


FOR THE WEEK


FINDING GOD IN OUR WORLD Make me a channel of your peace

LOOKING BACK 182 YEARS AGO January 1842 BIRTH OF MARY MACKILLOP



Mary Helen MacKillop was born on 15 January 1842 in the Melbourne suburb of Fitzroy, Victoria, back when it was known as Newtown, within the British colony of New South Wales. She was born to Alexander MacKillop and Flora MacDonald. Alexander, hailing from Perthshire, Scotland, embarked on his journey toward priesthood at the tender age of twelve. However, at 29, just before his ordination, he left his studies, migrated to Australia, and arrived in Sydney in 1838. Flora MacDonald, Mary's mother, born in Scotland, made her way to Melbourne in 1840. The union of Alexander and Flora took place in 1843, and Mary, their first born, was the eldest among their eight children. Mary's siblings included Margaret ("Maggie," 1843-1872), John (1845-1867), Annie (1848-1929), Alexandrina ("Lexie," 1850-1882), Donald (1853-1925), Alick (who passed away at 11 months old), and Peter (1857-1878). Donald would later become a Jesuit priest, dedicating himself to working among the Aboriginal peoples in the Northern Territory, while Lexie joined the Good Shepherd Sisters in Melbourne. The impact of Mary's commitment to education extended through the Sisters of St Joseph, who established over 30 convents and schools in the Archdiocese of Canberra-Goulburn. These included Taralga in 1884, Bombala in 1887, Nimmitabel in 1902, Adaminaby in 1918, Delegate in 1921 and the Jindabyne Motor Mission in 1960 (later relocated to Nimmitabel). Today, we express gratitude for Mary and her sisters whose foresight emphasised the importance of providing education to children in rural and remote areas.

First Reading Jon 3:1-5. 10

The Ninevites renounced their evil ways.

The word of the Lord was addressed to Jonah: 'Up!' he said 'Go to Nineveh, the great city, and preach to them as I told you to.' Jonah set out and went to Nineveh in obedience to the word of the Lord. Now Nineveh was a city great beyond compare: it took three days to cross it. Jonah went on into the city, making a day's journey. He preached in these words, 'Only forty days more and Nineveh is going to be destroyed.' And the people of Nineveh believed in God; they proclaimed a fast and put on sackcloth, from the greatest to the least.

God saw their efforts to renounce their evil behaviour. And God relented: he did not inflict on them the disaster which he had threatened.

Responsorial Psalm Ps 24:4-9. R. v.4

(R.) Teach me your ways, O Lord.

The world as we know it is passing away.

Brothers, our time is growing short. Those who have wives should live as though they had none, and those who mourn should live as though they had nothing to mourn for; those who are enjoying life should live as though there were nothing to laugh about; those whose life is buying things should live as though they had nothing of their own; and those who have to deal with the world should not become engrossed in it. I say this because the world as we know it is passing away.

Repent, and believe the Good News.

As he was walking along by the Sea of Galilee he saw Simon and his brother Andrew casting a net in the lake - for they were fishermen. And Jesus said to them, 'Follow me and I will make you into fishers of men.' And at once they left their nets and followed him.

Going on a little further, he saw James son of Zebedee and his brother John; they too were in their boat, mending their nets. He called them at once and, leaving their father Zebedee in the boat with the men he employed, they went after him.

Reflection by Fr Michael Tate

When Jesus says to Simon, Andrew, James and John 'I will make you into fishers of men', then, amongst the many levels of meaning they would have heard the allusion to Ezekiel 29:3-5.

Jesus was telling them that he was creating a society of liberated human beings, called the 'Kingdom of God'. This would involve struggle powerful elites. against the pharaohs of this world. who oppress and enslave people. It would be as dangerous and demand as much energy as required to haul a crocodile out of the Nile.

Yet they did so, 'straightaway'. Because of the call of Jesus? No. At least, not that alone. We read 'He saw Simon and his brother Andrew . . . He saw James and his brother John.' Thev were responding not to his voice alone but to his eyes. His is like the attentive gaze of a parent loving a baby into a beautiful future. Jesus looks at you and at me wanting to love us into a barely imaginable future.

We could pause for a moment to remember that when His call comes, demanding an 'aye' or a 'nay', the Eyes have it.

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
