**“YOU SHALL LOVE THE LORD YOUR GOD ...  
... AND YOUR NEIGHBOUR AS YOURSELF”**

In today's Gospel, Jesus refers back to today's First Reading, the great Old Testament prayer known as the "Schema," which our Jewish brethren know as well as we do the Our Father. "Hear, O Israel" it begins; "The Lord is our God, the Lord alone!" In Hebrew it reads, phonetically: "Sh'ma Yisrael. Adonai Elohaynu Adonai Echod".

"The Lord is our God." Through Christian Revelation we know that this Lord, this our Lord and God, revealed himself in human nature, Jesus of Nazareth, who became our eternal High Priest, and in whom we see and embrace God. Today's **Second Reading** accents this Revelation. The principal moments at which this Revelation is accomplished in our lives occur through the sacraments, supremely so in the Eucharist, in which Jesus—the same Jesus of Nazareth who once walked our earth and died on a cross for us—literally comes to embrace us as the risen Lord.

Isn't this why we hold the Eucharist as the most precious God-gift in our lives? Isn't this why we approach the Eucharist as frequently as we can: weekly, as a rule, more often if we can? There is a Church precept, we know, reminding us to receive Communion at least during the Easter time, ie, from the period beginning with the First Sunday of Lent through to and including Trinity Sunday. But this precept is simply meant as a crutch for those who require regulations as a means toward mature growth. (Continued on Page 3).

**Prayer after Communion:** Lord, we thank you for coming into our hearts in Communion. We believe you are truly present in the Blessed Sacrament. You are our life and our hope. Draw us more deeply to yourself and transform our hearts through your abiding love. May we come to know Sunday as a special day of faith, the day of our Risen Lord. May our celebration of the Eucharist on Sunday consecrate this day to you.

There used to be a great number of priests under the former covenant, because death put an end to each one of them; but this one, Christ, because he remains for ever, can never lose his priesthood. It follows, then, that his power to save is utterly certain, since he is living for ever to intercede for all who come to God through him.

To suit us, the ideal high priest would have to be holy, innocent and uncontaminated, beyond the influence of sinners, and raised up above the heavens; one who would not need to offer sacrifices every day, as the other high priests do for their own sins and then for those of the people, because he has done this once and for all by offering himself. The Law appoints high priests who are men

subject to weakness; but the promise on oath, which came after the Law, appointed the Son who is made perfect for ever.

One of the scribes came up to Jesus and put a question to him, 'Which is the first of all the commandments?' Jesus replied, 'This is the first: Listen, Israel, the Lord our God is the one Lord, and you must love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your mind, and with all your strength. The second is this: You must love your neighbour as yourself. There is no commandment greater than these.' The scribe said to him, 'Well spoken, Master; what you have said is true: that he is one and there is no other. To love him with all your heart, with all your understanding and strength, and to love your neighbour as yourself, this is far more important than any holocaust or sacrifice.' Jesus, seeing how wisely he had spoken, said, 'You are not far from the kingdom of God.' And after that no one dared to question him any more.

Christianity is not a system of regulations: rather it is a way of life, a desire to embrace and live in and by the living Lord Jesus. Pope Pius X, in his famed 1905 decree on frequent communion, entitled "The Holy Synod of Trent", reaffirmed the Church's perennial doctrine when he wrote: "Frequent and daily Communion, as a thing most earnestly desired by Christ our Lord and by the Catholic Church, should be open to all the faithful ... so that no one who is in the state of grace, and who approaches the holy table with a right and devout intention, can lawfully be hindered therefrom.

"A right intention consists in this: that he who approaches the holy table should do so, not out of routine or vainglory or human respect, but for the purpose of pleasing God, of being more closely united with him by charity, and of seeking this divine remedy for his weaknesses and defects."

The reference to the "state of grace", we all understand. It means absence of mortal sin.

Confession, like Communion, should be frequent in one's life, for it constitutes an encounter with the living Lord Jesus. Again, there is a Church precept requiring Confession at least annually during the Easter season. But this is also a crutch for those who need norms. Sacramental confession is always required as an ordinary means of forgiveness from mortal sin. But it is the Church's clear teaching that frequent sacramental confession should be encouraged. The Catholic who approaches Penance monthly, or even weekly, literally encounters the Lord Jesus as compassionate Judge and Healer in a mystery so awesome that the very thought of it should bring us to our knees. "The Lord is our God, the Lord alone". We say this—Jesus is Lord—especially when we sincerely approach him in sacramental Penance and the Eucharist.

## SAINTS: OUR MODEL INTERCESSORS

We all need people to look up to; people whose lives embody ideals we hold important and strive to emulate. Every form of human community has heroes. In Australian society, football stars are an obvious example. The Australia Day Honours List awards the outstanding achievements of our citizens.

'The Church community, too, is full of heroes and heroines. From the earliest days, it honoured the Apostles and the Christian martyrs who witnessed to their faith in Jesus even to the point of death. All Souls Day is Tuesday, 2 November.**
