LOOKING BACK 101 YEARS AGO Sunday, 16 December 1921 Opening St Joseph's Convent, Delegate

St Joseph's Convent Delegate was solemnly blessed and opened on 16 January 1921 by Fr WF Cahill, Administrator of Goulburn Cathedral, in the unavoidable absence of the Bishop, Dr John Gallagher. There was a very large and enthusiastic gathering of both Catholics and non-Catholics. It was an ideal summers day for the ceremony and the new convent and grounds were decorated with flags and bunting in honour of the occasion. The celebrations began with High Mass, sung by Fr Roche, at 11am in St Joseph's Church, at which Fr Cahill presided and preached an eloquent discourse on the gospel of the day. Special music was rendered by the choir under the direction of Duncan Campbell. At the Offertory, a violin obbligato was played by William Haydon. At 3pm Fr's Cahill and Roche, solemnly blessed and opened the new convent. After the religious ceremonies, Fr Roche said that for many years it had been the desire of the residents to have a convent in Delegate, and now that the desire had been granted, he was confident that the good Sisters of St Joseph, Sisters Josephine Cahill (who later became Mother General), Rodrigues Miller & Alphonsus Kirton, would receive the greatest hospitality and kindness from the people.

Fr Cahill congratulated the people on the very fine church at Delegate. The church and convent, he felt, would be a tax on the people, but still their hearts were in the right place. He hoped next time he came to Delegate he would see a magnificent school alongside the church on the hill. A subscription list was then opened and a collection taken up which amounted to £190 (approx \$16,000 in 2022).

The first Catholics arrived in the area from 1826 as assigned servants (convicts). Scottish, Irish, and later German immigrants built up the presence from 1833. Father Patrick Newman was the first resident priest in 1864. Prior to this, priests came from Queanbeyan and Cooma. Churches were built in Bombala 1867 & 1942 (St Mary's), Delegate 1877 & 1915, (St Joseph's), Cathcart 1878 (St John's) and Corrowong 1894 (St Peter's). Schools opened in 1866-1886 (privately Catholic), Bombala 1886 and Delegate 1921. In 1888 the Sisters of St Joseph of the Sacred Heart, North Sydney (St Mary MacKillop) arrived and have provided continuous ministry for 134 years. Monaro & South Coast Parishes were transferred from the Sydney Archdiocese to Goulburn Diocese in 1917 and to the Archdiocese of Canberra-Goulburn in 1948. Our first priestly vocation was Fr Ernest Baragry who was ordained as a Missionary of the Sacred Heart in 1941. Delegate was a Parish in its own right from 1954-1972. 2008 saw the welcoming of the World Youth Day Cross & Icon and the Consecration of St Mary's Church Bombala following repairs and restoration. St Joseph's Church Delegate celebrated its Centenary in 2015.

First Reading Is 62:1-5

As the bridegroom rejoices in his bride, so will your God rejoice in you.

Second Reading 1 Cor 12:4-11

One and the same spirit distributes different gifts as he chooses.

There is a variety of gifts but always the same Spirit; there are all sorts of service to be done, but always to the same Lord; working in all sorts of different ways in different people, it is the same God who is working in all of them. The particular way in which the Spirit is given to each person is for a good purpose. One may have the

gift of preaching with wisdom given him by the Spirit; another may have the gift of preaching instruction given him by the same Spirit; and another the gift of faith given by the same Spirit; another again the gift of healing, through this one Spirit; one, the power of miracles; another, prophecy; another the gift of recognising spirits; another the gift of tongues and another the ability to interpret them. All these are the work of one and the same Spirit, who distributes different gifts to different people just as he chooses.

Gospel Jn 2:1-11

The first of the signs given by Jesus was at Cana in Galilee.

There was a wedding at Cana in Galilee. The mother of Jesus was there, and Jesus and his disciples had also been invited. When they ran out of wine, since the wine provided for the wedding was all finished, the mother of Jesus said to him, 'They have no wine.' Jesus said, 'Woman, why turn to me? My hour has not come yet.' His mother said to the servants, 'Do whatever he tells you.' There were six stone water jars standing there, meant for the ablutions that are customary among the Jews; each could hold twenty or thirty gallons. Jesus said to the servants, 'Fill the jars with water,' and they filled them to the brim. 'Draw some out now' he told them, 'and take it to the steward.' They did this; the steward tasted the water, and it had turned into wine. Having no idea where it came from - only the servants who had drawn the water knew - the steward called the bridegroom and said, 'People generally serve the best wine first, and keep the cheaper sort till the guests have had plenty to drink, but you have kept the best wine till now."

Reflection by Fr Michael Tate

Today's gospel ends: 'He let his glory be seen.' Where? In a nondescript Galilean village at a wedding feast about to become a disaster for the couple. The wine is running out. A fiasco is impending. A hero was needed to step in and save the situation. Jesus and Mary are good candidates for hero status.

But, it is the servants who are the unsung heroes. They take a huge risk. They are going to look utterly stupid if they give the steward water to ladle out. Nevertheless, they follow the stranger's directions exactly and end up serving the best of wines, saving the couple from terrible embarrassment.

The Divine Glory is not going to enter people's lives with great pyrotechnics. Rather, when we do as Jesus requires, even if it looks ridiculous to the crowd, His healing and enhancing Presence can enter and save a situation of apparent disaster.

We could pause for a moment to pray for a certain naïve trust in the Lord as we follow his directions, so that Cana may enter someone's life, so that His glory may be seen.
