For Damasus, internal political struggles, doctrinal heresies, uneasy relations with his fellow bishops and those of the Eastern Church marred the peace of his pontificate.

The was the son of a priest, who followed his father into the church. Damasus served Pope Liberius (352-366) and followed him into exile. When Liberius died, Damasus was elected bishop of Rome; but another deacon, Ursinus, was also elected pope. The controversy between Damasus and Ursinua resulted in violent battles, scandalizing all. Damasus even had to clear himself before a civil court & a synod.

As pope, his lifestyle was simple in contrast to others, and he was fierce in his denunciation of Arianism & other heresies. A misunderstanding of the Trinitarian terminology used by Rome threatened relations with the Eastern Church, and Damasus was only moderately successful in dealing with that challenge.

During his pontificate, Christianity was declared the official religion of the Roman state, and Latin became the principal liturgical language. His encouragement of St Jerome's biblical studies led to the Vulgate, the Latin translation of Scripture which 12 centuries later the Council of Trent declared to be "authentic in public readings, disputations, preaching."

The history of the papacy and Church is inextricably mixed with the personal biography of Damasus. In a troubled and pivotal period of Church history, he stands forth as a zealous defender of the faith who knew when to be progressive and when to entrench. Damasus makes us aware of two qualities of good leadership: alertness to the promptings of the Spirit and service. His struggles are a reminder that Jesus never promised his Rock protection from hurricane winds nor his followers immunity from difficulties. His only guarantee is final victory.





WE CONTINUE OUR PREPARATIONS for the coming of Jesus. That is, we are preparing to celebrate his coming among us as a new-born baby in Bethlehem, [i.e. took on our weak and fragile human nature] and came to live among us. Today's Gospel tells us to prepare for thet coming that communications that communications are set of the communications.



prepare for that coming, that remembering, that celebrating. It does so by speaking about John the Baptist preparing people to welcome the coming of Jesus as he begins his public life, his mission.



John had already becoming a famous person in his own right. That is clear from the number of people who came out to see him & that he attracted the attention of King Herod & of the religious leaders in Jerusalem. He led a very austere life in the desert, dressed in rough clothes made of camel skin. No designer clothes for him. He fed on locusts & wild honey & fasted as well (the Gospel tells us this in contrast to Jesus). John was clearly a man of God & the people admired & trusted him as a person of holiness & integrity. He taught them, bluntly made them aware of their sinfulness & called on them to "Repent". Repent here does not mean just being sorry for the past. It is a call for them to do much more than that, to change their ways. To **repent** in the Gospel involves a radical transformation in our way of living. It means a conversion, a real turning around, a re-directing of one's whole life.

There are two things we can learn here which are relevant to our Christmas preparation:

**a**. We ourselves need to prepare for the coming of Jesus. And not just by a pre-Christmas confession to tidy ourselves up and get rid of some of the things we regret having done in recent months. Peter, in today's 2nd Reading, tells us that a "day" with the Lord can be a 1,000 years. This is probably directed at those who thought (and perhaps feared) that the Lord was coming soon. "The Lord is not being slow in carrying out his promises [to come again], as anybody else might be called slow; but he is being patient with you all, wanting nobody to be lost and everybody be brought to change their ways." In other words, if the end of the world seems so slow in coming, it is to give people time to mend their ways, to redirect their lives. At the same time, he also warns that the coming can be very sudden, as we all know is very true. We all know people who have been taken away from us very suddenly, without warning. Let us reflect then at this time on what changes we should make in our own lives, not just now but in the year that is to come. What kind of person would I like to be? What kind of person should I be? What kind of person do I think God would like me to be?

**b.** John the Baptist prepared the way for Jesus to come into our lives. The 1st Reading speaks about filling in valleys, smoothing out mountains and hills, transforming cliffs into plains, & ridges into valleys. In other words, removing all the obstacles that get in the way of our meeting with Jesus. Then "the glory of the Lord shall be revealed and all mankind shall see it".

That is also our role as Christians. It is only through what we say and do that others can come to know Jesus. So many people we know face many obstacles in getting to know the real Jesus and, to be honest, sometimes we ourselves are those obstacles.

So, there are two wonderful ways to prepare for Christmas:

Personal conversion. What better present could I give myself? Leading someone else to know and experience the love of Jesus. What better present could I give to another person?
