Didn't you realise that you were God's temple and that the Spirit of God was living among you? If anybody should destroy the temple of God, God will destroy him, because the temple of God is sacred; and you are that temple.

Make no mistake about it: if any one of you thinks of himself as wise, in the ordinary sense of the word, then he must learn to be a fool before he really can be wise. Why? Because the wisdom of this world is foolishness to God. As scripture says: The Lord knows wise men's thoughts: he knows how useless they are, or again: God is not convinced by the arguments of the wise. So there is nothing to boast about in anything human: Paul, Apollos, Cephas, the world, life and death, the present and the future, are all your servants; but you belong to Christ and Christ belongs to God.

Gospel

Mt 5:38-48

Jesus said to his disciples: 'You have learnt how it was said: Eye for eye and tooth for tooth. But I say this to you: offer the wicked man no resistance. On the contrary, if anyone hits you on the right cheek, offer him the other as well; if a man takes you to law and would have your tunic, let him have your cloak as well. And if anyone orders you to go one mile, go two miles with him. Give to anyone who asks, and if anyone wants to borrow, do not turn away.

'You have learnt how it was said: You must love your neighbour and hate your enemy. But I say this to you: love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you; in this way you will be sons of your Father in heaven, for he causes his sun to rise on bad men as well as good, and his rain to fall on honest and dishonest men alike. For if you love those who love you, what right have you to claim any credit? Even the tax collectors do as much, do they not? And if you save your greetings for your brothers, are you doing anything exceptional? Even the pagans do as much, do they not? You must therefore be perfect just as your heavenly Father is perfect.'

Reflection

Do No Harm

One of the more famous embodiments of the message behind today's gospel reading is Mahatma Gandhi's non-violent resistance. Working from the words of Jesus, Gandhi once said, "An eye for an eye makes the whole world blind". Not only did Gandhi pioneer the idea that mass social change could materialise through non-violent means, but would fast if violent actions occurred against the British by his own people.

Today's gospel promotes these two ideas: non-violent resistance and loving our enemy. If these concepts seem counterintuitive, it is because they are. Biologically we are wired to react aggressively toward threats to protect against ourselves. Non-violent resistance and loving our enemies are conscious actions that challenge the way life is lived by most people.

Jesus and Gandhi were not only enlightened minds, but they were also strong leaders who manifested what they preached through their actions. As a practitioner of *ahimsa*, an Indian term meaning "to do no harm," Gandhi swore to speak the truth and advocated that others do the same. Gandhi gave up any hint of materialism and lived his life in a self-sufficient community. Jesus, too, was famous for immersing himself in the lives of sinners, the poor, the suffering. It is not enough simply to preach. It is only through action that true change can come about.

The Commissioning : Go from here as those who are ready to forgive generously.

We will leave wrongdoings in the past. We will dialogue with those who dislike us. We will reconsider and give friendship another opportunity.

We will face up to our mistakes and say those hard words:

"I am sorry".

We will sit down with our adversary and find common ground for the way forward.

Are you ready to give generously?

We will love our enemies and pray for those who persecute us.

But there's an awful lot of evidence that people aren't like that, being generous to others in ways that couldn't possibly advance their own interests, and being prepared to harm their own interests rather than be party to arrangements they don't think are fair. It has sparked debates in economics about how much the profession will have to change to incorporate reality, or whether it should.

Although a Christian celebration, Ash Wednesday evokes questions of who we are as human beings, and where we are heading as a nation and a world. Ash Wednesday (22 February) is not a stand-alone day. It is part of a process. It marks the beginning of Lent, which in turn prepares for the central Christian remembrance of Jesus' death and rising from the dead at Easter. Belief in Jesus who died and rose for our salvation lies at the heart of Christian faith. It also takes us into the depth of our human life – our hope in a blessed life, its testing by rejection, isolation and painful death, and our hope vindicated by Jesus' rising from death. To enter into these depths demands serious reflection.

Ash Wednesday is the gateway, suitably solemn, to the 40 reflective days of Lent which culminate in the exuberant celebration of Christ's Resurrection. The colour of church draping's and vestments changes from white and green to a sombre purple. Ash Wednesday also introduces a time of fasting and abstaining from animal foods. Fasting is common in many religions, usually associated with a serious focus on what matters most deeply in life. It is also associated with an awareness of sin and the desire to change one's way of life. Ash Wednesday highlights these things. It takes its name from the practice of marking our foreheads with ashes.

The symbolic actions of taking off colourful dress, of fasting, of spending 40 days in prayer, and of putting on ashes, echo central stories in Scripture. They recall the 40 days that Jesus spent fasting and praying in the desert as he prepared for his life's mission. For the first readers of the Gospels, too, this story would also call to mind the 40 years that the People of Israel passed wandering in the desert as they awaited their entry to the Promised land, and the 40 days that Moses spent in prayer and fasting as he asked God to pardon the people for their rejection of God by worshiping a golden calf.
