Pope Pleads for Church Unity on 60th anniversary of Vatican II

On Tuesday, 12 October, Pope Francis, "marked the 60th anniversary of the opening of the Second Vatican Council by pleading for the Church to "overcome all polarisation and preserve our communion". ..."Let us be careful: Both the 'progressivism' that lines up behind the world and the 'traditionalism' that longs for a bygone world are not evidence of love, but of infidelity." During the Mass, the Pope once more reiterated his support for the reforms of Vatican II. "How timely the council remains!" he said. What are we to learn from this about the language of prayer? Listen to the tax collector: "O God, be merciful to me a sinner." This man did not ask for the kind of "mercy" requested by the lepers who saw Jesus pass their way. The phrase translated here as "be merciful" is more properly interpreted as, "be gracious" or "look upon me with kindness." This man's prayer admits that, before God, we are all beggars longing for God's smile. Only those who have begun to understand God's own humility, only those who understand that love is the one invincible power on earth, can begin to speak God's language.

When we pray, "God, be gracious to me," we are doing nothing more or less than asking God to be God. What greater praise could there be? The only thing left for us to do is to join Mary in saying, "Let your love take flesh in me. according to your will."
