



### LOOKING BACK 71 YEARS AGO December 1953 Around the Parish

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**New Rooms Bombala:** The new classroom and club rooms at the Bombala Convent School are making good progress. Walls are halfway up and already the great advantage of the new building can be seen. It is hoped that the opening will take place sometime in February and that all old pupils will be present at the ceremony.

**Council Elections:** Congratulations to the parishioners elected to local government bodies in the parish. At Nimmitabel, Bob Adams was returned to the Monaro Shire council and at Bombala, Rowley Bedingfield, John Parkes and Paddy Lomas find themselves Aldermen. A pleasing feature of their success is that none of these men over their election organised any canvassing for votes.

**Delegate Water:** While on civic matters, hats off to Delegate for giving a lead in cooperative effort. Tired of waiting for a town water supply, half a dozen householders put their heads and shoulders together and decided that they could pipe the crystal-clear Delegate River to their homes for little cost. Under the watchful eye of Keith Cottrell, they installed a water pump a storage tank and pipes to seven houses including the convent. It was a magnificent example of intelligent cooperation and the whole project was completed within a fortnight. Cost to each man £27. Snowy Mountains Authority take note.

**Bombala Bazaar:** The old date of the Bombala Bazaar has been kept and on November 28 a fete will be held in the Bombala church grounds. There will be square dancing in the open, Tug O' War Championship, Wheelbarrow Race, Musical Chairs, and a whole programme of entertainment and novelty sports. Stalls and soft drink bars will be in operation also the chocolate wheel. Good prizes will be given for the competitions, especially for the Tug O' War , which we hope will be between teams from Bombala, Nimmitabel and Delegate. Music to follow.

The wise old Mother Superior from County Tipperary was unwell. The nuns gathered around her bed, endeavoring to make her comfortable.



#### BOMBALA-DELEGATE CATHOLIC PARISH - IN THE MONARO MISSION Country of the Bidwell, Ngarigo and Yuin People



The inaugural Catholics to settle in the region arrived in 1826 as designated servants, primarily convicts. The community's foundation expanded with the influx of Scottish, Irish and subsequently German immigrants starting in 1833. Father Patrick Newman assumed the role of the first resident priest in 1864, succeeding a period during which priests were dispatched from Queanbeyan and Cooma. Churches were erected to serve the growing Catholic population, including St Mary's Bombala in 1867 & 1942, St Joseph's Delegate 1877 & 1915, St John's Cathcart in 1878 and St Peter's Corrowong in 1894. Educational institutions also emerged with privately Catholic schools opening between 1866 and 1886, followed by the establishment of Catholic schools in Bombala in 1886 and Delegate in 1921. In 1888, the Sisters of St Joseph of the Sacred Heart (North Sydney) co-founded by St Mary MacKillop, arrived, embarking on a continuous ministry that spanned 134 years. Monaro & South Coast Parishes transitioned from the Sydney Archdiocese to the Goulburn Diocese in 1917 and later to the Archdiocese of Canberra-Goulburn in 1948. The first local priestly vocation was Fr Ernest Baragry, ordained as a Missionary of the Sacred Heart in 1941. The Parish of Delegate operated independently from 1955 to 1973.

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Significant events marked parish history in 2008, including the arrival of the World Youth Day Cross & Icon and the Consecration of St Mary's Church Bombala following extensive repairs and restoration. St Joseph's Church Delegate commemorated its Centenary in 2015.

## First Sunday of Lent, Year B

#### First Reading Gn 9:8-15

I will recall the covenant between myself and you...the waters shall never again become a flood to destroy all flesh.

God spoke to Noah and his sons, 'See, I establish my Covenant with you, and with your descendants after you; also with every living creature to be found with you, birds, cattle and every wild beast with you: everything that came out of the ark, everything that lives on the earth. I establish my Covenant with you: no thing of flesh shall be swept away again by the waters of the flood. There shall be no flood to destroy the earth again.'

God said, 'Here is the sign of the Covenant I make between myself and you and every living creature with you for all generations: I set my bow in the clouds and it shall be a sign of the Covenant between me and the earth. When I gather the clouds over the earth and the bow appears in the clouds, I will recall the Covenant between myself and you and every living creature of every kind. And so the waters shall never again become a flood to destroy all things of flesh.'

#### Second Reading 1 Pt 3:18-22

The water of the flood is a type of the baptism which saves you now.

Christ himself, innocent though he was, died once for sins, died for the guilty, to lead us to God. In the body he was put to death, in the spirit he was raised to life, and, in the spirit, he went to preach to the spirits in prison. Now it was long ago, when Noah was still building that ark which saved only a small group of eight people 'by water', and when God was still waiting patiently, that these spirits refused to believe. That water is a type of the baptism which saves you now, and which is not the washing off of physical dirt but a pledge made to God from a good conscience, through the resurrection of Jesus Christ, who has entered heaven and is at God's right hand, now that he has made the angels and Dominations and Powers his subjects.


#### Gospel Mk 1:12-15

Reflection by Fr Michael Tate

The Rainbow is God's signature to a treaty with humankind. On God's part, material forces will never be sent to annihilate human beings as a punishment for wrongdoing. On our part, as humans made in the likeness of God, we are to image God's rainbow relationship to nature.

This is the Divine Treaty basis of our responsibility for the environment. We undertake not to engage in practices or support policies which could severely damage the fragile ecology which supports life on our planet. The deforestation of the slopes of the Himalayas, leading to floods which kill thousands, is a catastrophic example.

And, gazing at the rainbow, we can pray for our planet, for the human beings and all other creatures who inhabit it, and quite often for ourselves at a deep personal level. For we know that, just as after a storm and dark clouds, light penetrates the misty sky and the beautiful bow of colour appears, the same phenomenon can occur in our own lives.

We could take a moment to pray that the rainbow will appear, perhaps for ourselves, perhaps for others we know who are going through a stormy time.
