A young boy had just gotten his driving permit. He asked his father who was a minister, if they could discuss the use of the car. His father took him to his study and said to him, "I'll make a deal with you. You bring your grades up, study your bible a little and get your hair cut and we'll talk about it." After about a month the boy came back and again asked his father if they could discuss use of the car. They again went to the father's study where his father said, "Son, I've been real proud of you. You have brought your grades up, you've studied your bible diligently, but you didn't get your hair cut." The young man waited a moment and replied, "You know Dad, I've been thinking about that.

You know, Samson had long hair, Moses had long hair, Noah had long hair, and even Jesus had long hair!", to which is father replied, "Yes, you're right, and they also WALKED everywhere they went."





We recently concluded the first assembly (of 2), of the 5th Plenary Council of Australia, and now coincidently (and providentially!), the universal Church begins a similar process. This weekend, dioceses around the world mark the opening of the two-year process called "a synod on synodality," officially known as "Synod 2021-2023: For a Synodal Church."

A synod is a gathering that helps the Church to walk forward together. The word synod itself comes from the Greek and images a walking together on the same path. Synods were common in the early centuries of Christianity. In 1965, Paul VI instituted the Synod of Bishops, wanting to continue the collegial exchange present at Vatican II (1962-65). Since then, synods have occurred every two or three years focusing on topics from the Eucharist, to the new evangelization, to the family, and youth. Unlike past synods however, this one won't address a particular issue but will focus on who God is calling us to be as a Church, together, here and now, and into the future. Suffice to say, the whole Church now asks the question we've been asking in Australia during our own plenary journey.

This Synod is also unprecedented, in that it aims at giving the entire Church a lived experience of synodality. It isn't about filling in a questionnaire, nor just to talk about synodality, but putting it into practice in every parish, diocese, and the world – hence beginning the unique listening process spanning 2 years. Synodality is no passing phase! Rather, as Archbishop Christopher reminds us, synodality is about "walking together" and is at the heart of who the Church is, it is the "language of our Church" as the pilgrim people of God. Saint John Chrysostom once said that "Church" and "synod" were synonyms, since the Church is all about walking together. Let us pray for this gift to the universal Church, for synodality is a way of renewing the Church from her deepest roots, in order to be more united with one another and better carry out Her mission. For as Pope Francis writes, in a "mutual listening...everyone has something to learn. The lay faithful, the bishops, the pope; all listening to each other, and all listening to the Holy Spirit, the "Spirit of truth" (Jn 14:17), in order to know what He is saying to the Church".

#### LOOKING BACK 45 YEARS AGO Bombala Eclipse, Saturday 23 October 1976

Scientists and sightseers from all over the world had converged on Bombala to witness one of the "astronomical wonders of the century": a total eclipse of the sun.

Scientists at Bombala described the total eclipse as one of the astronomical wonders of the century. And thousands of sightseers who descended upon the "blackout" belt across southern NSW were ecstatic as the eclipse turned day into night about 4.45pm. Champagne corks popped at the crowded Bombala Racecourse, where thousands had a grandstand view of the long-awaited spectacle at a "blackout" sports day. By mid-afternoon, eclipse watchers waited anxiously for the first of four phases of the eclipse, when the edge of the moon nicked the eastern side of the sun. The sky gradually darkened as the moon continued its journey across the face of the sun, casting a shadow on the earth. The sun was reduced to a vanishing crescent and daylight slowly changed to an eerie moonlight.

Astronomers described it "as if a storm were approaching." At exactly 4.42pm a wave of darkness swept over Bombala blacking out the small township and lasted for two minutes, 45 seconds. The sunlight then slowly returned and the four phases repeated themselves in reverse order. Full light returned about 5.15pm.



Until about the 15th century, hundreds of mysteries were part of the Rosary devotion. The 15 mysteries that we know today, were definitively fixed as the Mysteries of the Rosary.

In 2002, Pope John Paul II, added the five Luminous Mysteries. Through the meditations of the complete Rosary one recalls and has impressed on their mind, "the chief mysteries of the Christian religion," "the mysteries of our Redemption," "the great mysteries of Jesus and His Mother united in joys, sorrows, and triumphs." The twenty mysteries are divided into four equal groups, known as "The Joyful," "The Sorrowful," "The Glorious," and "The Luminous Mysteries".

The Luminous Mysteries are :-

- 1. The Baptism of the Lord
- 2. The Wedding at Cana
- 3. The Proclamation of the Kingdom
- 4. The Transfiguration
- 5. The Institution of the Eucharist

#### BOMBALA-DELEGATE CATHOLIC PARISH - IN THE MONARO MISSION Country of the Bidwell, Ngarigo and Yuin People



The first Catholics arrived in the area from 1826 as assigned servants (convicts). Scottish, Irish, and later German immigrants built up the presence from 1833. Father Patrick Newman was the first resident priest in 1864. Prior to this, priests travelled from Queanbeyan and Cooma. Churches were built in Bombala 1867 & 1942 (St Mary's), Delegate 1877 & 1915 (St Joseph's), Cathcart 1878 (St John's) and Corrowong 1894 (St Peter's). Schools opened in 1866-1886 (privately Catholic), Bombala 1886 and Delegate 1921. In 1888 the Sisters of St Joseph of the Sacred Heart, North Sydney (St Mary MacKillop) arrived and have provided continuous ministry for 133 years. Monaro & South Coast Parishes were transferred from the Sydney Archdiocese to Goulburn Diocese in 1917 and to the Archdiocese of Canberra-Goulburn in 1948. Our first priestly vocation was Fr Ernest Baragry who was ordained as a Missionary of the Sacred Heart in 1941. Delegate was a Parish in its own right from 1954-1972. 2008 saw the welcoming of the World Youth Day Cross & Icon and the Consecration of St Mary's Church Bombala following repairs and restoration. St Joseph's Church Delegate celebrated its Centenary in 2015.

You are a priest forever in the line of Melchizedek.

Every high priest has been taken out of mankind and is appointed to act for men in their relations with God, to offer gifts and sacrifices for sins; and so he can sympathise with those who are ignorant or uncertain because he too lives in the limitations of weakness. That is why he has to make sin offerings for himself as well as for the people. No one takes this honour on himself, but each one is called by God, as Aaron was. Nor did Christ give himself the glory of becoming high priest, but he had it from the one who said to him: You are my son, today I have become your father, and in another text: You are a priest of the order of Melchizedek, and for ever.

#### Gospel Mk 10:46-52

Master, grant that I may see.

As Jesus left Jericho with his disciples and a large crowd, Bartimaeus (that is, the son of Timaeus), a blind beggar, was sitting at the side of the road. When he heard that it was Jesus of Nazareth, he began to shout and to say, 'Son of David, Jesus, have pity on me.' And many of them scolded him and told him to keep quiet, but he only shouted all the louder, 'Son of David, have pity on me.' Jesus stopped and said, 'Call him here.' So they called the blind man. 'Courage,' they said 'get up; he is calling you.' So throwing off his cloak, he jumped up and went to Jesus. Then Jesus spoke, 'What do you want me to do for you?' 'Rabbuni,' the blind man said to him 'Master, let me see again.' Jesus said to him, 'Go; your faith has saved you.' And immediately his sight returned and he followed him along the road.

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#### Reflection by Fr Michael Tate

Bartimaeus sat on the side of the way, having pilgrims throw coins onto his cloak spread out before him. But the presence of Jesus encouraged him to abandon his cloak, jump up from his ground level existence and ask to truly see the way from Jesus' perspective.

Jesus responded to this act of faith by curing the disease so that Bartimaeus could see ahead in the same way as Jesus and follow him on 'the Way' (the earliest name for Christianity).

You and I can remain with the security of a familiar existence, hoping to be tossed a few coins of consolation to satisfy our various hungers. But Jesus wants us to take courage, to jump up and to share his vision.

This takes faith, but we are in a better situation than Bartimaeus. He knew only that Jesus was on the way from Jericho to Jerusalem. We believe that, in Jerusalem, Jesus was lifted well above ground level and then had the astounding victory over the worst that death could do.

We might pause for a moment to pray for the courage to abandon whatever is keeping us grounded, so that with Bishop Richard of Chichester we may see Christ more clearly, love him more dearly, and follow him more nearly.

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
