## Stained Glass Window

The restoration of the St Mary's Church stained glass window is now well underway in the studio



of Cummins and Stehn in the Noosa hinterland in Queensland. Removing and dismantling the window has revealed some interesting facts — and a few secrets. The restoration team believe that the dedication "THE GIFT OF MRS THOMAS SHANAGHAN JUNR" was not a part of the original window but was added during a repair carried out in the 1960s(?). St Mary's would like to make contact with the descendants of Mrs Thomas Shanaghan Junior in order to gain further historical information in relation to this magnificent artwork so generously gifted to St Mary's Bungendore. Cummins and Stehn now believe that something substantial happened at the bottom of the central lancet (column) of the window – possibly that it collapsed under the weight of the glass above it when the sill began to rot. It is now clear that the dedication in the central lancet and the blue borders at the base of the two flanking lancets may not be original and were inserted during an earlier restoration The glass removed from those areas appears to have been used to II in broken areas throughout the rest of the window. The bottom of the central lancet is not original as seen by the jumble of glass pieces above the name of the window donor. It is suspected that when this sec on of the window collapsed - probably in the early 1960's - the repairer has taken the opportunity to insert the name of the donor at the base of the centre lancet.

The different designs in the flanking and central lancets indicates that the bases of the three lancets have been modified at some stage because motifs from the points of the leaves which occur in the flanking lancets and nowhere else have been repositioned in the reconstructed and muddled base of the central lancet. Some of the red helix ribbon originally only in the flanking lancets has been fitted into the purple ribbon at the base of the central lancet, and a new mismatched adjoining purple piece has also been added.

As proof positive that the base of the central lancet is a reconstruction, a semi-circular border has been inserted which has thicker glass and a design painted on it which occurs nowhere else in the twelve panels which make up the window. Further, that border has been cut with a wheeled glass cutter which was a technique employed later than the original cutting method of grozing used throughout the rest of the original 1874 window.
