SUNDAY OF ADVENT **Leader:** We have lit the first two candles, one for hope and one for peace. Today we light the third candle, the candle of joy. This should be the easy one, because joy is all around us - in the children, the lights, the music, the gathering together. But how often do we let our preparations - or our memories - push joy to the side? Joy is like an underground spring that wells up within us, but joy is also a choice, an attitude. Like a muscle, it needs to be exercised. So today we open ourselves to joy, trusting that God has already planted it in us. All we need to do is give it care and offer it to share. (Three candles are lit• 1 pink and 2 purple)

ALL: Loving God, we open ourselves to you, trusting that this is how you made us: You created us for joy-filled hearts and lives. Show us the creative power of hope. Teach us the peace that comes from justice. Fill us with the kind of joy that cannot be contained, but must be shared. Prepare our hearts to be transformed by you, that we may walk in the light of Christ. AMEN

The Third Sunday in Advent is Gaudete Sunday. Gaudete means "rejoice" in Latin. This name comes from the first line of the opening prayer for the Third Sunday in Advent, which encourages parishioners to "rejoice in the Lord always".

ADVENT (quiet reflection) Rejoice in God always, and again I say, rejoice, for God has created you with the capacity for love. We will find what makes us joyful, And make that our gift to the world. Trust in God's good will for all of creation, And open yourself to God's gentle, transforming love. We will welcome new possibilities in our lives. We will offer ourselves to God's goodness. We will go forth in hope, and peace, and joy.

LOOKING BACK 40 YEARS AGO 17 December 1981 The Final Bell Rings at St Joseph's Convent School Delegate

After 61 years of wonderful service to the Delegate & border districts, the bell at St Joseph's Convent School Delegate rang for the final time on Thursday, 17 December 1981, thus creating an extraordinary chapter in the history of the area.

The Sisters of St Joseph of the Sacred Heart (North Sydney) opened the school in 1921 and have remained in charge until the closure. Over 60 Josephite's from the original three sisters, Josephine Cahill (who later became Mother General), Rodrigues Miller & Alphonsus Kirton, to the current sister, Sister Dominica Bampton, have called Delegate home for a period. We thank God for the wonderful love, dedication and commitment the sisters have given to the children, families and people of the district.

Many lifelong friendships have been formed at "St Joey's" along with many significant achievements - not just those in the classroom but also those in the music room, the concert hall, the sporting field and every aspect of school life shared there.

More than 600 students have attended the school representing over 300 families. It is interesting to note that the Walker, Ryan, Jones, Stewart, Reed, Callaughan, Ingram, Morrison, Stokes, Clarke & Dunn families attributed to almost 1/3 of all the students. John & Margaret were the most common Christian names of the students.

As of 1982, Sr Marie Ellen Daniel of the Josephite Motor Mission Sisters based at Nimmitabel, along with Mrs Jean Manning and Mrs Janie Roberts, will commence twice weekly religious education at St Joseph's for Catholic students attending the local public school.





Last Tuesday, 7th, was the Graduation of the Year 6 students at St Joseph's. It was a very special Mass for the Children, followed by a celebration dinner for students and parents in the Supper Room at the Exhibition Hall. We were very proud of and congratulate; Miller Stewart, Henry Power, Alexander Bruce, Connor Reed, Keira Chamberlain, Clarissa Marrapodi, Mathew Reed, Matilda Campbell and Torin Hillyer.

This coming Tuesday, our assemblies will be held: K-2 between 11-12 noon and Years 3-6 in the afternoon between 2-3pm. The final school Mass for 2021 will be on Wednesday, 15 Dec. Our water safety and awareness program will be on Monday,13 Dec. at the pool.

Third Sunday of Advent, Year C

First Reading Zep 3:14-18

With gladness the Lord will rejoice over you.

- Shout for joy, daughter of Zion, Israel, shout aloud!
- Rejoice, exult with all your heart,
- daughter of Jerusalem!
- The Lord has repealed your sentence;
- he has driven your enemies away.
- The Lord, the king of Israel, is in your midst;

you have no more evil to fear. When that day comes, word will come to Jerusalem:

Zion, have no fear, do not let your hands fall limp.

The Lord your God is in your midst, a victorious warrior. He will exult witha joy over you, he will renew you by his love;

he will dance with shouts of joy for you as on a day of festival.

Responsorial Psalm

Is 12:2-6 R. v.6

- (R.) Cry out with joy and gladness: for among you is the great and Holy One of Israel.
- Truly, God is my salvation,

 trust, I shall not fear.
 For the Lord is my strength, my song,
 he became my saviour.
 With joy you will draw water
 from the wells of salvation. (*R.*)
- 2. Give thanks to the Lord, give praise to his name!Make his mighty deeds known to the peoples!Declare the greatness of his name. (R.)

Second Reading Phil 4:4-7

The Lord is near.

I want you to be happy, always happy in the Lord; I repeat, what I want is your happiness. Let your tolerance be evident to everyone: the Lord is very near. There is no need to worry; but if there is anything you need, pray for it, asking God for it with prayer and thanksgiving, and that peace of God, which is so much greater than we can understand, will guard your hearts and your thoughts, in Christ Jesus.

Gospel Acclamation Is 61:1 (Lk 4:18)

Alleluia, alleluia! The Spirit of the Lord is upon me; he sent me to bring Good News to the poor. Alleluia!

Gospel Lk 3:10-18

What, then, must we do?

When all the people asked John, 'What must we do?' he answered, 'If anyone has two tunics he must share with the man who has none, and the one with something to eat must do the same.' There were tax collectors too who came for baptism, and these said to him, 'Master, what must we do?' He said to them, 'Exact no more than your rate.' Some soldiers asked him in their turn, 'What about us? What must we do?' He said to them, 'No intimidation! No extortion! Be content with your pay!'

A feeling of expectancy had grown among the people, who were beginning to think that John might be the Christ, so John declared before them all, 'I baptise you with water, but someone is coming, someone who is more powerful than I am, and I am not fit to undo the strap of his sandals; he will baptise you with the Holy Spirit and fire. His winnowing-fan is in his hand to clear his threshing-floor and to gather the wheat into his barn; but the chaff he will burn in a fire that will never go out.' As well as this, there were many other things he said to exhort the people and to announce the Good News to them.

Reflection by Fr Michael Tate

Some people have an image of God who must be obeyed out of fear. Rules of behaviour are kept as part of a deal to avoid punishment. But St Paul was imitating God when he told the Philippians that all he wanted was their 'happiness'. God's deepest desire is that we share divine bliss. St Thomas Aquinas tells us that the goal of human life is this beatific happiness.

Of course, there is a way of life which responds to the Divine Lover. John the Baptist insists on rules of social justice, particularly those which forbid taking advantage of the vulnerable. But these are the minimum. He envisages a response of extravagant generosity. It will take Baptism in the Holy Spirit and Fire to make this possible.

This was effected by the One foretold by John. He doesn't name him, but we know it was Jesus of Nazareth who had the power to unleash such over-the-top generosity. Jesus sent his Holy Spirit at Pentecost as if in wind and fire. This created a new community which, the Acts of Apostles tells us, responded with acts of unrestrained generosity to the vulnerable and needy.

We might pause for a moment to pray for a generous spirit responding in gratitude to the Divine Lover who, as Risen Lord, has the power and will to enable us to be filled with Divine Bliss.
