

FIRST READING

First reading - Genesis 2:7-9,3:1-7

A reading from the book of Genesis

The Lord God fashioned man of dust from the soil. Then he breathed into his nostrils a breath of life, and thus man became a living being.

The Lord God planted a garden in Eden which is in the east, and there he put the man he had fashioned. The Lord God caused to spring up from the soil every kind of tree, enticing to look at and good to eat, with the tree of life and the tree of the knowledge of good and evil in the middle of the garden.

Now the serpent was the most subtle of all the wild beasts that the Lord God had made. It asked the woman, 'Did God really say you were not to eat from any of the trees in the garden?' The woman answered the serpent, 'We may eat the fruit of the trees in the garden. But of the fruit of the tree in the middle of the garden God said, "You must not eat it, nor touch it, under pain of death."' Then the serpent said to the woman, 'No! You will not die! God knows in fact that on the day you eat it your eyes will be opened and you will be like gods, knowing good and evil.' The woman saw that the tree was good to eat and pleasing to the eye, and that it was desirable for the knowledge that it could give. So she took some of its fruit and ate it. She gave some also to her husband who was with her, and he ate it. Then the eyes of both of them were opened and they realised that they were naked. So they sewed fig-leaves together to make themselves loin-cloths.

SECOND READING

Second reading - Romans 5:12-19

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Romans

Sin entered the world through one man, and through sin death, and thus death has spread through the whole human race because everyone has sinned. Sin existed in the world long before the Law was given. There was no law and so no one could be accused of the sin of 'law-breaking', yet death reigned over all from Adam to Moses, even though their sin, unlike that of Adam, was not a matter of breaking a law.

Adam prefigured the One to come, but the gift itself considerably outweighed the fall. If it is certain that through one man's fall so many died, it is even more certain that divine grace, coming through the one man, Jesus Christ, came to so many as an abundant free gift. The results of the gift also outweigh the results of one man's sin: for after one single fall came judgement with a verdict of condemnation, now after many falls comes grace with its verdict of acquittal. If it is certain that death reigned over everyone as the consequence of one man's fall, it is even more certain that one man, Jesus Christ, will cause everyone to reign in life who receives the free gift that he does not deserve, of being made righteous. Again, as one man's fall brought condemnation on everyone, so the good act of one man brings everyone life and makes them justified. As by one man's disobedience many were made sinners, so by one man's obedience many will be made righteous.

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LENT

This week we begin our annual observance of Lent. We may want to consider: 'How am I to celebrate this season in 2023?' The word 'Lent' comes from the Old English word lencten meaning springtime or 'the lengthening of days'; it is a time of renewal. In keeping with the season, our Lent can be one of invitation to our own renewal in the ways of living with and for God; a time to recognise the love of God made visible to us in creation; a time to notice those ways in which we fall short of the desires that God has for each one of us and for our world, and to pray for the grace to live more fully according to God's ways.

LET YOUR HEARTS BE BROKEN, NOT YOUR GARMENTS TORN



This week we begin once more the holy season of Lent. I say 'holy' season as the activities required of us by this time of our liturgical year are meant to draw us closer to God and God's holiness. Just as one who comes closer to the fire to warm his chilled

body so the believer, through the actions of fasting, prayer and good works, draw one closer to the living God.

Yet, our actions are our own. Sometimes people see Lent as some kind of spiritual Olympics, a contest whereby we can become more abstemious than others, more devout than others, more charitable than others. Jesus has some instructive words for this mindset:

Be careful not to parade your good deeds before men to attract their notice; by doing this you will lose all reward from your Father in heaven. So when you give alms, do not have it trumpeted before you; this is what the hypocrites do in the synagogues and in the streets to win men's admiration. I tell you solemnly, they have had their reward.

Our Lenten activities are our own business. We do them in secret, we do them not to please our neighbours but

Cont...to honour God. It is for this reason the prophet Joel commands wayward Israel.

Let your hearts be broken, not your garments torn.

Let your heart be broken means that it is the interior spiritual life between God and ourselves that ought to be made vulnerable. Our Lenten duties are about an interior spiritual renewal not a cosmetic, outward "makeover". Our garments should remain the same, our hearts must change. As we commence this Lenten discipline may our hearts then become broken, so that the Lord may enter in, and may our prayer, fasting and charity be done discreetly and sincerely so that we may cultivate a spirit of penance throughout our lives, not just an outward show for forty days.
