

THE PURPOSE OF PRAYER



I have written on prayer a number of times in previous editions of our Parish bulletin, so you'll excuse me for writing about this subject again, I'm quite passionate about it. Twenty years ago when I was a novice there was an unofficial saying in the novitiate group and that was 'if you don't pray you won't stay': meaning that if you weren't into

prayer perhaps the novitiate wasn't the place for you, or that a solid prayer life would prevent a defection from the religious life. I think this little axiom might be fruitful for us in general though: if we aren't praying we can't make much sense of what happens officially in the Church's liturgy, or, indeed our own lives. Prayer is the backbone of all we do and are as Christians.

Thus, in Lent we are called to pray. This invitation is strange. Why are we called to pray during Lent? Aren't we supposed to be praying all year round? It is obvious in the Church's wisdom, as she has observed human behavior over the last two millennia, that a great number of the Christian people pray seldom, or, if they do, it is perhaps only intercessory (which isn't a bad thing, it's good to pray for people or ourselves). Or, the nature of their prayer is rushed or halfhearted or distracted.

Lent is like the training ground. Just as the league footballer is required to attend training throughout the week so as to put in a solid performance on the weekend, so too the Christian is called to the same discipline in the spiritual life. We saw last week with fasting that it requires and indeed disposes us to a discipline, and so indeed does prayer. Prayer is a discipline it is something that requires practice.

Our Lenten prayer maybe a bit like starting to ride a bicycle, we have a few attempts but we keep falling off, maybe we get a bit disheartened, maybe we're ready to give up. What's really happening is that we are fumbling in our attempts to love God, and for this we will be rewarded. The lovely thing about Jesus' presence in the Blessed Sacrament is that he is always there waiting for us and it doesn't really matter how long we spend; we will not be disappointed. Nevertheless, the time we spend with Jesus, either present in the Blessed Sacrament or on our own, must be authentic, sincere and genuine. Our Lord teaches this to the disciples, he tells them to go to your "inner room" and "close the door, and "pray to your Father in secret. And your Father who sees in secret will repay you." (Mt 6:6) Jesus also asks the disciples to pray an hour with him during his Passion, he asks the same of us "Had you no strength, then, to watch with me even for an hour?" (Mt 26:40)

First we must go to our "inner room" and "close the door". These metaphors require us to stand back from the hustle and bustle of daily life and withdraw. It is possible to pray while doing other things and that's fine if it is impossible for one to withdraw, but we must see prayer as speaking to our beloved. Would we speak to our wife or husband in a disrupted, distracted and disturbed way? Sometimes we do fall into this unfortunate type of communication, but no one will say it is the kind of communication that is authentic, genuine or loving. Ok, it's good that there is communication, but Lent pushes us for real, attentive communication and listening. So a tip in Lent is to go to that "inner room" and "close the door" even for five minutes, get your breath back and just say repeatedly 'Jesus', the moment you're a

Cont... little close to distraction just say 'Jesus'. Maybe even before attempting prayer just ask the Holy Spirit to pray in you as St Paul exhorts us: "in the same way, the Spirit helps us in our weakness. We do not know what we ought to pray for, but the Spirit himself intercedes for us through wordless groans." (Rom 8:26)

How long should we pray for? In his *Summa Theologiae* St Thomas Aquinas points out that there is a distinction between prayer and prayerfulness. The Angelic Doctor asks "Whether prayer should be continual?" Thomas' response, as I have alluded to, makes the very fine distinction between the attitude we have to praying and the very act of prayer itself, Thomas writes:

I answer that, We may speak about prayer in two ways: first, by considering it in itself; secondly, by considering it in its cause. The cause of prayer is the desire of charity, from which prayer ought to arise: and this desire ought to be in us continually, either actually or virtually, for the virtue of this desire remains in whatever we do out of charity; and we ought to "do all things to the glory of God" (1 Corinthians 10:31). From this point of view prayer ought to be continual: wherefore Augustine says (ad Probam, Ep. cxxx, 9): "Faith, hope and charity are by themselves a prayer of continual longing."

But prayer, considered in itself, cannot be continual, because we have to be busy about other works, and, as Augustine says (ad Probam. Ep. cxxx, 9), "we pray to God with our lips at certain intervals and seasons, in order to admonish ourselves by means of such like signs, to take note of the amount of our progress in that desire, and to arouse ourselves more eagerly to an increase thereof." Now the quantity of a thing should be commensurate with its end, for instance the quantity of the dose should be commensurate with health. And so it is becoming that prayer should last long enough to arouse the fervor of the interior desire: and when it exceeds this measure, so that it cannot be continued any longer without causing weariness, it should be discontinued. (Summa Theologiae, Secunda Secundae, q.83, article 14.)

The interesting point about the length of our prayer is that they should be long enough to be fervent and short enough so as to avoid weariness, so St Thomas teaches. Thoroughly reasonable. However, we should not stop on account of feigned weariness, hopefully our genuine attempt will push us a bit! Lent then helps us to bring prayer back into focus as a 'thing' we ought to cultivate and incorporate into daily living. May your efforts to pray bear much fruit.
