Proclaim the Good News. The early Christian community could not remain as an enclosed, self-contained group in Jerusalem. International Day of Nurses and Midwives, 12 May

During the week it was comforting to see how nurses were acknowledged on 'their' day, especially during this time of Covid 19. Pope Francis in praying for the nurses recognized their testimony of courage and sacrifice in helping people affected by the virus, despite the risk to their own health. "This self-sacrifice is especially evident in the elevated number of medical workers who have died while faithfully carrying out their responsibilities. In Italy alone, 11 percent of those infected by the virus are healthcare workers. At least 160 have died." ... The pope recognizes these men and women as having said "yes" to a vocation. He calls them "good Samaritans," who are concerned for the lives and wounds of others. He acknowledges that they experience the trauma caused by suffering in people's lives. *May we continue to pray for all those in the health profession*.

World Day of Cultural Diversity for Dialogue and Development This year, on Thursday 21 May, as we mark **World Day of Cultural Diversity for Dialogue and Development** it takes on special significance.

"The threat of coronavirus has stretched Western societies in many ways, and has taken them in different directions. It has first forced them to broaden their view of the relationships that are central in a good society. Previously we had tacitly accepted the view that the most important and untouchable relationships have to do with the economy – growing the GNP, making profit and protecting individuals' wealth. When confronted with the threat to life and health posed by coronavirus, that assumption changed suddenly."
