Looking Back Catholic Press Sydney 21 Dec 1922 ST JOSEPH'S CONVENT BOMBALA

On Tuesday evening, December 12, the annual ball in aid of the Sisters of St Joseph was held in Kennedy's Public Hall. In order to make the ball a huge success, the parish priest, Father John A Roche, organised a grand spectacular commotion ceremony to take place at 10pm when Mr Stanley Bede Clatworthy, of the Australian Arms Hotel, was crowned king of Bombala.

The coronation was carried out on an elaborate scale, gorgeous costumes being hired for the occasion. Close on 300 people were present in the hall, carloads coming from all the outlying districts. The principals taking part in the coronation were Cardinal Archbishop of Bombala, Most Rev J Turnbull; Bishop of Cathcart, Right Rev E Elliott, Bishop of Bibbenluke, Right Rev J Leonard; Lord Mayor of Bucky Springs, Hon NF Smith, Lord Chancellor, Hon Paul Vider; Field Marshal Sir Charles Graham; Admiral of the Navy, Sir Harry Tracey; Inspector of Police, Sir Harry Head; Queen of Rocky Hall, Miss Eileen Stewart; Queen of Mila, Miss Hilda Clatworthy; Countess of Crankies Plain, Miss Josie Stewart.

A large number of returned soldiers, courtiers and assistants, made the ceremony very picturesque, and the local convent funds will benefit considerably by the novel entertainment. Father Roche, at the close of the coronation ceremony, thanked all present for their attendance in making the ball such a big success. He stated that the number of Catholics in Bombala were very small in number, and at a glance all the men taking part in the coronation would reveal the fact that all were non-Catholics with the exception of three. Father Roche expressed his personal gratitude and thanks to those of other denominations for the kindly feeling they had always for him during the whole of his six years in charge of Bombala. The ceremony closed with the singing of the National Anthem.



AUSTRALIAN CATHOLICS URGED TO CELEBRATE OLDER PEOPLE

Pope Francis announced earlier this year that July 25 will be celebrated as World Day for Grandparents and the Elderly. In his message for the World Day, with the theme "I am with you always", Pope Francis said older people, even if "energy is running out", have a "renewed vocation". "It makes no difference how old you are, whether you still work or not, whether you are alone or have a family, whether you became a grandmother or grandfather at a young age or later, whether you are still independent or need assistance", he wrote.

"Because there is no retirement age from the work of proclaiming the Gospel and handing down traditions to your grandchildren. You just need to set out and undertake something new." Archbishop Peter Comensoli said: "At a time of great challenges through this pandemic, we might look to our elders, neighbours and friends for their encouragement and wisdom in finding pathways through difficult times." "In honouring them, we honour their lives and journeys, and open up a richness of experience to draw from." "The World Day of Grandparents and the Elderly gives the Church a chance to more deeply celebrate the role older people have played in forming us as people and as believers."

BOMBALA-DELEGATE CATHOLIC PARISH - IN THE MONARO MISSION Country of the Bidwell, Ngarigo and Yuin people



The first Catholics arrived in the area from 1826 as assigned servants (convicts). Scottish, Irish and later German immigrants built up the presence from 1833. Father Patrick Newman was the first resident priest in 1864. Prior to this, priests travelled from Queanbeyan and Cooma. Churches were built in Bombala 1867 & 1942 (St Mary's), Delegate 1877 & 1915 (St Joseph's), Cathcart 1878 (St John's) and Corrowong 1894 (St Peter's). Schools opened in 1866-1886 (privately Catholic), Bombala 1886 and Delegate 1921. In 1888 the Sisters of St Joseph of the Sacred Heart North Sydney (St Mary MacKillop) arrived and have provided continuous ministry for 133 years. Monaro & South Coast Parishes were transferred from the Sydney Archdiocese to Goulburn Diocese in 1917 and to the Archdiocese of Canberra-Goulburn in 1948. Our first priestly vocation was Fr Ernest Baragry who was ordained as a Missionary of the Sacred Heart in 1941. Delegate was a Parish in its own right from 1954-1972. 2008 saw the welcoming of the World Youth Day Cross & Icon and the Consecration of St Mary's Church Bombala following repairs and restoration. St Joseph's Church Delegate celebrated its Centenary in 2015.

He served them; they ate and had some over, as the Lord had said.

Gospel Jn 6:1-15


He distributed to those who were seated as much as they wanted.

Jesus went off to the other side of the Sea of Galilee – or of Tiberias – and a large crowd followed him, impressed by the signs he gave by curing the sick. Jesus climbed the hillside, and sat down there with his disciples. It was shortly before the Jewish feast of Passover.

Looking up, Jesus saw the crowds approaching and said to Philip, 'Where can we buy some bread for these people to eat?' He only said this to test Philip: he himself knew exactly what he was going to do. Philip answered, 'Two hundred denarii would only buy enough to give them a small piece each.' One of his disciples, Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, said, 'There is a small boy here with five barley loaves and two fish; but what is that between so many?' Jesus said to them, 'Make the people sit down.' There was plenty of grass there, and as many as five thousand men sat down. Then Jesus took the loaves. gave thanks and gave them out to all who were sitting ready; he then did the same with the fish, giving out as much as was wanted. When they had eaten enough he said to the disciples, 'Pick up the pieces left over, so that nothing gets wasted.' So they picked them up, and filled twelve hampers with scraps left over from the meal of five barley loaves. The people, seeing this sign that he had given, said, 'This really is the prophet who is to come into the world.' Jesus, who could see they were about to come and take him by force and make him king, escaped back to the hills by himself.

Reflection by Fr Michael Tate

The disciples fell into the verbal trap which Jesus set. They believed that market forces should dictate how the hunger of the crowd could be satisfied. It was a young lad who put the disciples to shame, simply handing over five barley loaves and two fish to Jesus. It was because of his generosity that Divine generosity was able to feed the crowd

Divine desire to satisfy the hungers of humanity for the various necessities of life (food, shelter, companionship, education, medicines) require human generosity. Otherwise, Divine Compassion cannot be effective in the world.

Voluntary renunciation of property and sharing of wealth still occurs in the little oases of monasteries and convents, echoes of the radical redistribution of wealth recorded in the Acts of the Apostles (Acts 4:32-35). St Luke makes it clear that this was essentially linked to the Apostles' testifying to the Resurrection 'with great power'.

Francis of Assisi and now Francis of Buenos Aires remind us that the Church itself needs to engage in the redistribution of its wealth to enable the hungers of humanity to be satisfied. This will give authenticity to its preaching of the Gospel, and enable its evangelising to be undertaken 'with great power'.

We could take a moment to pray that we become more like the little boy in the Gospel, more like Francis of Assisi, more like Francis of Buenos Aires, voluntarily sharing our wealth to satisfy the hungers of humanity.
