In attempting to discuss or preach on the central dogmas of our faith, it's essential to remind ourselves of what the Church teaches. The Catechism notes that there are no eye-witnesses to



the resurrection and no-one can describe how it happened physically. The evidence we do have however, rests on two key events contained in the Gospels. Firstly, the empty tomb as described by John and witnessed by the Beloved Disciple and Peter. Secondly, the testimony of the apostles who witnessed the appearance of Christ in their lives shortly after his death. In reference to the physical resurrection, the Catechism states that 'in his risen body, he passes from the state of death to another life beyond time and space...Jesus' body is filled with the power of the Holy Spirit'. As followers of Christ we believe that death is not the end but the gateway to eternal life.

This is what we believe as Christian followers and this is what we proclaim on Easter Sunday. To believe requires faith, and faith in abundance. The unwavering belief of the Beloved Disciple was derived out of a genuine love of Christ. A love no other disciple could commit to until they saw the resurrected Christ for themselves. Only then did they express genuine love. The challenge for us today is to participate in the life of the resurrection. We have not seen the empty tomb or experienced the sight of Christ's body filled with the Holy Spirit. But we believe. We believe in faith because we have enough evidence before us to construct the story. The life of the resurrection is a way of living now, not just later on. It's a life of responsiveness to God and to those around us. As someone once said, 'you could and should do it, years before you are dead!' We need to begin this life today.

2nd - St Francis of Paola, Hermit, 1416-1507. Remembered as a spiritual counsellor of kings and for his political peacemaking.

Feast 4th - St Isidore, Bishop and Doctor of the Church 560-636. Remembered for Days his prolific writings and as an influential educator, and noted too for the pastoral this care of his diocese.

Week 5th - St Vincent Ferrer, Priest 1350-1419. Remembered chiefly for preaching repentance on his missions throughout France, Spain and Italy, and also for his influence in ending the schism between Avignon and Roman papal claimants.

SECOND SUNDAY OF EASTER

We must cast our

thoughts back to Palm Sunday to recall the initial feelings of hope and expectation as the disciples followed Christ through the streets of Jerusalem. Chaos would soon enter their world as they witness the trial of their Saviour and nothing could prepare them for the brutality of Christ's death. Their world had been torn apart. This Gospel from John is the dawn of a new creation. It is resurrection day, the first day of the week and Christ appears in the midst of the disciples. The disciples have experienced the darkest of times and yet, the presence of Christ represents the light of a new creation. There can no longer be darkness and chaos, for the resurrection recreates the world, conquering death and fear and bringing joy to all who believe its message.

This is the Good News and it is joyful news. The disciples are sent out to preach and evangelise with this in mind. Nothing of this message should be concealed and when it is preached, the joy of the message should be transmitted. It is a transformative message that will change lives. Interestingly, the first person the disciples encounter is Thomas and he refuses to believe their message. Perhaps not all who evangelise will be successful! But the evangeliser never gives up. Today we acknowledge the forces in our world that deny or obstruct this message of joy. We pray for perseverance and strength in carrying out Christ's command to go out into the world and spread the Good News.
