

The Catholic Church in Australia will be holding a Plenary Council over two sessions, the first in 2020 and the second in 2021. The Council website, http://plenarycouncil.catholic.org.au/ex-plains that a Plenary Council is 'the highest formal gathering of all local churches in a country'. Plenary Council 2020, the website states, 'is being held so that we can dialogue about the future of the Catholic Church in Australia'.

There are a number of ways that one can participate in the Plenary Council process. We are encouraged to listen and dialogue, for example in small groups, and to have our say in shaping the program for the Plenary Council by making a submission. Submissions can be made online (via the Council website) by individuals or by groups such as parish groups. The Council will receive online submissions until 6 March 2019, and encourages submitters to consider and address 3 matters:

- 1. What do you think God is asking of us in Australia at this time?
- 2. What questions do you have about the future of the Church for the Plenary Council to consider in 2020?
- 3. Please a share a story of your experiences of your faith or the Church to give context to your responses to Q1 & Q2.

As a parish, we have so far participated through praying as a congregation for the Council, and at Mass watching a Youtube video of Council President Archbishop Timothy Costelloe explaining what the Council's all about. Also, late last year there were two information sessions about the Council (held on 12 November and 8 December);

a summary of the discussions by attendees appeared in the Parish Bulletin on 22/23 December. The Parish would like to continue facilitating parishioner participation in the Plenary Council.

One way is to set up small listening and dialogue groups that discuss 'What do you think God is asking of us in Australia at this time?'. If you are interested in joining such a group, please put your name and contact details either on the form in the foyer, or on the form below and detach it and give it to the Parish Office by Tuesday, 5 February 2019. Please indicate if you are willing to act as a facilitator for the group.

The Parish will collate comments it receives in this way in putting together a Parish submission. (Of course, you can submit your comments directly to the Plenary Council via their website.)

Submissions to the Plenary Council are not the end of the process. The Archdiocese draws on Pope Francis's The Joy of the Gospel to promote leadership and mission in the Catholic Church. This exhortation calls for renewal in the Church. At the local level, we can use the listening and dialogue of the Plenary Council process as a catalyst for renewing our Parish. There are lots of ways of being a part of this, for example joining one of the Parish groups such as St Vincent de Paul, the Parish Pastoral Council or Parish School of Religion; further information on these groups and on parish renewal will be provided in future bulletins. And there are faith formation and training programs such as CaFE (Catholic Faith Exploration), Alpha (which introduces people to an initial proclamation of the good news of Jesus Christ) and lector ministry training (see over). Parish financial support may be available to meet the cost of undertaking such programs.

So please take the opportunity to get involved in whatever way you can, and to have your say in the future of our Church.
