Ministry of the Phone

She had been an active member of the parish for over 40 years. She was a mainstay at many of the parish's family ministries. Her four children had gone through the church's religious education program and celebrated their weddings there; the parish rallied around her when her husband's Parkinson's was diagnosed and he died three years later. Now she could no longer be alone: the family home was sold and her children moved her into an assisted living facility. Her days of service to the parish she loved were pretty much done. Or so she thought.

Her pastor — a wise man who never passed up an opportunity put someone's abilities to work — asked her to take on a new ministry: the ministry of the phone. Would she take on the task of calling parishioners to remind them of meetings and events and check the availability of lectors and ministers of Communion for the weekend liturgies? She knew many of the parishioners already and just about everyone knew her.

At first, she thought she would leave a message and move on — but those who knew her would chat for a moment, asking how she was doing; she, in turn, would keep up with what was going in their lives. Those who didn't know her before her calls quickly became friends. The pastor checked in regularly, as well. In the process, she found herself keeping a small notebook of prayer intentions.

The time she spent on the phone with parishioners was the best time of her day.

We may not see ourselves as "fishers" of humanity, but the reality is that we all possess "nets" that can catch the falling, rescue the endangered, gather in the lost and forgotten. Christ calls each one of us to use whatever "nets" we possess, in whatever oceans and seas we find ourselves, to "fish" for those who are working hard to build fulfilling and meaningful lives for their families; to "fish" for those who are struggling to survive; to "fish" for those have lost all hope.
