

Archbishop Francis Carroll, who served as Bishop of Wagga Wagga and Archbishop of Canberra and Goulburn during almost 70 years of distinguished priestly service has died in Wagga Wagga at the age of 93. Born on 9 September 1930 in Ganmain, NSW, he was the second of seven children of Patrick and Rose Carroll. In 1983, he was appointed Archbishop of Canberra and Goulburn until 2006. He has always been regarded as profoundly pastoral and humble in his long service to the Church. In 2006, he retired and returned to Wagga Wagga. Rest in Peace Fr Francis.

Leaning into love



ST JOSEPH'S CATHOLIC CHURCH WYNDHAM

The end of an era March 2024

The rural community of Wyndham has faced a declining number of parishioners for decades, resulting in the absence of Mass for over a decade. The time has come to bid farewell to the aging structure and initiate the process of selling it to a new owner who can cherish and utilise it. Wyndham once held Mass in local homesteads and private residences before the establishment of St Joseph's. In 1897, after significant fundraising efforts by the parish priest and community, a site on North Street was purchased and a quaint wooden church was erected. The church included a distinctive bedroom, crucial for the priest to break up the travel time. In the past, priests would journey on horseback to Wyndham, conduct Mass, spend the night in the attached bedroom, fulfill visiting duties, and then return to the main towns. Throughout the years, St Joseph's Catholic Church in Wyndham has been part of various parishes, including Pambula, Candelo-Bemboka, Bega and a return to Pambula in 1993. Nevertheless, the church has always held a cherished place in the rural life of Wyndham. Around 1899 and again in 1901, Saint Mary MacKillop visited Wyndham, attending the church, staying with local families, and dining at the Robbie Burns Hotel. Families traditionally had designated seats for which they paid annually, a common practice in many churches.

Father George Ogah, the parish priest of Pambula, has announced that the church is now being sold through a real estate agent and a final celebration of Mass is scheduled for **Midday, Tuesday March 19, 2024.** Significantly, this day coincides with the Feast Day of St Joseph, promising a mix of emotions and memories for the Wyndham community. In recent years, the church underwent substantial repairs and a fresh coat of paint, thanks to the generous bequest left by a former parishioner. The late Mrs Sandra Bray, who served as the Parish Secretary, played a pivotal role in coordinating and organising the entirety of the project.



BOMBALA-DELEGATE CATHOLIC PARISH - IN THE MONARO MISSION Country of the Bidwell, Ngarigo and Yuin People



The inaugural Catholics to settle in the region arrived in 1826 as designated servants, primarily convicts. The community's foundation expanded with the influx of Scottish, Irish and subsequently German immigrants starting in 1833. Father Patrick Newman assumed the role of the first resident priest in 1864, succeeding a period during which priests were dispatched from Queanbeyan and Cooma. Churches were erected to serve the growing Catholic population, including St Mary's Bombala in 1867 & 1942, St Joseph's Delegate 1877 & 1915, St John's Cathcart in 1878 and St Peter's Corrowong in 1894. Educational institutions also emerged with privately Catholic schools opening between 1866 and 1886, followed by the establishment of Catholic schools in Bombala in 1886 and Delegate in 1921. In 1888, the Sisters of St Joseph of the Sacred Heart (North Sydney) co-founded by St Mary MacKillop, arrived, embarking on a continuous ministry that spanned 134 years. Monaro & South Coast Parishes transitioned from the Sydney Archdiocese to the Goulburn Diocese in 1917 and later to the Archdiocese of Canberra-Goulburn in 1948. The first local priestly vocation was Fr Ernest Baragry, ordained as a Missionary of the Sacred Heart in 1941. The Parish of Delegate operated independently from 1955 to 1973. Significant events marked parish history in 2008, including the arrival of the World Youth Day Cross & Icon and the Consecration of St Mary's Church Bombala following extensive repairs and restoration. St Joseph's Church Delegate commemorated its Centenary in 2015.

First Reading Jer 31:31-34

The days are coming when I will make a new covenant with Israel and I will forgive their iniquity.

See, the days are coming - it is the Lord who speaks - when I will make a new covenant with the House of Israel and the House of Judah, but not a covenant like the one I made with their ancestors on the day I took them by the hand to bring them out of the land of Egypt. They broke that covenant of mine, so I had to show them who was master. It is the Lord who speaks. No. this is the covenant I will make with the House of Israel when those days arrive - it is the Lord who speaks. Deep within them I will plant my Law, writing it on their hearts. Then I will be their God and they shall be my people. There will be no further need for neighbour to try to teach neighbour, or brother to say to brother, 'Learn to know the Lord!' No, they will all know me, the least no less than the greatest - it is the Lord who speaks - since I will forgive their iniquity and never call their sin to mind.

People standing by, who heard this, said it was a clap of thunder; others said, 'It was an angel speaking to him.' Jesus answered, 'It was not for my sake that this voice came, but for yours.

'Now sentence is being passed on this world;

now the prince of this world is to be overthrown.

And when I am lifted up from the earth, I shall draw all men to myself.'

By these words he indicated the kind of death he would die.

Reflection by Fr Michael Tate

I can observe a baby, but the parents 'see' their baby very differently. They gaze with total fascination, trying to perceive what this little bundle of flesh is really all about, trying to get an insight into its personality, visualising a possible future, hoping for a response.

This Gospel passage begins with a request from some Greeks 'to see Jesus', surely in all the ways parents see their baby. They were trying to perceive what this Jesus was really all about, trying to get an insight into his personality, imagining a possible future, hoping for a response.

And there was a response full of allusions to the future.

Jesus was as a grain of wheat. He died and was buried in the earth and that death was fruitful for the whole of humankind. He foresaw being nailed to the cross which would be dropped upright into a hole in the ground.

Our Lord says of that scene: 'When I am lifted up I will draw all people to myself.' How were people drawn to this scene?

People saw the length to which Jesus was prepared to go in order to persevere in his mission to live out the message that his Heavenly Father was full of mercy and wanted all people to share in Divine Life. This led to his being lifted up on the cross, being buried in the ground like a grain of wheat, only to rise to new life.

We could take a moment to pray that we will shortly see all this with the eyes of faith as we participate in the rituals of Good Friday and Easter.
