Gospel Acclamation

Alleluia, alleluia! Open our hearts, O Lord, to listen to the words of your Son. Alleluia!

GOSPEL: A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew 20:1-16

Jesus said to his disciples: 'The kingdom of heaven is like a landowner going out at daybreak to hire workers for his vineyard. He made an agreement with the workers for one denarius a day, and sent them to his vineyard. Going out at about the third hour he saw others standing idle in the market place and said to them, "You go to my vineyard too and I will give you a fair wage." So they went. At about the sixth hour and again at about the ninth hour, he went out and did the same. Then at about the eleventh hour he went out and found more men standing round, and he said to them, "Why have you been standing here idle all day?" "Because no one has hired us" they answered. He said to them, "You go into my vineyard too." In the evening, the owner of the vineyard said to his bailiff, "Call the workers and pay them their wages, starting with the last arrivals and ending with the first." So those who were hired at about the eleventh hour came forward and received one denarius each. When the first came, they expected to get more, but they too received one denarius each. They took it, but grumbled at the landowner. "The men who came last" they said "have done only one hour, and you have treated them the same as us, though we have done a heavy day's work in all the heat." He answered one of them and said, "My friend, I am not being unjust to you; did we not agree on one denarius? Take your earnings and go. I choose to pay the last-comer as much as I pay you. Have I no right to do what I like with my own? Why be envious because I am generous?" Thus the last will be first, and the first, last.'



World Day of Migrants and Refugees Sunday 24th Sept. – theme "Free to choose whether to migrate or to stay" In his message Pope Francis recalls that "migrants flee because of poverty, fear or desperation" and points out that some of the most visible causes of migration are "Persecutions, wars, atmospheric phenomena and dire poverty ".

In this regard, the Holy Father indicates in the Message that "Joint efforts are needed by individual countries and the international community to ensure that all enjoy the right not to be forced to emigrate, in other words, the chance to live in peace and with dignity in one's own country."

The Pope also asks "to see in the migrant not simply a brother or sister in difficulty, but Christ himself, who knocks at our door" and adds that, "as we work to ensure that in every case migration is the fruit of a free decision, we are called to show maximum respect for the dignity of each migrant".

"In whatever place we decide to build our future, in the country of our birth or elsewhere, the important thing is that there always be a community ready to welcome, protect, promote and integrate everyone, without distinctions and without excluding anyone," wrote Pope Francis.

We pray for the board members of Catholic health institutions, that they will be blessed with the wisdom they need to protect and promote a gospel-based ethic of life. (Pause) Lord, hear us.

We pray for all who suffer in mind, body, or spirit, especially Denis Dempsey, Ted Hart, Peter Gillan, Penny Crawford, Tony Riley, Jenny Bodman Ross Lawless, Rongo Tee Peeti, Helen Montgomery, Judy Nielson, Val Biggers and all who need our prayers, that they may be cared for by loving family, friends and community (Pause) Lord, hear us

We pray for those who have died recently ... and for those whose anniversary of death occurs around this time; that they will share to the full in the glory of Christ. (pause) Lord, hear us.

Dear Parishioners,

The Spring is with us in all her beauty. We pause during our Mass and thank God for the gifts of nature and grace. The early Christians were clearly a grateful bunch, giving the name 'Eucharist' to our treasured sacred celebration. The word, as you know, means 'thanksgiving,' and so the best way to prepare for Mass – both remotely and immediately – is to thank the Lord for everything we are and have.

We pray in a special way for Father Vincent Michael Thomas Burke! (I always address him in such fashion, having known him for years). Let's hope a couple of months recuperation finds him in better health, with a bright and fruitful retirement ahead of him.

The Archbishop has informed me that Father Joshua and I will be among you for perhaps 18 months. The towns and parishes of Bungendore and Braidwood – and the surrounding areas – do need a full-time priest. In the meantime, we will do our best – under-promising and hopefully over-delivering.

For many years, the Archdiocese has gathered each year to celebrate what was known as the Galong Procession – honouring the Our Lady, Mother of God. It took place either in May or October. The Archbishop has decided, for a number of reasons, to switch the venue to the newly restored Old Cathedral of Sts. Peter & Paul in Goulburn.

Construction of the Old Cathedral began in 1872, with rock quarried just outside Goulburn – Australia's first inland city. Believe it or not, it is the only Greenstone Church in the world, constructed with the rock that is – again, believe it or not – that is 440 million years old. It occupies a special place in world history.
