OPENING PRAYER

Lord, guide the course of world events and give your people the joy and peace of serving you in freedom. Amen.

FIRST READING: A reading from Slrach 27:4-7

In a shaken sieve the rubbish is left behind, so too the defects of a man appear in his talk. The kiln tests the work of the potter, the test of a man is in his conversation. The orchard where the tree grows is judged on the quality of its fruit, similarly a man's words betray what he feels. Do not praise a man before he has spoken since this is the test of men.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM:

Response: Lord, it is good to give thanks to you..

- It is good to give thanks to the Lord to make music for your name, O Most High, to proclaim your love in the morning and your truth in the watches of the night. (R.)
- 2. The just will flourish like the palm-tree and grow like a Lebanon cedar. (R.)
- Planted in the house of the Lord they will flourish in the courts of our God, still bearing bearing fruit when they are old, still full of sap, still green, to proclaim that the Lord is just. In him, my rock, there is no wrong. (R.)

SECOND READING: A reading from the first letter of St Paul to the Corinthians

When the perishable nature has put on perishability, and when the mortal nature has put on immortality, then the words of scripture will come true. Death is swallowed up in victory. Death, where is your victory? Death, where is your sting? Now the sting of death is sin and sin gets it gets power from the Law. So let us thank God for giving us the victory through Our Lord Jesus Christ.


Never give in the, my dear friends, never admit defeat; keep on working at the Lord's work always, knowing that, in the Lord, you cannot be labouring in vain.

Gospel Acclamation

Alleluia, alleluia! Shine on the world like stars; You are offering it the word of life. Alleluia! **GOSPEL:** A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke 6:39-45.

Jesus told a parable to his disciples, 'Can one blind man guide another? Surely both will fall into a pit? The disciple is not superior to his teacher; the fully trained disciple will always be like his teacher. Why did you observe the splinter in your brother's eye and never notice the plank in your own? How can you say to your brother, "Brother, let me take out the splinter in your eye," when you cannot see the plank in your own? Hypocrite! Take the plank out of your own eye first, and then you will see clearly enough to take out the splinter that is in your brother's eye.

There is no sound tree that produces rotten fruit, nor again a rotten tree that produces sound fruit. For every tree can be told by its own fruit; people do not pick figs from thorns, nor gather grapes from brambles. A good man draws what is good from the store of goodness in his heart; a bad man draws what is bad from the store of badness. For a man's words flow out of what fills his heart.'



REFLECTION on the Gospel Teachers – Good and Bad

I was an inconsistent student over the years of my formal education. I excelled in some areas and struggled in others. I have come to realise that the teacher often made the difference. My introduction to numbers beyond the basics was high school Algebra I. The teacher was brilliant but had no patience in explaining the steps necessary to learn the concepts because it came easy to him. It remained inaccessible to me because of that. There was no fun or sense of accomplishment. I felt he didn't want to be there as much as I didn't. I dreaded every math course after that.

On the other hand, my teacher in English II loved to read and write. She found books students our age enjoyed reading and encouraged spirited discussions. She had us writing every day, printed our work, had us read it aloud to the class, and patiently helped us improve our technique. We were having as much fun as she did. That pleasure of reading has stayed with me, and the satisfaction writing gives remains an integral part of my life today.

I have also learned that teaching encompasses more than imparting knowledge and skills. Example, enthusiasm, and respect of the subject from the teacher can make a student not just a learner but also a disciple. Often, the disciple will become a teacher as well. We can teach theology, but we help people learn what faith really means by how we live our lives as disciples of Christ.

The Commissioning

Look sensitively and realise your influence for good. Look around and know what you can achieve with other members of the church. Look with humility and wonder what God has done and will do for you. Look thankfully and realise what God has given you. Look practically and see the work you can do for God and God's purposes. Look graciously and know that God loves you beyond all times and all imagining.

For the recently deceased, Rod Diacono, Kevin Thorne, Father Henry Byrne, Joy Vanzimen, Father Laurie Blake, Joyce Grant, Paul Bishop,. . . and for those whose anniversary of death occurs around this time, that their death will be swallowed up in the victory of Christ. (Pause) Let us pray to the Lord.

We are less than two weeks before the beginning of Lent as Ash Wednesday is the 2nd March. On that day Mass will be held at 9AM at St Mary's Bungendore and 11AM at St Bede's Braidwood. St Bede's school will celebrate with a liturgy and distribution of ashes by the teachers.

What are we doing special during Lent to prepare us for Easter? The MenAlive weekend will be held on the Saturday 2nd April and Sunday 3rd April on the Fifth Sunday of Lent, in Bungendore.
