


Please welcome Fr Rex Curry who is doing my Masses while I am away.


# Ezekiel & Jesus, Prophets Opposed.

As presented by Mark Jesus stands in a long line of Israelite prophets who



encountered resistance, rejection, and even death at the hands of the people to whom they were sent by God. The story of Ezekiel's call in the first reading is informative.

First, Ezekiel does not take the prophetic office on himself: he goes because 'I am sending you.' Second, the Israelites are identified as 'rebels who have turned against me.' Their long-standing rebellion - traceable to 'their ancestors' - is described as a 'revolt.' The Hebrew word (pasca) is the technical term to describe a vassal's political defection from the overlord and violation of the covenant between them. In failing to heed the words of the prophet sent by God, the Israelites have broken the covenant, defected from God, and entered into open rebellion.



The prophet's ministry does not depend on a response, or lack of response, from the people. The prophet's success or failure is measured, not by whether people heed or not, but on whether the prophet is faithful to the mission entrusted to him by God. The mission rests solely on God's authority. That is the significance of the 'messenger formula' - 'the Lord says this' - a standard formula indicating that the prophet has been sent by God and that the word he speaks is God's word. But curiously, in this passage, no message follows this stock introduction. This messenger formula without a message puts

the focus on the prophet himself: his very presence is God's message. His presence confirms that, as God has acted in the past through prophets, God is continuing to act. When the judgment against their rebellion is carried out and the prophetic word proves true, then 'they shall know there is a prophet among them.' Then they will realise - too late! - that God was reaching out to them through the prophet. The alltoo-common failure to recognise a prophet until it is too late is the same malady that afflicts people in Jesus' hometown. Their 'rebellion' is, in fact, a 'lack of faith.'

## Called & Sent

Our very familiarity with the great figures of the Bible - Abraham, Moses, Isaiah, Peter, Paul - causes us to regard



these figures with a certain reverence. Larger than life, each seems to fill his hallowed niche naturally and deservedly. But when we read the biblical text carefully, we could well ask, 'Why did God call him?' None of them was great or noteworthy when called. In fact, each was rather ordinary.



Take the case of Amos in this Sunday's first reading. Here he is - a relative nobody - standing in one of the royal sanctuaries of the King of Israel, confronting the chief priest there. According to his own description, Amos is a shepherd and a dresser of sycamores. The latter job is clearly a seasonal occupation: does this make him a migrant looking for seasonal work? Earlier in the book (1:1) the word used to describe his job as a 'shepherd' is found in only one other text where it describes Mesha, King of Moab (2 Kings 3:4). Clearly, the King of Moab is no poor, rootless shepherd. Which leaves us puzzled about Amos: was he a migrant worker? an average shepherd? a wealthy sheep owner? We don't know, nor is it important. Amos tells us what he thinks is important: he was not a professional prophet. He did not earn his bread hawking God's word, as it were; he

earned his livelihood by working a regular job. What authorised him to come to the King's shrine to speak seditious words was the call of God. And this is the point: Amos is not called because he was great; he is great because he was called. Or more precisely, he is great because he responded to the call and did as God commanded. God called him for a purpose: 'Go, prophesy to my people Israel.' Those whom God calls, God also sends on a mission. In just this way those whom Jesus called - none of them great, famous, or powerful when they were called - are also sent. Their eventual greatness lies in their fidelity to the mission of Jesus.
