentecost day came round, the apostles had all met in one room, when suddenly they heard what sounded like a powerful wind from heaven, the noise of which filled the entire house in which they were sitting; and something appeared to them that seemed like tongues of fire; these separated and came to rest on the head of each of them. They were all filled with the Holy Spirit, and began to speak foreign languages as the Spirit gave them the gift of speech.

Now there were devout men living in Jerusalem from every nation under heaven, and at this sound they all assembled, each one bewildered to hear these men speaking his own language. They were amazed and astonished. 'Surely' they said 'all these men speaking are Galileans? How does it happen that each of us hears them in his own native language? Parthians, Medes and Elamites; people from Mesopotamia, Judaea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya round Cyrene; as well as visitors from Rome – Jews and proselytes alike – Cretans and Arabs; we hear them preaching in our own language about the marvels of God.'

Just as a human body, though it is made up of many parts, is a single unit because all these parts, though many, make one body, so it is with Christ. In the one Spirit we were all baptised, Jews as well as Greeks, slaves as well as citizens, and one Spirit was given to us all to drink.

THE WORD AND LIFE this week ...

1) We need to permit the Holy Spirit to direct our lives i) by constantly remembering and appreciating his Holy Presence within us, especially through the sacraments of Baptism and Confirmation. ii) By fortifying ourselves with the help of the Spirit against all types of temptations. iii) By seeking the assistance of the Spirit in our thoughts, words, and deeds, and in the breaking of our evil habits. iv) By listening to the voice of the Holy Spirit speaking to us through the Bible and through the good counsel of others. v) By fervently praying for the gifts, fruits and charisms of the Holy Spirit. vi) By renewing our lives through the anointing of the Holy Spirit. Life in the Holy Spirit is a life of commitment, of sacrifice, and of joy. It is a call to love as Jesus loved, not counting the cost. As St Paul exhorts us, "Walk by the Spirit and do not gratify the desires of the flesh. If we live by the Spirit, let us also walk by the Spirit" (Galatians 5:16, 25).

2) We need to cultivate the spirt of forgiveness. The feast of the Pentecost offers us the chance of looking at the role which forgiveness should play in our dealings with others. Thus we are challenged to examine our sense of compassion, patience, tolerance and magnanimity. Learning to forgive is a lifelong task, but the Holy Spirit is with us to make us agents of forgiveness. If we are prepared on this day of Pentecost to receive the Holy Spirit into our lives, we can have confidence that our lives will be marked by

the Spirit of forgiveness.

3) We need to observe Pentecost every day. "It will always be Pentecost in the church," affirmed Oscar Romero, Archbishop of El Salvador, on Pentecost Sunday 1978, "provided the church lets the beauty of the Holy Spirit shine forth from her countenance. When the church ceases to let her strength rest on the power from above which Christ promised her and which he gave her on that day, and when the church leans rather on the weak forces of the power or wealth of this earth, then the church ceases to be newsworthy. The church will be fair to see, perennially young, attractive in every age, as long as she is faithful to the Spirit that floods her and she reflects that Spirit through her communities, through her pastors, through her verv life"
