## Looking Back 103 Years – 19 Nov 1920 Delegate Euchre Party and Dance

Euchre Party and Dance in Delegate School of Arts on Friday, Nov. 19, 1920 PROCEEDS IN AID OF THE New Convent at Delegate Good Music and Refreshments PRICES : GENTS 3s, LADIES 2s, MISSA. CAMPBELL Joint Hon. Secs The euchre party and dance held in the School of Arts on Friday night last in aid of the Delegate Convent funds was a pleasant and successful function. The euchre commenced at about 8.30pm with seventeen tables being in play, the tournament concluding at about 11pm. Dancing was commenced soon after the termination of cards and was soon going merrily with about 45 couples dancing.

For the lady's prize Mrs L Brown and Miss E Wilson were a tie with 10 games each and divided the prize (a pair of doyleys). Messrs L Bronx and W Wolfe tied for the gent's prize with 10 games each and played off, W Wolfe being the winner. The prize was a thermos flask. Mr A Cannington had charge of the euchre tournament and Mr H Gunn was doorkeeper. Excellent music was supplied by a number of those present, and the floor was in good order. At about midnight supper was served, after which dancing was resumed and continued until the early hours.

# Annual Mary MacKillop Pilgrimage to Eden - 19 August 2023



It's that time of the year again. The Catholic Parish of Pambula invites members of our community to join with Archbishop Christopher Prowse and other pilgrims as he journeys to Eden on Saturday 19 August for his annual pilgrimage to commemorate Australia's first saint - Saint Mary of the Cross MacKillop.

This pilgrimage will commemorate Saint Mary of the Cross MacKillop, at the site she visited on two separate occasions, in 1899 and 1901. Saint Mary has played a very significant role in the establishment of Catholic education in our archdiocese and this pilgrimage is an opportunity to give thanks for the work done in Catholic education and honour Australia's first saint.

A summary of the program for the day:

- 11.00am (optional) Pilgrim's walk from Eden AFL grounds to Our Lady Star of the Sea Church. Refreshments will be available at Church.
- 12.00 noon Concelebrated Mass with Archbishop Christopher and visiting priests.

The Sisters of St Joseph first came to this area with a community established at Bombala in 1887 followed by Eden 1891, Candelo 1900, Nimmitabel 1902, Adaminaby 1918, Cobargo 1918, Delegate 1921, Bega 1927, Bemboka 1951 and Motor Misson at Jindabyne in 1960 (relocated to Nimmitabel 1970). Mary MacKillop visited the sisters and schools at Bombala, Candelo, Eden and Nimmitabel.

#### First Reading 2 Kgs 4:8-11. 14-16

That is the holy man of God, let him remain there.

One day as Elisha was on his way to Shunem, a woman of rank who lived there pressed him to stay and eat there. After this he always broke his journey for a meal when he passed that way. She said to her husband, 'Look, I am sure the man who is constantly passing our way must be a holy man of God. Let us build him a small room on the roof, and put him a bed in it, and a table and chair and lamp; whenever he comes to us he can rest there.'

One day when he came, he retired to the upper room and lay down. 'What can be done for her?' he asked. Gehazi (his servant) answered, 'Well, she has no son and her husband is old.' #### Second Reading Rom 6:3-4. 8-11

Having been buried with him through baptism, we shall walk in a new life.

When we were baptised in Christ Jesus we were baptised in his death; in other words, when we were baptised we went into the tomb with him and joined him in death, so that as Christ was raised from the dead by the Father's glory, we too might live a new life.

But we believe that having died with Christ we shall return to life with him: Christ, as we know, having been raised from the dead will never die again. Death has no power over him any more. When he died, he died, once for all, to sin, so his life now is life with God; and in that way, you too must consider yourselves to be dead to sin but alive for God in Christ Jesus.

### Gospel Acclamation 1 Pt 2:9

#### Alleluia, alleluia!

You are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy people.

Praise God who called you out of darkness and into his marvellous light.

#### Gospel Mt 10:37-42

Anyone who does not accept his cross is not worthy of me. Anyone who welcomes you, welcomes me.

Jesus instructed the Twelve as follows: 'Anyone who prefers father or mother to me is not worthy of me. Anyone who prefers son or daughter to me is not worthy of me. Anyone who does not take his cross and follow in my footsteps is not worthy of me. Anyone who finds his life will lose it; anyone who loses his life for my sake will find it.

'Anyone who welcomes you welcomes me; and those who welcome me welcome the one who sent me.

'Anyone who welcomes a prophet because he is a prophet will have a prophet's reward; and anyone who welcomes a holy man because he is a holy man will have a holy man's reward.

'If anyone gives so much as a cup of cold water to one of these little ones because he is a disciple, then I tell you solemnly, he will most certainly not lose his reward.'

Reflection by Fr Michael Tate

In the early Church, Christianity ripped families apart. Good Jewish families would have been appalled to see their sons and daughters go off follow to а crucified blasphemer. Good reason to keep apart in the synagogue, avoiding damnable pollution. This sectarianism contrasted with the Christians who fearlessly went out into the world.

St John Paul II personified what it is to be Catholic. But, he pressed a prayer into a crack in the Wailing Wall in Jerusalem and as an old man shuffled across the floor of a Mosque in Syria.

Of course. there was no compromise of belief and faith in the resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ, denied by both Jews and Muslims. But his actions were not those of one with the siege mentality of the member of a cult. Rather, he was able to respond to the promptings of the Holy Spirit to take these steps recognising what was good amongst the adherents of those faiths.

We could pause for a moment to implore the Holy Spirit to break us out from any constricting cult-like tendencies so that we can go out into the world powerfully proclaiming the resurrection of Our Lord Jesus Christ.
