Father Tony writes: Dear Parishioners,

The Holy Season of Lent begins on Ash Wednesday: 14 February 2024

There will be liturgy at **10.30am** in our beautiful Church, including our parish school, with the blessing and distribution of ashes taking place after the homily (perhaps brief?).

On our heads – on each and every one of us – the ashes will be placed with one of the following invocations:

Repent, and believe in the Gospel or Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return.

The first invocation recalls the very first words spoken by Jesus in the gospel (Mark 1). Notice how repentance and belief are intimately intertwinned.

The second invocation recalls the creative act of God (Genesis 2). God 'breathed' into us and we became 'living beings.' All beings in the **natural world** have a beginning and an end. We are being reminded of this truth, as well as the truth that we are also part of **the supernatural world**. There is life beyond the grave.

I do hope the 40 days are fruitful. Try not to over reach with what you propose to do or give up. Make it practical, so that by the end of the Lenten period we are a little different – with God's grace.

That's the key: relying on God, not on ourselves.

REFLECTION by Nick Brodie

'He was like a dead man walking', quipped Pope Francis. Not only did the leper in today's Gospel have a terrible disease, but he was excluded from wider society and 'marginalised by the civil and religious community'. The physical disease brought with it painful social consequences.

There was a sense at the time that such leprosy was punishment for sin; that somehow the lepers deserved what they were getting. But Jesus saw past these misunderstandings. He saw the person in front of him, responded to their cry, and felt compassion for them. 'Of course I want to!', Jesus says.

Tellingly, Pope Francis points out, Jesus 'does not stand at a safe distance and does not act by delegating, but places Himself in direct contact.' Like Jesus, therefore, we should be close to those in need. We should make contact with them. We should respond to them.

Jesus' response, the Pope points out, is thus essentially about compassion and contact. Firstly, it is important to feel the situations faced by other people. To empathise, sympathise, and understand what they might be feeling. Secondly, it is necessary to reach out and remove the stigma; to respond in some physical, practical way to the situation before us. Even Jesus did not cure social diseases by good intentions alone.
