LITURGY AND BULLETIN

Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, God, for ever and ever. Amen.

FIRST READING: A reading from the Acts of the Apostles
Peter addressed Cornelius and his household: 'You must have heard about the recent happenings in Judaea; about Jesus of Nazareth and how he began in Galilee, after John had been preaching baptism. God had anointed him with the Holy Spirit and with power, and because God was with him, Jesus went about doing good and curing all who had fallen into the power of the devil. Now I, and those with me, can witness to everything he did throughout the countryside of Judaea and in Jerusalem itself: and also to the fact that they killed him by hanging him on a tree, yet three days afterwards God raised him to life and allowed him to be seen, not by the whole people but only by certain witnesses God had chosen beforehand. Now we are those witnesses - we have eaten and drunk with him after his resurrection from the dead - and he has ordered us to proclaim this to his people and to tell them that God has appointed him to judge everyone, alive or dead. It is to him that all the prophets bear this witness: that all who believe in Jesus will have their sins forgiven through his name.'

## RESPONSORIAL PSALM:

Response: This is the day the Lord has made; let us rejoice and be glad.

1. Give thanks to the Lord for he is good, for his love has no end.
Let the sons of Israel say:
'His love has no end.' (R.)
2. The Lord's right hand has triumphed;
his right hand raised me up.
I shall not die, I shall live and recount his deeds. (R.)
3. The stone which the builders rejected has become the corner stone.
This is the work of the Lord, a marvel in our eyes. (R.)

Second Reading: A reading from the first letter of St Paul to the Corinthians
You must know how even a small amount of yeast is enough to leaven all the dough, so get rid of all the old yeast, and make yourselves into a completely new batch of bread, unleavened as you are meant to be. Christ, our passover, has been sacrificed; let us celebrate the feast, then, by getting rid of all the old yeast of evil and wickedness, having only the unleavened bread of sincerity and truth.

## Gospel Acclamation

Alleluia, alleluia!
Christ has become our paschal sacrifice;
let us feast with joy in the Lord.

Gospel: A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark 16:1-7.
When the sabbath was over, Mary of Magdala, Mary the mother of James, and Salome, bought spices with which to go and anoint him. And very early in the morning on the first day of the week they went to the tomb, just as the sun was rising.

They had been saying to one another, 'Who will roll away the stone for us from the entrance to the tomb?' But when they looked they could see that the stone - which was very big - had already been rolled back. On entering the tomb they saw a young man in a white robe seated on the right hand side, and they were struck with amazement. But he said to them, 'There is no need for alarm. You are looking for Jesus of Nazareth, who was crucified: he has risen, he is not here. See, here is the place where they laid him. But you must go and tell his disciples and Peter, "He is going before you to Galilee; it is there you will see him, just as he told you."'


## REFLECTION

Dear Parishioners,
The rising of Jesus Christ from the dead is a miraculous event. The empty tomb leads to an entirely new question in human history:

The women, confronted with the absence of the dead body of Jesus in the tomb, were exposed to a new form of questioning [by angels], 'Why do you seek the living among the dead' (Kelly, Meditations On Holy Week, 65).

The resurrection appearances of Jesus confirm the importance of this penetrating question. What has taken place is entirely without precedent.

The language chosen by the four evangelists is important. Concerning the actual fact of resurrection, they tell us that Jesus was 'raised from death by his Father.' Concerning the appearances of Jesus, they tell us that 'Jesus let himself be seen.'

By expressing the event of the resurrection and the appearances in the passive tense, they are helping us to see that Jesus is completely dependent upon his Father. They work together as a team. Mutuality is the name of the game.
The meaning is clear:
Are we going live life our way or God's way?
Is life God-given and God-directed, or are we the centre of reality?
May the life, death and resurrection of Jesus help us to shake of the age-old sin of pride and selfcomplacency, and find new purpose, peace and joy in our God-given lives,

## This is a call to sign the e-Petition to restore palliative care funding to support people throughout NSW with a life-limiting illness.

The End of Life and Palliative Care Framework 2019-2024 articulates NSW Health's vision of an integrated approach to end-of-life and palliative care planning and services within the NSW health system. On 9 June 2022, the NSW Government announced an additional $\$ 743$ million over 5 years (2022-23 to 2026-27) to enhance end-of-life and palliative care in NSW. The purpose of this funding is to improve hospital care and community health services for people with a lifelimiting illness and to strengthen equity and access in rural, regional and remote areas. This amount was reduced by $\$ 150$ million in the last budget (2023-2024).An e-parliamentary petition has been created on behalf of NSW citizens to voice their concerns regarding this reduction of funding for the expansion and provision of appropriate palliative care to our most vulnerable.

If 10,000 signatures are achieved, the withdrawal of funding and redistribution of funds will have to be debated in Parliament. The petition has been posted online via the link below. The names and email addresses of signatories will not be used for any other purpose.

## EASTER MESSAGE 2024 FROM ARCHBISHOP CHRISTOPHER PROWSE

## VICTORY FOR HUMANITY IN THE RISEN LORD JESUS

At this Easter time, we proclaim to the ends of the earth the victory won for humanity in the Risen Lord Jesus Christ.

Recent Popes describe war as a defeat for humanity. No one wins in war. It seems to make things worse than better. We see this, at present, in the Middle East, Ukraine and parts of Africa.

The same could be said for the scourge of euthanasia, at present being legislated throughout Australia. It is so unnecessary. The best response to terminal illness and great human vulnerability is widely available palliative care. Here tenderness and closeness replace the brute and sinister lethal jab.

Into this developing culture of hopelessness comes the extraordinary hope and joy of Easter!
Easter is God's ultimate victory over threats to living out our humanity to its full. It is the victory for humanity that is permanent and universal.

It is love made flesh in the victory of the Resurrection of Jesus on the Calvary Cross. The tree of our defeat has become the tree of victory in Jesus rising from the dead.
