



Week

3rd - St Gregory the Great, Pope (590-604) & Doctor of the Church, 540-604. Reorganised Church life & administration in a time of crisis, sponsored liturgical reform, & initiated the evangelisation of the English. Remembered also for his extensive writings on pastoral care, spirituality, & morals, & for his self-designation as "servant of the servants of God."

4th - Spring Ember Day. Observed on the first Fridays of Spring & Autumn, these are special days of prayer & penance. Ember days seek God's blessing of favourable weather & fruitful harvest from the land, interceding in times of drought or flood & giving thanks in better times. There is a strong impulse on these days towards the justice of God's kingdom, with attention given to those peoples who are devastated by famine & exploitation. Ember days focus on the environment, climate change, & our stewardship of the world's resources. Doing penance reminds us that sustainable use of our resources will cost us in our attitudes & lifestyles.

Lament - from suffering to deliverance 22nd Sunday in Ordinary Time

This Sunday's first reading from Jeremiah is one of several passages in which he

prays to God and describes the suffering he endures for being a prophet. These passages have been traditionally called 'The Confessions of Jeremiah' but are now referred to as his 'complaints' or 'laments.' This Sunday's portion is the first part of one such complaint; on Sunday 12 we read the second part. Dividing the lament in this way served the interests of the Lectionary, using the first reading to highlight particular aspects of the gospel of the day. This Sunday, for example, the suffering of Jeremiah (rejection and persecution) illuminates the suffering and rejection that Jesus (and disciples) will encounter. Breaking up Jeremiah's lament in this way, however, obscures the overall structure of this particular prayer-form. Typically this prayer (common in the

psalms) contains the following elements: address to the Lord; a description of the individual's complaint ('I am an object of laughter . . . derision . . . reproach,'); sometimes the complaint uses the language of physical illness ('like fire in my heart, imprisoned in my bones,'); a request for help; expression of confidence; hymn of thanks or praise for the deliverance which will surely come.

The prayer-form in its entirety is important to our

understanding its theology. While the individual is frank in describing suffering, the individual is equally confident that deliverance is assured. In other words, for those who are faithful, suffering is not the whole story for God will rescue those who trust in God.

This theology is evident in this Sunday's gospel. Though Jesus is not praying, he describes how he will 'suffer greatly . . . and be killed' but he will also 'be raised' on the third day. This pattern - from suffering to deliverance, from death to new life - will also be true for disciples. Jesus instructs Peter and all would-be disciples that they must take up the cross and lose their life but in so doing, they will find their life. This is the paschal mystery.
