Reflection

This passage from John gospel needs to be situated in its context, Chapter 6:35-58 We have the first portion today, from 35-50, and the second portion, 51-58 next week. Each starts with the words, I am bread.

There are differences of opinion as to what we understand Jesus to be saying when he uses the image of bread. Today we will look at the passage in terms of bread as Revelation and next week, in the second part, we will pick up the theme of bread as Eucharist.

Many of Jesus' sayings that are found in John's gospel have Jewish roots. The Word of God and wisdom are often described in imagery related to food and specifically bread. Amos, the prophet, speaks of famine across the land because of the loss of the word of the Lord. This helps us when we turn to the reading from the Book of Kings.

Elijah, the prophet, had engaged in a feud with Queen Jezebel. She had established her own prophets of Baal in the territory, it was customary when a foreign bride arrived, to bring with her the religious practices of her home territory and rivalry developed between them and the prophets of the Lord. Elijah ordered the killings, of some of the prophets of Baal. When Jezebel heard about the killings she swore she would kill Elijah in revenge so he fled for his life. Elijah went into the desert, sat under a broom tree, and prayed for death. This reminds us of the prophet Jonah in similar circumstances. Elijah was depressed. He slipped into sleep.

He was roused from sleep by a messenger of God who gave him food and sent him on his way. Elijah's depression came from a loss of the presence of God. He was a prophet, but the Word of God, which was his daily bread, was forgotten in the conflict he was experiencing.

Lacking the nourishment of the Word he easily fell prey to discouragement. The words of Jesus in John could easily be directed to Elijah, Jonah or any person today, who feels discouraged by the problems facing our world. We all need the bread of wisdom as the problems we face are complex and cannot be addressed by instant solutions or answers that sufficed centuries ago. The answer, Jesus says, lies in our motivation. We need to check out the reasons for our actions. We

are to be engaged in doing what we discern to be God's will. This is not something that is always obvious.

BREAD

OF LIFE

To mill forests or preserve them; to share power or to exclude; to explore modifications to genetic material or to ignore possibilities; everyone has to deal with one or a variety of major issues on a regular basis. The problems we face in the twenty-first century are our own. There are no concrete solutions that we can apply today, to be found in the Bible. If we believe that God is with us then what we will find from the Word of God is the right attitude or will to bring to the problems.

To attempt to be a faithful disciple does not mean we will always get it right but our discernment with and in our community will prevent us from errors caused by expediency. We have the promise of Jesus that we will never go spiritually hungry and we have a wealth of resources.

The image that suggests itself is that of a food hall in a shopping centre, overabundance and a tantalising variety. Our biggest challenge is to select the food that leads to eternal life. By this is meant more than a narrow focus on life after death but rather eternal life in John's meaning of the phrase; life lived here and now clothed in Christ.

Ephesians, with great faith and optimism, tells us to imitate God. The exhortation to get rid of all bitterness is appropriate when we read of so-called Christians making fierce judgements against fellow citizens which almost amounts to incitement. We are called to be kind to one another, compassionate and mutually forgiving.

Saint of the Week - Saint Alberto Hurtado Cruchaga S.J.



Died:- 18 August 1952, Santiago, Chile Feast Day:- 18 August Beatified:-16 October 1994; Canonised:- 23 October 2005; Patron Saint of:- chile, street children, social workers Short biography:-Alberto Hurtado

Short biography:-Alberto Hurtado Cruchaga was born in Viña del Mar, Chile, on 22 January 1901 to an aristocratic family. After the death of his

father when Alberto was four years old, his mother with just two small sons, decided to sell their large estate. Unfortunately the buyer defrauded her. The family, now impoverished, was forced to live with a succession of relatives.

From an early age, he experienced what it meant to be poor and without a home. Thanks to a scholarship, he was able to attend a Jesuit high school. During this time, he volunteered at a Catholic parish and school in a poor neighborhood. He attended the Pontificia Universidad Católica de Chile, studying law and writing his thesis on labour law. Hurtado entered the Jesuit Novitiate in 1923 and was ordained in 1933. He returned to Chile in January 1936 and began

Born:- 22 January 1901, Vina del Mar, Chile; teaching at the Catholic University.

In 1936, Hurtado authored an article entitled *The Priesthood Crisis In Chile*, which addressed the problem of the shortage of priests in Chile; his analysis was criticized as 'exaggerated'. In 1941, he was appointed national director of the Catholic Action youth movement. Also in 1941, Hurtado authored *Is Chile a Catholic Country*? The book published statistics demonstrating a lack of priests assigned to the working class and rural populations.

Grateful for the help he and his family had received when they were in difficulties, Hurtado was led to active social involvement. He founded an organization similar to Boys Town in the United States, called *Hogar de Cristo* (Home of Christ), which took in all children in need of food and shelter. He purchased a green pickup truck and monitored the streets at night to help those in need that he could reach. His own charisma brought him many collaborators and benefactors.. The shelters multiplied throughout Chile and it is estimated that between 1945 and 1951 more than 850,000 children received some help from the movement.

In 1947, inspired by the social teaching of the Church he founded the Chilean Trade Union Association, meant to train leaders and instill Christian values in the labor unions.
