Country of the Yuin and Ngarigo Ngarigo Peoples, first Catholics arrived in the area from 1826, as assigned servants (convicts), Scottish, Irish and later German immigrants built up the presence, from 1833

1864 the first resident priest, Fr Patrick Newman

Churches built, Bombala (1867 & 1942), Delegate (1877 & 1918), Cathcart (1878), Corrowong (1895)

Schools 1866-1886 (privately Catholic), Bombala, 1886, Delegate, 1921

Sisters of St Joseph (Mary MacKillop) arrived in 1888, continuous ministry for 128 years

Monaro, South Coast Parishes transferred to Goulburn Diocese 1917

First priestly vocation – Fr Ernest Barragry, ordained as Missionary of the Sacred Heart 1941 (died 1997)

SAINTS ALIVE!

‘Saints can appear removed from our daily experience. And yet are they?’ Take some saints memorialised by the Church around this time, beginning with **St. Ignatius Loyola (1491-1556, Memorial 31 July)** A wounded soldier who while convalescing and to counter boredom read the lives of some saints and had a spiritual awakening. Ignatius thereafter combined strict commitment and gradual theological formation to write his ‘Spiritual Exercises’ to assist other followers of Christ. Joined by like-minded individuals, the Jesuits were born. **St. Alphonsus Liguori, Memorial 1 August)** helped us to understand moral integrity consistent with our profession of faith. **St. Dominic (1170-1221, Memorial 3 August)**, with intellectual rigor furthered our understanding of the incarnation in countering a heresy which claimed that matter was evil. Others joined him and the Dominicans, the ‘Order of Preachers’ came into being. **St. John Vianney (1786-1859), Memorial, 4 August)**, the patron of diocesan priests, struggled with his seminary studies before being appointed to the French rural parish of Ars where with great insight he heard Confessions for up to 16 hours a day. Our own **St. Mary of the Cross MacKillop (1842-1909, Solemnity 8 August)** saw the educational needs of rural children and disadvantaged women and responded with the imperatives of the Gospel. Hence the Sisters of St. Joseph were formed. **St. Clare of Assisi (1193/4-1253, Memorial 11 August)** was inspired by St. Francis and at eighteen, forsaking a life of privilege, began her journey as a religious (the Poor Clares) relying on God’s providence, never venturing from her convent but drawing every strata of the Church to her for prayer and counsel. **The resounding ‘yes’ of these saints to God’s call resonates to this day. What of our ‘yes’? Perhaps your experience is like my own: at times withheld, sometimes muted and on occasion proclaimed in ways close to the heart of God.** We come aside each Sunday in the hope of making a more consistent response. Might the witness of the saints, many of whom are memorialised in beautiful stained glass in Churches and Cathedrals, inspire us to follow their example and to seek their intercession, knowing with firm conviction and deep joy as they did that **“it is wonderful for us to be here”**, precisely because God is with us in all things – in joy and in sorrow – when we are attentive to the movement of his Spirit.
