

Eamonn Moore, Principal at McAuley Catholic Central School, has been awarded a prestigious fellowship; the Blakeney Millar Foundation Churchill Fellowship to investigate best practice in delivering innovative Stage 6 curriculum through virtual learning.

As an accomplished educator who is deeply passionate about providing the best opportunities for the students in his school, Eamonn says the opportunities presented to us through virtual learning are amazing and he is very excited about a way of the future.

Many universities are offering fully virtual degrees now and we are preparing our students for that very different path; opportunities can be provided not only for ATAR path but also for TAFE and VET.

PPC September Meeting Report

Parish – The PPC discussed "Walking Together" and the progress of the parish in its various missions. The positive increase in the participation in groups and ministries within the parish was discussed and celebrated. Moving forward is a proposal to initiate a funeral and baptism planning group to assist Father with these important ministries.

School – School based Masses are running smoothly and well attended, as are the Sacramental Preparation programs through the school. Initiatives included feast days, grandparent Masses, Christian meditation and NAIDOC celebrations. Next Year the school will grow to a full K-12 across two campuses and enrolments are expected to increase to 460. This is a great achievement for both the Principal and his whole team.

Grants – The PPC and fundraising committee will explore the possibility of grants on a local and state level that may assist in the parish.

Church Restoration – The restoration and maintenance projects for the church were reported on and discussed. This will link in with the fundraising for initiatives and drawing on volunteers to continue this great work.

There is the story of a preacher who got up one Sunday and announced to his congregation: "I have good news and bad news. The good news is, we have enough money to pay for our new building program. The bad news is, it's still out there in your pockets."

Parish Finance Update

As people might be aware our parish has obligations to service the costs incurred by our priest, and for the running and maintenance of our buildings. Our church, presbytery and St Mary's hall are old and require upkeep and repairs. We need to be sure our buildings are safe and comfortable.

The Parish Finance Committee works with our priests and with the Archdiocese to create and maintain an annual budget. The income derived in Tumut is solely through the collections as we have no other income streams.

This places a pressure on our finances. At the end of June 2023 we were running at a deficit. Unfortunately this has been the case for the last few years. To put it in easy to understand terms we need to pay (approximately) each year:

- For the support of our priest's superannuation and leave.
- Insurances
- Archdiocesan levies and fees
- Repairs and maintenance.
- Capital expenses furniture & equipment
- Presbytery expenses, rates, repairs etc.

That totals somewhere around \$60,000. That equates to somewhere close to \$1200 per week.

Each week we publish the Sunday collection totals for your information. This only includes what is put on the plate. Contributions are also made by Direct Debit, Tap machine and internet banking. We are always grateful for your contributions in labour, donations and time; as well as financially. It is a reality that our Parish of Tumut needs to be financially viable to be able to support having a priest based here.

Fundraising is a part of what we do in the Tumut Catholic Parish. Its a way to supplement our income and maintain our beautiful parish buildings.

Do you remember.....in the 1940's and 1950's our church held an annual Bazaar in the Oddfellows hall in Fitzroy Street. Amongst the various stalls was a "Country Stall" coordinated by Mrs PS Kelly from Gilmore and my parents, Gus & Kath Clout, assisted on this stall.

One year the raffle was a magnificent cake made and iced by Mrs Kelly, and as a child of about 5 I won this cake and I gifted the cake to my grandmother, Alice Clout for Christmas.

Then in the early 1960's we had the launch of Planned Giving as a scheme enabling parishioners to all contribute to the parish in a fair and equitable way on a regular basis. This launch was a dinner in the Tumut Showground pavilion attended by a huge crowd. Guest speakers, both local parishioners and representatives of the Archdiocese spoke.

In the 1970's and 1980's Housie was another form of fundraising. One of our parishioner's recalls Housie being played once a week in St Mary's Hall. These nights would see the hall packed with people enjoying the night and the opportunity to be a lucky winner.

Housie was run by a team of volunteers, Maurie Norman, Mick Bristow, John & Ann Hickson, John & Bev Piper, Gordon & Maureen Young, Brian & Kathleen Rosetta & John Marzol and others and supported by their priest, Fr Fred Edwards. Many hours of preparation made this a great success.

Then there were the annual Fetes held in November each year adjacent to St Mary's Hall and on the church carpark. Everyone remembers Mick Bristow and the spinning wheel on the back of the truck, and the stalls in the Hall and the Tea Room headed by Clare Gordon.
