

# **CELIBACY, VOWED CHASTITY AND MARRIAGE**

"God's word", today's **Second Reading** reminds us, "is living and effective, sharper than any two-edged sword." This means that the Bible as read within the Church—the Scriptures and tradition—not only represents perfection and fullness of truth, but is also dynamic, incomparably challenging and efficacious of faith. How unsophisticated it is to suppose that *ultimate* wisdom can more readily or more thoroughly be discovered elsewhere.

The Ten Commandments listed in today's **Gospel**, constitute a rather obvious example of God's wisdom, which in whole or in part, is either questions, rejected, or just ignored by the world. Take, however, the closing portion of today's Gospel (long form); the portion in which Jesus tells us



that anyone who gives up home and parents and children for his sake will be rewarded a hundredfold. This is one of many Biblical texts focusing on Jesus' call to the life of celibacy or vowed commitment to chastity for his sake. It is a vocation which diocesan priests assume by virtue of their ordination, and which religious priests, sisters, monks and brothers embrace by vow.

Priestly celibacy or vowed chastity is understandable only in the light of the faith that God's wisdom transcends ours. Jesus, remember, revealed celibacy or vowed chastity as a charism. In Matthew 19:11-12, we read that anyone who opts for this state of life for the sake of the Kingdom of God *can* possess it.

"The choice of celibacy", wrote Pope Paul VI, "does not connote ignorance, or despising of the sexual instinct and affectivity. That would certainly do damage to the physical and psychological balance. On the contrary, it demands clear understanding, careful self-control and a wise sublimation of the psychological life on a higher plane. In this way, celibacy sets the whole man on a higher level and makes an effective contribution to his perfection" (Sacerdotalis Caelibatus).

To assume celibacy, then, is to rely on the Gospel. "Rely on the Gospel" - there's the key. Once again, priestly celibacy or vowed chastity cannot be adequately comprehended save through faith.

Another example of divine wisdom's surpassing that of the world is marriage. How can we be so certain—absolutely certain—that marriage is permanent and God-graced, and will always remain so?

The answer is that we know because we have a Revelation. God's word, which transcends essentially the feeble efforts of mortals perfectly to understand, tells us unequivocally that when a man and a woman exchange marital vows in Christ they enter into a permanent, holy union that will ensure. And that, for a Christian, no conjugal living is graced by God unless it is entered into by means of a covenant with Christ—by vows taken within the body of the living Lord, Jesus (Cf. Mk 10:6-9, Ep 5:32).

To accept all this requires faith, of course. But once faith is experienced, doubts disappear, and a degree of certainty which the world cannot possibly offer is acquired. Faith is the priceless gem of which today's **First Reading** speaks: no earthly riches can compare.

Prayer for Australia: Lord you place deep in our hearts the love of Mary Help of Christians. Through her prayers grant wisdom to our leaders and integrity to our citizens. Under her protection may Australia be granted harmony, justice and peace. We ask this through our Lord Jesus Christ your Son who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God for ever and ever. Amen.

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark

Jesus was setting out on a journey when a man ran up, knelt before him and put this question to him, 'Good master, what must I do to inherit eternal life?' Jesus said to him, 'Why do you call me good? No one is good but God alone. You know the commandments: You must not kill; You must not commit adultery; You must not steal; You must not bring false witness; You must not defraud; Honour your father and mother.' And he said to him, 'Master, I have kept all these from my earliest days.' Jesus looked steadily at him and loved him, and he said, 'There is one thing you lack. Go and sell everything you own and give the money to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; then come, follow me.' But his face fell at these words and he went away sad, for he was a man of great wealth.

Jesus looked round and said to his disciples, 'How hard it is for those who have riches to enter the kingdom of God!' The disciples were astounded by these words, but Jesus insisted, 'My children,' he said to them, 'how hard it is to enter the kingdom of God! It is easier for a camel to pass through the eye of a needle than for a rich man to enter the kingdom of God.' They were more astonished than ever. 'In that case' they said to one another, 'who can be saved?' Jesus gazed at them. 'For men' he said, 'it is impossible, but not for God: because everything is possible for God.'

Peter took this up. 'What about us?' he asked him. 'We have left everything and followed you.' Jesus said, 'I tell you solemnly, there is no one who has left house, brothers, sisters, father, children or land for my sake and for the sake of the gospel who will not be repaid a hundred times over, houses, brothers, sisters, mothers, children and land – not without persecutions – now in this present time and, in the world to come, eternal life.'

### THE WORD AND LIFE this week ...

- 1) "Do something beautiful for God" by reaching out to others. That's the message we need to reflect on. Our most precious possession is our souls. Let us give ourselves away and give lavishly. Mother Teresa puts in in a different way: "Do SOMETHING BEAUTIFUL for God. Do it with your life. Do it everyday. Do it in your own way. But do it!"
- 2) An invitation to generous sharing. Jesus was so generous that he gave us his very self. The crucifix is "Exhibit Number 1". To follow Jesus we must have a generous heart and be willing to give our money away in order to express our generosity. In the heart of every Christian there should be a desire to give. Martin Luther says that the man who has given his heart to God will also give God his wallet. God does not have to extort money from those who love him. God does not ask us to give up our riches, but he does ask us to use them wisely in his service. We must manage our possessions wisely so that they do not gain control of our hearts. Let us also ask the question: "How do I use my talents?" God gives us talents. Hence they are not really ours. He lends them to us to be used in this world. How do we use our talents? What about time—do we use it for God? We each get 168 hours every week. How do we use our time? Are we too busy to pray each day?
- 3) "You are lacking one thing". We all have something in our lives that serves as a major obstacle to happiness and peace. We must recognize this obstacle and address it head-on. It may not be riches—it may be anger, holding grudges, alcohol, drugs, lust, apathy, lies, unfaithfulness, theft, or fraud. Let us invite God into our lives and into our efforts to face that one obstacle to holiness. We have a decision to make: whether to go away sad like the rich young man or to follow Jesus and he happy. Let us choose happiness.
- 4) We need to follow Jesus on his terms, and not on our terms. This involves giving up whatever in our lives is evil. That's step one. Sometimes it may involve giving up things which are good. As parents, we might consider all the time and personal recreation and relaxation (all good things) which we have given up over the years for the sake of the children. As a mother or father who is also a disciple of Jesus Christ, this was required of us, and we made the sacrifice. When we follow Jesus on his terms there may be certain crosses to bear, but deep down in the core of our being, there is peace and there is joy, because we know that we are doing our best to carry out God's perfect will in our lives.
