The journey of the disciples in the boat is not merely a rough crossing of a lake,

but it is a highly symbolic journey, the journey of faith.

The journey begins with Christ who orders them to get into the boat and to go on ahead of him. We could imagine that they must have been on something of a high after the time with Christ and the miracle of the loaves and fish. Yet they obey. They set out without him, but are expecting to meet him later.

Next they encounter difficulty. It is heavy work as they battle against the wind on a rough sea.

The next step is fear. They see Christ, but they do not recognise him and they are frightened by the prospect of this strange phantom that approaches.

However, they recognise him once they hear his voice and they take courage. Peter plucks up enough courage to even ask the impossible, to do what Christ himself is doing. As long as he keeps his eyes on Christ, he manages. When he looks at the rough and choppy waves, however, he starts to sink. Christ has to come and grab him by the hand to save him.



All these elements form part of the classic journey of faith. We set out on our journey of faith in answer to what Christ asks of us.

Almost certainly, we will find difficulties, 'rough seas', and it becomes challenging. In the midst of that difficulty Christ might well come to us, yet we might not recognise him because of the fear that is within us, but he calls us to courage. Then, there are the moments of over confidence, when we step into the water a bit too early and take our eyes off the one who counts, Never fear though, he is there to catch us!

13th - St Pontian, Pope, Martyr & St Hippolytus, Priest, Martyr. Died some time in the fourth century after mistreatment in exile and brought back to Rome for burial on this day. Remembered as seekers of the truth.

The Story of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary - Franciscan Media

On November 1, 1950, Pope Pius XII defined the Assumption of Mary to be a dogma of faith: "We pronounce, declare and define it to be a divinely revealed dogma that the immaculate Mother of God, the ever Virgin Mary, having completed the course of her earthly life, was assumed body and soul to heavenly glory." The pope proclaimed this dogma only after a broad consultation of bishops, theologians and laity. There were few dissenting voices. What the pope solemnly declared was already a common belief in the

Catholic Church.

We find homilies on the Assumption going back to the 6th century. In following centuries, the Eastern Churches held steadily to the doctrine, but some authors in the West were hesitant. However by the 13th century there was universal agreement. The feast was celebrated under various names—Commemoration, Dormition, Passing, Assumption—from at

least the fifth or sixth century. Today it is celebrated as a solemnity.

Scripture does not give an account of Mary's assumption into heaven. Nevertheless, Revelation 12 speaks of a woman who is caught up in the battle between good and evil. Many see this woman as God's people. Since Mary best embodies the people of both

Old and New Testaments, her assumption can be seen as an exemplification of the woman's victory.

Furthermore, in 1 Corinthians 15:20, Paul speaks of Christ's resurrection as the first fruits of those who have fallen asleep.

Since Mary is closely associated with all the mysteries of Jesus' life, it is not surprising that the Holy Spirit has led the Church to believe in Mary's share in his glorification. So close was she to Jesus on earth, she must be with him body and soul in heaven.
