Dear Sisters & Brothers in Christ.

A major agenda item at The Southern Deanery meeting last week was the need to rationalize Mass times in the Archdiocese. There will be a reduction of masses, especially in Canberra, as the pressure on retired priests to supply is far too much. It was agreed that the retired priests shouldn't be travelling long distances and when there is need for a supply priest in the country, it will be an exchange with the more capable priest in Canberra. This issue will impact our region as I attempt to put in place a permanent roster for our centres, hopefully by November. Everyone needs to be conscious of the distance travelled by the priest and parishioners; the perfect example being Araluen last Sunday where thirty people gathered not having had Mass on a Sunday for many years.

There are complicated negotiations between the pre-school and St. Mary's being addressed by your Finance Council and the Trustees of Canberra/Goulburn. There has been lobbying of the N.S.W Government and decisions taken without the knowledge of the Finance Council and Trustees. I hope that the issues involved in these negotiations can be resolved for the benefit of both parties, please pray for a successful outcome. Please remember the young parishioners preparing for First Holy Communion to be celebrated at Mass on the 18<sup>th</sup> September. Once again I am extremely grateful to Brigitta, Geoff & Mary-Anne for their mentoring of these candidates and their parents.

But what you have come to is Mount Zion and the city of the living God, the heavenly Jerusalem where the millions of angels have gathered for the festival, with the whole Church in which everyone is a 'first-born son'

and a citizen of heaven. You have come to God himself, the supreme Judge, and been placed with spirits of the saints who have been made perfect; and to Jesus, the mediator who brings a new covenant.

Gospel

Lk 14:1. 7-14

On a sabbath day Jesus had gone for a meal to the house of one of the leading Pharisees; and they watched him closely. He then told the guests a parable, because he had noticed how they picked the places of honour. He said this, 'When someone invites you to a wedding feast, do not take your seat in the place of honour. A more distinguished person than you may have been invited, and the person who invited you both may come and say, "Give up your place to this man." And then, to your embarrassment, you would have to go and take the lowest place. No; when you are a guest, make your way to the lowest place and sit there, so that, when your host comes, he may say, "My friend, move up higher." In that way, everyone with you at the table will see you honoured. For everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, and the man who humbles himself will be exalted.'

Then he said to his host, 'When you give a lunch or a dinner, do not ask your friends, brothers, relations or rich neighbours, for fear they repay your courtesy by inviting you in return. No; when you have a party, invite the poor, the crippled, the lame, the blind; that they cannot pay you back means that you are fortunate, because repayment will be made to you when the virtuous rise again.'

**2022 Social Justice Statement Respect: Confronting Violence and Abuse** 

This statement invites us to engage with a complex and confronting social reality. It explores the roots of violence and abuse, honours the voices of victims, offers a social and theological exploration of the reality of violence, especially against women and children, and invites us to develop relationships in all parts of our lives 'marked by equality and reciprocity rather than domination and violence, respect and freedom rather than coercion and control.'

We welcome this urgent call from our Church to deepen our faith through full and frank discussion and dialogue, advocacy and action.

## Social Justice Sunday Prayer

Loving God, you made each of us in your image and likeness.

Open our eyes to recognise one another as equals, replacing domination and control, violence, and abuse, with mutuality, reciprocity, respect, and freedom. Help us to love like you.

Jesus Christ, you rejected the use of religious traditions to justify violence.

Teach us to unmask manipulations of our faith used to justify violent, abusive, or coercive behaviour. Teach us to be people who show tenderness, respect and care for others as you did.

Holy Spirit, you are with us always, showing us the way.

Move us to assist those who experience violence and abuse, and support their call for justice. Empower us to hold perpetrators of violence and abuse responsible, encouraging them to change their behaviour.

## Social Justice Sunday—Today & Everyday

Social Justice Sunday provides our Church with the opportunity to delve deeply into a social issue of contemporary relevance. Our political landscape, the global #MeToo movement, our Plenary Council process and numerous recent Royal Commissions have raised our awareness around the insidious nature of various forms of violence and abuse perpetrated daily in all corners of our land. Today's psalm reminds us that God restores the land when it languishes; heeding God's promise is at the heart of today's readings.

No one is outside the scope of today's challenge from our bishops, who even shine a light on the way in which the Christian tradition can be manipulated to perpetuate and normalise structural injustice and abuse. The Social Justice Statement is an excellent way of connecting the wider community with the integrity and richness of our living faith.

Today's readings call for personal and communal conversion. In particular, the gospel invites us to consider humbly the way we might perpetuate behaviours that are unjust or simply unkind. The radical invitation of Jesus is to become aware of the many ways in which we use, misuse and abuse power – in our thoughts, biases, words and deeds. We are human, we are powerful. Jesus' simple story suggests that we might relinquish personal power in the service of our own humanity and the movement toward a 'city of the living God', where practice of the virtues of justice and solidarity can enable us to be Good News.
