POPE TO OLDER PEOPLE: GOD IS WITH YOU



To express the closeness of God and of the Church to every older person. Pope "Francis has chosen "I am with you always" from Matthew's Gospel as the theme for the first World Day for Grandparents and the Elderly. The theme for the celebration on July 25 is especially appropriate "in those challenging pandemic times, said the announcement from the Dicastery for Laity, the Family and Life. "I am with you always" is also a promise of closeness and hope that young and old can mutually share. Not only are grandchildren and young people called upon to be present in the lives of older people, but older people and grandparents also have a mission of evangelization, proclamation and prayer, and of encouraging young people in their faith," the statement said.

Pope Francis announced in late January that he was establishing the World day for Grandparents and the Elderly, which is to be celebrated each year on the 4th Sunday of July to coincide with the feast of Saints Joachim and Anne, Jesus' grandparents. Cardinal Keven Farrell, prefect of the dicastery, had said the annual event would be "a gift to the whole Church" and one that emphasises the pastoral care of the elderly as "a priority that can no longer be postponed by any Christian community".

RE-EMERGING WITH PURPOSE AFTER LOCKDOWN

God is Here!

When disasters strike – whether they be natural occurrences, human atrocities or accidental tragedies – people inevitably ask: Where is God in all this? The question is certainly relevant in relation to the COVID-19 pandemic. According to St Augustine, God is really, though invisibly, present in the created world and in each of us, closer to us than we are to ourselves. God is present through the healing hands of those who care for patients, in the pastoral carer's who reach out to the elderly and the dying, and in the funeral ministry teams who assist grieving families to celebrate funeral rites with limited numbers. God's presence is also encountered in the Vinnies staff who provide charitable aid to the needy, and in those who have lost their jobs but continue to show love for one another.

Christ is present in the Church and its liturgical celebrations, in the sacrifice of the Mass, in the person of the minister, in the eucharistic elements, in the word proclaimed, and when the Church prays and sings. However, our experience of these sacramental presences has been compromised during lockdown. One of the challenges for the Church will be to strengthen the faith and prayer practices of Catholics in their homes. Traditional or contemporary morning & evening prayers, grace at meals, etc. The COVID crisis has forced Catholics to reassess their prayer lives.

in order to take it up again.


No one takes it from me;

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Reflection by Fr Michael Tate

In the regions where Jesus was an itinerant preacher, three or four flocks could be kept in a communal sheepfold for safety. In the morning, the shepherds would come and, as each called out, the sheep attuned to the sound of his voice would follow to life-giving pasture.

We are surrounded by hundreds of voices clamouring for our attention. We are bombarded by messages, social media incessantly chattering. Jesus invites us to get attuned to *his* voice, listening for the distinctive sound of it so that, even if it is faintly heard in a cacophony, we immediately turn toward it so that we can follow it in a life-giving direction.

How do we get attuned to that voice? By reading the gospels. A Chinese student once told me that the Chinese character for gospel is 'happy sounds'. I like the plural. Jesus' gospel voice is not a monotone but a polyphony sounding in different ways in different situations.

As disciples, we have to get onto the same wavelength as that voice so that we can echo it in our own lives. We become reverberations of Christ's voice in many different situations, helping him to lead others to lifegiving pastures.

We could take a moment to pray for better listening so that we might recognise the gospel voice of Jesus Christ, especially at the moment of death. Then we may hear the one voice we need and long for: 'Today you will be with me in paradise.'

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
