






FINDING GOD IN OUR WORLD Be kind to yourself

LOOKING BACK 105 YEARS AGO September 1918 NEW CONVENT AND SCHOOL AT BOMBALA


The Rev. Father John A Roche, of Bombala, who last year completed and renovated the old historic church of Nimmitabel at a cost of £869, is still very active in the cause of religion in his extensive parish. At Bombala a new convent and school is in the course of erection, costing over £2000. The foundation-stone of a new school will be blessed by his Lordship Dr Gallagher (Bishop of Goulburn) on Sunday, October 27. A few Sundays ago Father Roche established the Catholic Federation at Nimmitabel, over 100 members joining the first day, and it is expected to have in a short time at least 300 members on the roll. On Sunday last Father Roche established a branch ol the Hibernian Australasian Catholic Benefit Society at Delegate, 51 new members joining, and a number of honorary members.



The new Church liturgical year has begun. As with the secular change to a calendar year many of us make resolutions to be 'better'. We want to put the mistakes of the past year behind us and to look forward to the new year with hope.

Advent itself is a time of waiting – 'a way of life in which we wait on God's Word, a space for reflection in the business of our daily lives'. Advent gives way to Christmas. That is a time to look forward to and to celebrate, as people look forward to a Grand Final with a packed stadium. The first Christmas was a quiet occasion in which the celebrating took place deep within human hearts. It had the intensity of joy that comes with the birth of a newborn and eagerly awaited baby at the end of a hard pregnancy. That joy spread and changed the world. The first Catholics arrived in the area from 1826 as assigned servants (convicts). Scottish, Irish, and later German immigrants built up the presence from 1833. Father Patrick Newman was the first resident priest in 1864. Prior to this, priests travelled from Queanbeyan and Cooma. Churches were built in Bombala 1867 & 1942 (St Mary's), Delegate 1877 & 1915(St Joseph's), Cathcart 1878 (St John's) and Corrowong 1894 (St Peter's). Schools opened in 1866-1886 (privately Catholic), Bombala 1886 and Delegate 1921. In 1888 the Sisters of Saint Joseph of the Sacred Heart, North Sydney (St Mary MacKillop) arrived and provided continuous ministry for 133 years. Monaro & South Coast Parishes were transferred from the Sydney Archdiocese to Goulburn Diocese in 1917 and to the Archdiocese of Canberra-Goulburn in 1948. Our first priestly vocation was Fr Ernest Baragry who was ordained as a Missionary of the Sacred Heart in 1941. Delegate was a Parish in its own right from 1955-1973. 2008 saw the welcoming of the World Youth Day Cross & Icon and the Consecration of St Mary's Church Bombala following repairs and restoration. St Joseph's Church Delegate celebrated its Centenary in 2015.

Jesus said to his disciples: 'Be on your guard, stay awake, because you never know when the time will come. It is like a man travelling abroad: he has gone from home, and left his servants in charge, each with his own task; and he has told the doorkeeper to stay awake. So stay awake, because you do not know when the master of the house is coming, evening, midnight, cockcrow, dawn; if he comes unexpectedly, he must not find you asleep. And what I say to you I say to all: Stay awake!'

Stay awake! With these words, Jesus cautions his disciples to be constantly vigilant and to be alert to the return of the Lord. It is a very fitting way to begin the season of Advent. Advent has traditionally been observed as a time of preparation and waiting. It culminates in the Christmas season and so the waiting and preparation is related to the celebration of the coming of Christ into the world.

Perhaps the time of preparation this Advent is also a call to stay awake and stay alert in faith. One of the great challenges to faith today is the complacency that has taken hold of many in our society. When life is comfortable, the perceived need for faith appears to diminish. Many young people in our society cannot see the value of religious belief or religious practice. In a world of instant communication and instant 'satisfaction', the reflective and slow work of faith can seem too much effort for some people. The gospel call to stay awake in preparation for the coming of the Lord is a call to continue the work of bringing about the Kingdom of God.

Over the last three weeks, the gospel passages from Matthew 25 were reminders about continuing to prepare for the coming of the Kingdom. This week, with the beginning of Advent, it is the gospel of Mark that also reminds us that we cannot take the Kingdom for granted and must remain vigilant in working to realise the Kingdom. This vigilance needs to be applied to nurturing our own faith life as well as making a difference in the lives of those around us and the needy in society. Rather than 'Stay awake!' maybe some of us need to be told, 'Wake up!' It is never too late to pay closer attention to faith and perhaps this Advent is an ideal time to do that.
