EUTHANASIA

The New South Wales Parliament is considering proposed legislation to legalise euthanasia. The vote will probably be taken in February next year.

The Church will always teach that euthanasia is wrong. The assisting of dying or the actual taking of life prematurely, offends God's plans for life. That said, Catholics need to understand why there is such a push here in Australia for these laws. It is an indication that something in our culture is wrong. Are we as a nation truly respecting life and the Creator of life? Are we living lives that accept nature and the rhythms of life – birth, life, illness and death? Are we prepared as a society to dedicate resources to the care for the suffering and the dying with the best of palliative care? Are we, as individuals, honouring and respecting life as God's gift and accepting our obligations to protecting life at all stages, willing to pay taxes for the care of life at all stages?

Euthanasia laws threaten our society's commitment to a compassionate and dedicated system of caring for the aged and the terminally ill. While it may seem to be a caring way for those who are suffering greatly, it opens the door to attitudes which in the future may deny good care for all.

There are two things we can do to express our Catholic understanding concerning euthanasia. Firstly we can pray for our parliamentarians that they will make the decision for respect of life.

Secondly, we can write to a parliamentarian asking them to vote for respect of life and not euthanasia. The Minister for Health, Mr Brad Hazzard has not yet decided how to vote, he may be a good one to address letters to:

Minister for Health, Parliament House, Sydney 2000.

LOOKING BACK 118 YEARS AGO Corrowong Ball a Brilliant Success in aid of St Peter's Catholic Church - 24 October 1903

Although the day and night remained somewhat cold and squally, it did not in any way militate against the attendance, which was the largest that has attended any ball at Corrowong since its inauguration, about 100 couples being present, which shows that this function still remains a popular one. It was customary to hold this ball annually, but out of respect for the late owner of Corrowong Station, who was the originator of these enjoyable social re-unions, it was allowed to slumber for a couple or three years, but it has now, been revived, and was evidenced by the vast gathering of people on Friday night, with all the fervor that characterised its predecessors. The assemblage included visitors from Bombala, Bonang, Delegate River, Delegate, and in fact the whole area. To one unacquainted with Corrowong and district, it would be puzzling where all the people come from, but those who are acquainted with the place always look forward to a big muster, as the enjoyment to be derived from this dance seems to have spread throughout the whole length and breadth of the district. Corrowong house, as on all former occasions, was thrown open to the visitors, the good, lady of the place seeming to think no sacrifice too great for the comfort of her guests. In the early part of the evening people began to make their way to the trysting, and as nightfall began to approach, persons could be seen arriving by every conceivable route, either on horseback or in vehicles, until it began to look like an invading army. As usual the dance was held in the large barn adjacent to the homestead, which, had, under the generalship of Mr T Stokes, and other employees on the station been put into apple-pie order for the occasion, and although it is a spacious building it was quite inadequate to the vast assemblage on Friday night. On entering the building one would hardly recognise that it was used as a barn as it had undergone a complete transformation scene and made to resemble a fairy bower being prettily decorated, with flowers, Chinese lanterns, and draping's, which work was chiefly performed by Messrs. T Stokes, E Clear, T Wolfe and H Deeney. But by far the most attractive scene was the charming and becoming dresses of the ladies, the richness of which, blending with the decorations, gave the building quite a brilliant appearance. Dancing commenced at 8 o'clock and was kept going right merrily under the conductorship of Messrs. Crawford and Armstrong until midnight, when a call was made for supper. The provisions, which were of a choice nature, were provided by the good ladies of Corrowong, and they quickly disappeared before the invading army. The tables were tastefully laid out and presided over by a host of ladies foremost of whom were Mrs Walsh Snr, Mrs AH O'Hare, Miss Hayden and Messrs. A Epplestun, H Deeney, Jas Walsh, B McTernan, AH Davis and others. We must congratulate the secretaries Mrs T Beglev. Miss S Walsh and Mr H O'Hare, and the treasurer, Miss Essie O'Hare on the success of their work which could not be better exemplified than by the large crowd which responded to the invitation and thus added a crowning effect. The Rev Father Norris journeyed from Bombala that day to be present at the function, and expressed himself as extremely gratified with the result, the proceeds, we believe, amounting to £80 (approx. \$12,055 in 2021). Dancing was indulged in until daybreak, when the assemblage betook themselves to their respective homes, feeling satisfied within themselves that they had spent a pleasant time, and promising themselves if spared, to participate in the next Corrowong Ball.

'Take the fig tree as a parable: as soon as its twigs grow supple and its leaves come out, you know that summer is near. So with you, when you see these things happening: know that he is near, at the very gates. I tell you solemnly, before this generation has passed away all these things will have taken place. Heaven and earth will pass away, but my words will not pass away.

'But as for that day or hour, nobody knows it, neither the angels of heaven, nor the Son: no one but the Father.'

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Reflection by Fr Michael Tate

Have you ever seen those pictures of angels? They are like babies with delicate gossamer wings. How sentimental, how pathetically trivial, how untrue. Angels are more like the light-swords wielded by Skywalker in Star Wars. The good angels are lightning flashes of energy serving God's purpose in the battle against evil forces which can seem to dominate our worlds, private and social.

God loved us into existence in order to share in his life, but there are forces at work trying to frustrate that. There is a cosmic-scale battle going on. Who is on our side in that battle? The angels. Who are they?

They are non-bodily beings of great intelligence and power. Those are the angels, and those who have chosen to love and serve God are on our side.

Some are archangels with a cosmicscale brief. We hear of one in the first reading: 'Michael, the great Prince who stands guard over your people'. Others are our individual Guardian Angels so that when powers of darkness seem to engulf us, we can turn to our Guardian Angel and say: 'Fight for me', and that light-sword of God will engage in battle because that is that sort of angel's way of serving God.

We could pause a moment to pray, thanking God for the Archangels who guard our church community and for our personal Guardian Angels, and asking our Lord Jesus Christ to command those angels to gather us as his chosen to share His glory.

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
