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

OCTOBER – THE MONTH OF THE HOLY ROSARY

The Catholic Church traditionally dedicates each month to a specific devotion, with October dedicated to the Holy Rosary. The month includes the Feast of Our Lady of the Rosary on October 7, commemorating the 1571 victory of Catholic naval forces over the Turkish fleet at the Battle of Lepanto. This victory, attributed to the intercession of the Blessed Virgin Mary and the Rosary, marked a turning point in preventing the Islamic invasion of Europe. Celebrating October by praying the Rosary honours this devotion.

LOOKING BACK 14 YEARS AGO Bombala-Delegate Catholic Parish begins celebrations for Mary MacKillop Canonisation.

Mayor Bob Stewart officially launched the much anticipated Cheese and Wine Evening, marking the commencement of Bombala's celebrations for the canonisation of Mary MacKillop. In his opening remarks, he shared that "the council is preparing a series of tributes to honour the Sisters of Saint Joseph and to celebrate the sainthood of Mary MacKillop, who visited Bombala in both 1899 and 1901." The Bombala-Delegate community proudly acknowledges the lasting impact of 123 years of dedicated service from 105 Sisters of Saint Joseph in Bombala, and 60 in Delegate, all of whom have upheld Mary MacKillop's spirit and legacy in the region to this day. Present to welcome the Mayor was Sr Helen Madden rsj, the current pastoral associate of the parish. She graciously presented him with a commemorative bottle of Saddleback Mountain Red wine from Crooked River Winery, Gerringong. The wine's name carries a special connection to Mary MacKillop, as it evokes Saddleback Mountain, which overlooks Jamberoo Valley, where she established a school in 1883. Reflecting on this, Sr Helen remarked, "I'm certain that Mary often looked up toward that mountain, seeking God's guidance in her work." During her visits to Bombala in 1899 and 1901, Mary MacKillop stayed at the original Convent, which now serves as Lavender House and Information Centre, a living testament to her presence in the community. Sr Helen encouraged attendees to visit Lavender House, inviting them to "take a moment from your busy lives to walk through its grounds, stroll quietly along its corridors, and reflect in its rooms. Perhaps, as you do, Mary MacKillop's spirit will touch your heart, inspiring you to walk beside someone in need, a person who is homeless, someone who is unwell or elderly, a young soul searching for meaning, or anyone vulnerable." The next event in the parish celebrations is planned for October 9 in Delegate. This special day will feature an Open Garden and another delightful Cheese and Wine Tasting, continuing the community's tribute to Mary MacKillop's enduring legacy.

Gospel Mk 10:35-45 (or shorter form Mk 10:42-45)

The Son of Man came to give his life as a ransom for all.

James and John, the sons of Zebedee, approached Jesus. 'Master,' they said to him, 'we want you to do us a favour.' He said to them, 'What is it you want me to do for you?' They said to him, 'Allow us to sit one at your right hand and the other at your left in your glory.' 'You do not know what you are asking' Jesus said to them. 'Can you drink the cup that I must drink, or be baptised with the baptism with which I must be baptised?' They replied, 'We can.' Jesus said to them, 'The cup that I must drink you shall drink, and with the baptism with which I must be baptised you shall be baptised, but as for seats at my right hand or my left, these are not mine to grant; they belong to those to whom they have been allotted.'

When the other ten heard this they began to feel indignant with James and John, so Jesus called them to him and said to them: 'You know that among the pagans their socalled rulers lord it over them, and their great men make their authority felt. This is not to happen among you. No; anyone who wants to become great among you must be your servant, and anyone who wants to be first among you must be slave to all. For the Son of Man himself did not come to be served but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many.'

Reflection by Fr Michael Tate

The sons of Zebedee expected Jesus to lead a Messianic revolt to throw off the yoke of imperial Rome. But they wanted to be part of a similar sort of power structure. They had not grasped that Jesus had come to turn that sort of society upside down.

However, over the centuries, the Church took on much of the trappings of power of imperial Rome. The popes governed much of Italy. Giuseppe Garibaldi was one of those generals who defeated the forces defending the Papal States, and in doing so actually liberated the papacy from its role as feudal overlord of much of Italy.

In the course of the campaign, when despondent, Garibaldi often reflected on the delightful time he spent on Three Hummock Island just off the coast of Tasmania. So we may say that the liberation of the papacy, enabling it to respond more clearly to today's Gospel, began in Tasmania!

Pope Francis embodies the spirit of today's Gospel. He rails against a Church exhibiting 'the leprosy of a feudal court'. Rather, he has said: 'I see the Church as a field hospital after battle. Heal the wounds, heal the wounds.' And in his actions he has shown himself as a true 'Servant of the servants of God' as Jesus commands in today's Gospel.

We may pause for a moment to pray for Pope Francis that he may have the strength and time to persevere in his responding to today's Gospel so that the papacy may be truly liberated so as to practise a radically different way of exercising leadership in the Church and for the world.
