FEBRUARY - MONTH OF THE HOLY FAMILY

The month of February is dedicated to the Holy Family. The special devotion which proposes the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph as the model of virtue of all Christian households began in the 17th century. It started almost simultaneously in Canada and France: the Association of the Holy Family was founded in Montreal in 1663, and by the Daughters of the Holy Family in Paris in 1674. This devotion soon spread and in 1893 Pope Leo XIII expressed his approval of a feast under this title and himself composed part of the Office. In the words of His Holiness Pope Leo XIII, "Nothing truly can be more salutary or efficacious for Christian families to meditate upon than the example of this Holy Family, which embraces the perfection and completeness of all domestic virtues."

Delegate Convent School staged their Breakup Concert at the Delegate School of Arts Hall and what a magnificent effort it was. The community of two Sisters deserves great congratulations. Outstanding items were the "Water Lillies" scene by the big girls, the very smart physical culture display by the boys and the lovely frocking and singing of the pantomine "Cinderella". The clear enunciation of the children was remarked on favourably by the big crowd present with £55 taken at the door (approx.\$ 2,286 in 2023). Message from Our Lady, Queen of Peace of Medjugorje



"Dear children! Pray with me for peace because Satan wants war and hatred in hearts and peoples. Therefore, pray and sacrifice your days by fasting and penance, that God may give you peace. The future is at a crossroads because modern man does not want God. That is why mankind is heading to perdition. You, little children, are my hope. Our Lady of Medjugorje, also called Queen of Peace and Mother of the Redeemer, is the title given to visions of Mary which began in 1981 to six Herzegovinian Croat teenagers in Medjugorje, Bosnia and Herzegovina (at the time it was Yugoslavia).

THE ANTI-BEATITUDES

Sometimes we need to see the opposite of something to get a proper understanding of it. Imagine the horror of the beatitudes if they went like this:

- Happy are the rich: because they can have whatever they want.
- Happy are the strong: for they have no need for others.
- Happy are the cheerful: for they are in a good mood.
- Happy are the uncaring: for they will not be upset.
- Happy are the cruel: for they are not affected by others.
- Happy the divisive: because they will get their own way.
- Happy are those who are assisted in the cause of right: for they have friends here to help them.
- Happy are you when nobody bothers you.

Rejoice and be glad because you can do as you please. Perhaps we do not need to imagine it at all, for many of us this is just the way our world works. It's a system built on selfishness which offers us at best a temporary life of temporary pleasure. It is true that what Jesus' offers us is less comfortable than these anti-beatitudes, but his promise is so much greater: We will see God, we will be called his sons, our reward with him will be great, and our sufferings will bring us everlasting joy. Fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year A

5 February 2023

First Reading Is 58:7-10

Your light will shine like the dawn.

Thus says the Lord:

Share your bread with the hungry, and shelter the homeless poor, clothe the man you see to be naked and turn not from your own kin. Then will your light shine like the dawn and your wound be quickly healed over.

Your integrity will go before you and the glory of the Lord behind you. Cry, and the Lord will answer; call, and he will say, 'I am here.'

If you do away with the yoke, the clenched fist, the wicked word, if you give your bread to the hungry, and relief to the oppressed, your light will rise in the darkness, and your shadows become like noon.

Responsorial Psalm Ps 111:4-9. R. v.4

(R.) A light rises in the darkness for the upright.

or

(R.) Alleluia!

 He is a light in the darkness for the upright: he is generous, merciful and just.

The good man takes pity and lends, he conducts his affairs with honour (R.)

Second Reading 1 Cor 2:1-5

I came to you to proclaim Christ crucified.

When I came to you, brothers, it was not with any show of oratory or philosophy, but simply to tell you what God had guaranteed. During my stay with you, the only knowledge I claimed to have was about Jesus, and only about him as the crucified Christ. Far from relying on any power of my own, I came among you in great 'fear and trembling' and in my speeches and the sermons that I gave, there were none of the arguments that belong to philosophy; only a demonstration of the power of the Spirit. And I did this so that your faith should not depend on human philosophy but on the power of God.

Gospel Mt 5:13-16

You are the light of the world.

Jesus said to his disciples: 'You are the salt of the earth. But if salt becomes tasteless, what can make it salty again? It is good for nothing, and can only be thrown out to be trampled underfoot by men.

'You are the light of the world. A city built on a hill-top cannot be hidden. No one lights a lamp to put it under a tub; they put it on the lamp-stand where it shines for everyone in the house. In the same way your light must shine in the sight of men, so that, seeing your good works, they may give the praise to your Father in heaven.'



Reflection by Fr Michael Tate

You are the salt of the earth, you are the light of the cosmos. 'You' is in the plural. So these descriptions are meant to apply to us as a Christian community.

Salt in the ancient world was a preservative for food. So, we are the ones who are to preserve the earth, to prevent its deterioration, to keep it life-giving.

Salt has to penetrate food to have an effect. We have to penetrate the world with our Sermon on the Mount values. Staying self-contained as a perfect little band of Christians is about as useful as salt remaining in the saltshaker. In Our Lord's scary opinion we would quite rightly be trampled underfoot.

How are we light for the cosmos? By 'good works'? No, a truer translation is by 'beautiful works'. These are those things we do which have grace, elegance and proportion and are therefore pleasing to observe: beautifully-good-works.

We could pause for a moment to pray that we remain salty and tangy, doing good beautifully and elegantly.

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
