Let us introduce...... Peter Malone



Peter was born in Tumut. He has lived his whole life at Tumut Plains initially with his parents, Frank and Eileen and siblings, Frank, Ron, Marie & Celia.

His great, great grandfather, Edmund Malone, came to Tumut from Ireland in 1852 with his family. After settling, he had further children. Sadly about 8 years after arriving he and his horse drowned in the Tumut river while attempting to cross down near where the Tumut racecourse is today.

Peter attended the Tumut Plain's one teacher school, then attended the Catholic school for his high school education. In those days St Mary's Hall was divided into three classrooms to house Yr 1 to Yr 3 of High School. Leaving school at age 15, Peter's occupation has been as a dairy farmer all his life until the age of 70.

Besides the dairying, the Malone family grew sweet corn for Mountain Maid Cannery in Batlow. During the years of the Snowy Mountains scheme they supplied milk into the camps in the mountains. In 1975 the Malone family installed a rotary dairy, being just the 8th of its type at that time in Australia. It proved to be a big tourist attraction and a place where many students on school excursions attended.

Marrying the beautiful Joan from Melbourne in 1969, he had five children, Julia, Danny, Lucy, Phillip and Molly. Sadly Joan passed away when his youngest, Molly, was a small child, but Peter nurtured and reared his family until they all left home.

Carrying on the traditions of the Malone family, who were always avid supporters of the Tumut Catholic community, Peter has been very involved in his church all his life. He was a member of the CYC and then the YCW in his early years. In 1975 he and other parishioners were ordained as acolytes by Bishop Eris O'Brien at Galong, this being organised at the time by the current parish priest, Fr Tiernan.

Peter was an acolyte until 2021, he was a member of the PPC, was in the church choir, and a member of the maintenance committee, overseeing with others so many restoration projects over the years. During the 3 months lockdown for Covid, Peter undertook to fill in cracks in the inside walls of the church during this period. His generosity both in time and financial support to our parish has been admirable.

In the Community Peter was a member of Sing Australia and the Tumut Plains Agricultural Bureau and he exhibited at the local Tumut Show.

In 2021 Peter suffered a very serious tractor accident on his farm. He really thought he would never walk again. He was in hospital for 7 months. He said he cannot begin to thank everyone for the support he received during that time, people visited him in hospital including Fr George and Fr Sijo, he received cards and letters and many prayers.

It's truly wonderful to see Peter back to good health and being active in our parish once more, a very resilient man.

Vietnamese family reconnects with Tumut Parish

Parishioners may recall that in the mid to late 1970's, refugees fleeing the War in Vietnam arrived in Australia via boat and plane. Many of these families fleeing persecution were Catholics or ethnic Chinese. A total of 41,200 Vietnamese arrived in Australia under legal settlement programs. Australia became their new home. These refugees faced many challenges in Australia including, rejection, hostility, cultural and linguistic barriers.

In the early 1980's our Tumut parish was fortunate enough to have the opportunity to sponsor/resettle several Vietnamese families. This involved providing support to these families through housing, work, education and social integration through family networking within our parish. Since this time Australia has become home to a thriving Vietnamese community.

For this resettlement program to be successful, the parish required parishioners to be willing to embrace these families and support them in their adjustment and settlement in a new country. Dot and John Marzol, Pat and John Scroope, Von and Richard Hargreaves and other families in our parish opened their homes to these families. Together with Sisters of Mercy- Sr Celine McCormack, Sr Kath Ibbotson and Sr Clare Morton provided spiritual, ongoing support & guidance to these families in times of need. the gospel values of faith, love, hope, compassion, inclusion and

justice were in action to assist these Vietnamese families in need.

Recently one of these families, William, Fern, Co and Tu Chau returned to Tumut to catch up with friends. The Chau family settled in Tumut from 1980 to 1982; William Chau attended St Bridget's School; Co Chau worked at Tumut Pyneboard Mill. The Chau family are now settled in Sydney.

Maintenance Report

As you would have seen, an attempt to increase the lifespan and beauty of our church was undertaken 3 weeks ago.

With a fire-fighting unit and a boom lift, we were able to clear gutters on Capper St side of the church as well as paint the eaves, sloping capstones and circle above St Joseph's chapel entrance.





The impact was significant. Gutters are clear and future cleaning can be accomplished via the bell tower. A circular window exits onto the roof, the site of 15-20cms of bird droppings and debris. This was directly feeding into the rain head gutters and blocking them. When full, these gutters have caused considerable damage to St Joseph's chapel below.

Work has also continued in the church and the wall facing the congregation with flaking paint had largely been scraped and patched. Whilst the work is being done, I'm aware that anyone interested in the restoration is invited to collaborate and share their wisdom. So far, work done to date, has cost less than \$400. That includes both inside and outside repairs, boom and paint.
