GOSPEL

Matthew 2:1-12 - The visit of the Magi

A reading from the gospel according to Matthew

After Jesus had been born at Bethlehem in Judaea during the reign of King Herod, some wise men came to Jerusalem from the east. 'Where is the infant king of the Jews?' they asked. 'We saw his star as it rose and have come to do him homage.' When King Herod heard this he was perturbed, and so was the whole of Jerusalem. He called together all the chief priests and the scribes of the people, and enquired of them where the Christ was to be born. 'At Bethlehem in Judaea,' they told him 'for this is what the prophet wrote:

And you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, you are by no means least among the leaders of Judah, for out of you will come a leader who will shepherd my people Israel.'

Then Herod summoned the wise men to see him privately. He asked them the exact date on which the star had appeared, and sent them on to Bethlehem. 'Go and find out all about the child,' he said 'and when you have found him, let me know, so that I too may go and do him homage.' Having listened to what the king had to say, they set out. And there in front of them was the star they had seen rising; it went forward, and halted over the place where the child was. The sight of the star filled them with delight, and going into the house they saw the child with his mother Mary, and falling to their knees they did him homage. Then, open-

ing their treasures, they offered him gifts of gold and frankincense and myrrh. But they were warned in a dream not to go back to Herod, and returned to their own country by a different way.

EPIPANY

This Sunday we have the marvellous and intriguing story of the 'three wise men from the East' who left their home country to follow a star.

Eventually, the star stopped over a stable in Bethlehem. Overwhelmed with joy, they found a Child and his mother. They knelt before the Child, paid him homage, and offered him gifts. Then they left and were never heard of again – but their story has been told and retold thousands of times.

I wonder if we are being called to follow their example. Called to be wise, to listen to the soft intimations of the Divine, leading us away from comfortable surroundings to undertake a journey – maybe into unknown territory - where eventually we, too, discover Jesus, with his mother?

THERE'S NO SUCH THING AS TOO LATE

Epiphany is the last official day of the Christmas season. Tomorrow, we as a Church transition back to Ordinary Time.

The first day of my Christmas break, I would make all sorts of plans. Then, on my last day of Christmas break, I would wake up and realize how few of things I had planned to do I had actually done. Then I would get this overwhelming feeling that I had missed it all.

And maybe that's how you feel about the Christmas season. You went to Christmas Mass, had Christmas dinner with your family, opened Christmas presents, but you don't feel a whole lot closer to Jesus.

If you feel that way, don't despair! The Three Kings today remind us, it's not too late!

Matthew tells us that the three magi, or members of the ruling class from Persia, noticed a new star in the sky, took it as a sign that a new king had been born in Israel and travelled to Jerusalem to greet the newborn king.

The distance from Persia to Jerusalem was over 1,000 miles. In Jesus' time, a trip of that distance most likely would have taken months. Talk about arriving to the party late! The shepherds and the choir of angels would have come and gone. All the excitement of Jesus' birth would have been pretty much over by the time the three kings arrived.

Even though they were late arrivals, that didn't stop

Cont... them from having a life-changing encounter with Jesus. When they finally made it the place Jesus was they were overjoyed. When they saw "the child with Mary his mother, they prostrated themselves and did him homage. They opened their treasures" to Him and allowed Jesus into their lives. So, even though this is the last day of the Christmas season, you can still have a new encounter with the Lord this Christmas. Take some time to pray today, opening your heart to the Lord. Tell Him how overjoyed you are that He has come into the world. Ask Jesus to use you and your treasures this New Year. Ask the Three Kings to pray with and for you as you celebrate this last day of Christmas..It's never too late to meet Jesus.

EMPTY HANDS

Epiphany.
Fr Timothy Radcliffe OP preaches
on the gifts the wise men gave ... and received.

The magi gave the child Jesus 'gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh.' Why did they bring him gifts? These would not have been useful for Mary's child. What would they have done with them?

The point of course is not that Jesus's family needed these presents, though presumably gold always comes in handy! These gifts were not in recognition of what he wanted but of who he was. The gold was the recognition of his kingship, the frankincense of his priesthood and the myrrh of the death that he would die.

So the magi gave him gifts in honour of the gift that he was to them, and is to us. These gifts show not that the child Jesus was needy but that we are, who long for this priestly king who gave his life for us. The magi go to seek him with their bags full of precious things, but more importantly they depart with their hands empty, and thus able to receive the gift of all that Jesus is. Contrast this with how Herod sees the child, as a threat to what he possesses, to his kingship and riches. His hands are too full to receive the gift that he too is offered in Christ. If we are to receive the gifts of this Epiphany, then we must empty our hands too.

Andreas English is a German religious journalist who had been deeply critical of Pope John Paul II. He accompanied the Pope to India in 1999. He went with the Pope to visit the home of Mahatma Gandhi. He was bored, and watched without interest the Pope remove his shoes to honour this holy Hindu. At best he hoped that the Pope would trip up so that he could get a good photo of him flat on the ground.

Then he got into conversation with an old Indian woman, who had known Gandhi and been sent by the Indian government to witness this event. She said 'Gandhi did not have anything. He had only his two empty hands and his Hindu belief. But the powerful British empire, with all its gunboats and armies, was not able to win the fight against his empty hands. They had no chance against a small faithful Hindu. And so it is with the Pope. He didn't have any armies either. He had only two empty hands like Gandhi, but the Russians were not able to win the fight against his belief, his deep trust in a liberating God.'

This was a moment of revelation that changed the journalist's life for ever. This Christmas most of us will have given and received gifts. We have probably looked for gifts that our friends do need. Even more profoundly our gifts Cont...are, like those of the magi, in recognition of who are the people whom we love. We delight in their humanity. If we give them books or wine, it is not just because they need these things, but because we take pleasure in the pleasure that they will have in them. We celebrate their enjoyment.

But the heart of all these celebrations is the one who needs no gifts from us but is pure gift. His very being is given to him by the Father from all eternity, and he comes to give himself to us in turn. To receive that gift, then we too need empty hands. We need to recognise that God's fullness of life is what we most deeply yearn for and create a space to receive it.

The Herods of this world cannot receive the gift, for it would mean letting go of their own fullness and self-satisfaction. They can only see the powerless child as a threat. When Manuel Merten OP, who told me of this German journalist, went to see the Archbishop of Ho Chi Min city in Vietnam, he asked what was the secret of the wonderful success of the Church in Vietnam. He replied 'I believe it's our powerlessness which makes us so powerful.'

THE BREATH THAT MOVES US

Swaddled tightly beneath a star-blanketed Bethlehem sky, God breathed gently yet powerfully. The acceptable time had come. The prophecies were now — at last — fulfilled. The Creator had invaded His creation on a mission of love and for the next three decades, peace and joy would be breathed and received in tangible new ways. Atop the blood-covered stones of Calvary, Love breathed mercy upon hearts filled with hate. Three days later, Love breathed again within the darkness of a tomb... and then, soon after, Love breathed forgiveness and purpose to fear -filled followers huddled behind locked doors. Through it all, the divine life of God was communicated through each human breath. Put simply, God breathed not solely so that He might live but that we would. It's fascinating how something so small, a breath, roughly eight ounces of oxygen or carbon dioxide, forms the line between life and death. The Latin word for breath inspirare — is where we get the term "inspiration"; it literally means, "to breathe [life] into." Inspiration, however, is far more than a biological word or concept, it is a deeply spiritual reality; God's inspiration animates our Christian souls, guides our steps, and offers us both a mission and a purpose. by Mark Hart
