PLENARY COUNCIL Meeting 3-9 July:

Members of the Fifth Plenary Council of Australia were invited to carry "a deep consciousness of who we are" as the People of God, called to discipleship in the Australian context. It is the Holy Spirit who will take the Council to a "new place" by the end of the week, and "into a future in which, through God's grace, we can be the signs and bearers of God's love for all people that the Lord is calling us, as his Church, to be".

As president of the Plenary Council, Archbishop Timothy Costelloe SDB opened the first day of deliberations with an address to its Members, acknowledging the failure of the Church to live up to this calling. "This week we will acknowledge again, in sorrow and in shame, the damage our failures have caused in the lives of many people," he said. The challenge ahead means ensuring "that when people engage with the Church they experience healing, hope and safety: that they experience the compassion and mercy of God".

Members of the Plenary Council are being invited to spend additional time to discern after two motions did not achieve a qualified majority in voting that has taken place over the past 24 hours. All four motions in part 3 of the document – entitled "Called by Christ – Sent Forth as Missionary Disciples" – achieved qualified majorities on both rounds of voting. Two-thirds of voters present must support a motion to achieve a qualified majority. In part 4 of the document, entitled "Witnessing to the Equal Dignity of Women and Men", one motion received a qualified majority among the consultative voters but fell just short of a qualified majority among deliberative voters. It therefore did not pass. The other motion did not receive a qualified majority on either the consultative or the deliberative vote.

Plenary Council vice-president Bishop Shane Mackinlay addressed the assembly after the outcome of the votes was announced, and proposed that the members spend additional time discerning what reservations and concerns they had.

Dt 30:10-14

Moses said to the people: 'Obey the voice of the Lord your God, keeping those commandments and laws of his that are written in the Book of this Law, and you shall return to the Lord your God with all your heart and soul.

'For this Law that I enjoin on you today is not beyond your strength or beyond your reach. It is not in heaven, so that you need to wonder, "Who will go up to heaven for us and bring it down to us, so that we may hear it and keep it?" Nor is it beyond the seas, so that you need to wonder, "Who will cross the seas for us and bring it back to us, so that we may hear it and keep it?" No, the Word is very near to you, it is in your mouth and in your heart for your observance.'

Col 1:15-20

Christ Jesus is the image of the unseen God and the first-born of all creation, for in him were created all things in heaven and on earth: everything visible and everything invisible, Thrones, Dominations, Sovereignties, Powers – all things were created through him and for him. Before anything was created, he existed, and he holds all things in unity.

Now the Church is his body, he is its head.

As he is the Beginning, he was first to be born from the dead, so that he should be first in every way; because God wanted all perfection to be found in him and all things to be reconciled through him and for him, everything in heaven and everything on earth, when he made peace

by his death on the cross.

Gospel

Lk 10:25-37

There was a lawyer who, to disconcert Jesus, stood up and said to him, 'Master, what must I do to inherit eternal life?' He said to him, 'What is written in the Law? What do you read there?' He replied, 'You must love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your strength, and with all your mind, and your neighbour as yourself.' 'You have answered right,' said Jesus, 'do this and life is yours.'

But the man was anxious to justify himself and said to Jesus, 'And who is my neighbour?' Jesus replied, 'A man was once on his way down from Jerusalem to Jericho and fell into the hands of brigands; they took all he had, beat him and then made off, leaving him half dead. Now a priest happened to be travelling down the same road, but when he saw the man, he passed by on the other side. In the same way a Levite who came to the place saw him, and passed by on the other side. But a Samaritan traveller who came upon him was moved with compassion when he saw him. He went up and bandaged his wounds, pouring oil and wine on them. He then lifted him on to his own mount, carried him to the inn and looked after him. Next day, he took out two denarii and handed them to the innkeeper. "Look after him," he said, "and on my way back I will make good any extra expense you have." Which of these three, do you think, proved himself a neighbour to the man who fell into the brigands'

hands?' 'The one who took pity on him,' he replied. Jesus said to him, 'Go and do the same yourself.'

Reflection


It was not enough to want to follow Jesus and to be committed to him. Discipleship also demanded the ability to make shifts in understanding in order to recognise what following Jesus required. He did not merely repeat the religious tradition, he re-interpreted it. We too are called to understand the words and deeds of Jesus, but we must understand what they mean for us today. Today we need to make comparable shifts of understanding in order to bring the message of Jesus into conversation with the contemporary world.

Perhaps one of the most exciting and, at the same time, unnerving aspects of our religious tradition is its nonconforming nature. We think that we finally understand the way God is working in our lives and

then something happens that seems to turn our understanding inside out. We are told to love our neighbour and when we ask who that might be we are told a story that turns the question around. 'Who is my neighbor?' or 'Whom should I love?' becomes 'Who acts as a neighbour?' or 'Who shows love?'

The same Sunday that we reflect on the paradoxical nature of the ways of God, we are told that the law of God, which appears to be so lofty, is really very close to us, in our mouths and in our hearts. This too is an unusual claim. Following the law results in a way of living that is inspired and informed by love, love of God and love of others, even, and perhaps especially, those whom we are not inclined to love.

> Two by Two Fr. Tony Percy

It is important to take seriously the sending out of the seventy-two disciples. The actions of Jesus and his words form a unity.

First, Jesus' actions:

'The Lord appointed seventy-two others and sent them out ahead of him, two by two, to all the towns and places he himself was to visit' (Luke 10).

Jesus had chosen 'the twelve' in Luke 9. Symbolic, no doubt, of bishops and priests. We need them. We don't need a lot of them, we just need good ones.

Jesus now chooses the seventy-two, symbolic, no doubt, of the baptised who are the majority of the church – men and women, young and old, possessing great gifts, human weaknesses and a variety of personalities.

Jesus sends them out two by two, because most of life depends on the company we keep. Fridays @ St Mary's—Rosary & Reflection 9am

Sunday 17th July—SOCIAL SUNDAY join us for a cuppa after Mass

This is true, especially true, in our efforts to spread the good news of Jesus.

We cannot spread the gospel on our own. It is impossible. We need company, we need community.

Second, Jesus' words:

'The harvest is rich but the labourers a few, so ask the Lord of the harvest to send labourers to his harvest.'

These words interpret the actions of Jesus. That is, the mission is about the Lord and his harvest. It is not about us.

We are sent out to proclaim the good news, and then Jesus will visit the hearts and minds and souls of those who have heard the message.

A friend of mine once said in a gathering, 'if we lose our why we lose our way.' Our why is Jesus Christ crucified and risen.

Our way is two by two.

Amen.
