Looking Back - Delegate Argus 19 November 1942 ANNUAL CATHOLIC BAZAAR DELEGATE

The Annual Catholic Bazaar in aid of St Joseph's Church Delegate, was held in the School of Arts on Saturday 14 November 1942. As usual, it was a most encouraging success and gratifying to all concerned.

The stalls were artistically arranged and decorated, some of them presenting designs both beautiful and new; and the stock of goods which appeared on those stalls announced to all that "this is a land of milk and honey".

In addition to the sum of £103/18/4 taken on the night of the bazaar, stallholders and assistants had already realised the sum of £99/14/2 by socials, parties, etc. making a total of £203/12/6 (or \$15,501.21 in 2021). This is exclusive of donations received for various furnishings, fittings, etc. in the Church.

It is anticipated that the Annual Catholic Ball on Friday, 20th inst. will be a notable success and a very happy function. This year the ball is being held for the support of the Sisters of St Joseph of the local Convent.

DID JESUS KNOW HIS GRANDPARENTS?

Little is definitely known about Sts Joachim and Anne, and whether they survived to see their grandson, Jesus Christ. It's easy to forget that Jesus had grandparents. One of the reasons for that is because they don't appear in the Bible and their lives are rather obscure. What we do know is found in a pious text from the year 145, called The Protoevangelium of James. It names Jesus' grandparents as "Joachim and Anne", and the Church celebrates their lives on July 26 each year.

Did Joachim and Anne live to see Jesus?

It appears that Jesus' grandparents do not have any age assigned to them nor are they recorded as having died. Anne is described as being infertile, mourning the inability to have children. Since she is mourning her barrenness, it is possible this went on for years. The story obviously draws upon other biblical stores of infertility, implying that they may have been older when they conceived Mary, the mother of Jesus. Some historians claim that the average lifespan in ancient Israel would have been 40, meaning that Joachim and Anne may have died before they saw Jesus. (Spirituality by Aleteia)

BOMBALA-DELEGATE CATHOLIC PARISH - IN THE MONARO MISSION Country of the Bidwell, Ngarigo and Yuin people



The first Catholics arrived in the area from 1826 as assigned servants (convicts). Scottish, Irish and later German immigrants built up the presence from 1833. Father Patrick Newman was the first resident priest in 1864. Prior to this, priests travelled from Queanbeyan and Cooma. Churches were built in Bombala 1867 & 1942 (St Mary's), Delegate 1877 & 1915 (St Joseph's), Cathcart 1878 (St John's) and Corrowong 1894 (St Peter's). Schools opened in 1866-1886 (privately Catholic), Bombala 1886 and Delegate 1921. In 1888 the Sisters of St Joseph of the Sacred Heart, North Sydney (St Mary MacKillop) arrived and have provided continuous ministry for 133 years. Monaro & South Coast Parishes were transferred from the Sydney Archdiocese to Goulburn Diocese in 1917 and to the Archdiocese of Canberra-Goulburn in 1948. Our first priestly vocation was Fr Ernest Baragry who was ordained as a Missionary of the Sacred Heart in 1941. Delegate was a Parish in its own right from 1954-1972. 2008 saw the welcoming of the World Youth Day Cross & Icon and the Consecration of St Mary's Church Bombala following repairs and restoration. St Joseph's Church Delegate celebrated its Centenary in 2015.

Eighteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year B

1 August 2021

First Reading Ex 16:2-4, 12-15

I will rain bread from heaven upon you.

The whole community of the sons of Israel began to complain against Moses and Aaron in the wilderness and said to them, 'Why did we not die at the Lord's hand in the land of Egypt, when we were able to sit down to pans of meat and could eat bread to our hearts content! As it is, you have brought us to this wilderness to starve this whole company to death!'

Then the Lord said to Moses, 'Now I will rain down bread for you from the heavens. Each day the people are to go out and gather the day's portion; I propose to test them this way to see whether they will follow my law or not.'

'I have heard the complaints of the sons of Israel. Say this to them, "Between the two evenings you shall eat meat, and in the morning you shall have bread to your hearts content. Then you will learn that I, the Lord, am your God."' And so it came about: quails flew up in the evening, and they covered the camp; in the morning there was a coating of dew all round the camp. When the coating of dew lifted, there on the surface of the desert was a thing delicate, powdery, as fine as hoarfrost on the ground. When they saw this, the sons of Israel said to one another, 'What is that?' not knowing what it was. 'That' said Moses to them 'is the bread the Lord gives you to eat.'

Reflection by Fr Michael Tate

Some religions, and even strands of Catholicism, try to suppress appetites in order to achieve some 'out-of-thisworld' liberation. But appetites are good things, telling us what we humans need as bodily, social, spiritual beings. They provide a reality check against our tendency to think that salvation is exclusively about the soul.

Our appetites for food and drink, for affection and companionship, for the truth about the Big Picture of our life journey, need to be satisfied or we disintegrate in various ways.

Our Lord Jesus Christ proclaims in today's Gospel that He is the total satisfaction of our deepest human appetites: 'I am the Bread from Heaven which gives life to the world.'

That 'Life' is nothing less than participation in Divine Life, existing in the Big Picture in the way God intended. That is the nourishment offered not to a particular tribe or ethnic group, but to the whole of humanity, indeed to the whole of creation.

We could take a moment to pray for faith to recognise that the bread brought up at the Offertory is truly transformed: no longer short term food like manna in the desert, but 'the Bread of Life', the Real Presence of the One who nourishes our humanity, indeed who gives Life to the world.

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
