Before the Collar : Simon Falk

Work experience for a priest? Nobody does work experience for a priest! That was Fr Simon Falk's teenage response when a family member suggested he give it a go. But he gave it a go. So much so that this year he celebrates 25 years since his ordination to the priesthood by Archbishop Carroll on 17 November 2000.

Looking back, Fr Simon reflects on the pivotal roles priests played in shaping his calling. Born at Harden-Murrumburrah, the youngest of five. He had an uncle, also a priest, Fr. Simon was just four when he was ordained, but even then, "something clicked in me." More "clicks" came with priests at the family dinner table, at church, and during school in Griffith, Broken Hill, and Wagga Wagga. "I always felt at home with them. I could see myself doing this sort of thing."

Still, the priesthood was one interest among many until Year Seven, when his father had a serious car accident. It prompted deeper thinking about life and its meaning. "The school chaplains and Christian Brothers were very, very good. That made an impression on me." The death of Fr Simon's older brother, tragically by suicide, marked another turning point. "I went into a fog for about two years after he passed. I was just going through the motions." In the midst of grief, he did that work experience with a priest who took him to an RCIA meeting.

As school ended, he weighed the options of teaching, journalism, while still discerning a call to the priesthood. He completed an Arts degree at CSU, studying sociology, psychology, and comparative religions. After university, he considered joining a religious order but felt more drawn to parish ministry. He contacted Archbishop Carroll, who invited him to visit. "The rest, as they say, is history," Fr Simon said.

After studies at St Patrick's Manly and the Seminary of the Good Shepherd in Homebush, he was ordained at St Christopher's Cathedral, Canberra, in 2000. Today, he's the parish priest of Canberra's Corpus Christi parish. Before and after donning the collar, he's met countless people. "I think a lot of it's about the significance of the people we meet. I've met extraordinary people—some wonderful, some challenging—but God's presence has worked through them all." "For me, it's very profound and very moving for that to happen."
