

A reading from the book of Deuteronomy



Gospel - Luke 4:1-13

A reading from the Gospel according to Luke

Filled with the Holy Spirit, Jesus left the Jordan and was led by the Spirit through the wilderness, being tempted there by the devil for forty days. During that time he ate nothing and at the end he was hungry. Then the devil said to him, 'If you are the Son of God,



tell this stone to turn into a loaf.' But Jesus replied, 'Scripture says: Man does not live on bread alone.'

Then leading him to a height, the devil showed him in a moment of time all the kingdoms of the world and said to him, 'I will give you all this power and the glory of these kingdoms, for it has been committed to me and I give it to anyone I choose. QUEENSLAND AND NSW FLOODING

Australians once again are coping with devastation and disruption brought about by natural disaster. We pray for all those who have been affected by the flooding, and for all those offering shelter and support.

FLESH, POWER, PRESUMPTION

In that rather intriguing book of the Bible, the Letter to the Hebrews, the mysterious author of this epistle encapsulates how we must think of Jesus. The sacred writer informs our Christology in the following manner:



"; he has been through every trial, fashioned as we are, only sinless." (Heb 4:15)

One thing we need be constantly reminded of is that Jesus, although he possessed the fullness of God, in his sacred humanity, was not a Superman. Jesus could feel pain, feel sorrow, feel hunger, got tired. If Jesus were immune from these human phenomena we could not say that the incarnation really took place, all we could say is that the Divine Son was pretending to be human. Orthodox theology maintains that Jesus is fully God and fully human. Jesus' full embrace of human reality necessitates that he is truly human in all things except sin. One might think that being sinful articulates humanity, after all "to err is human" right? This mindset, however, is not the understanding of Christian anthropology. Humanity was created in grace, that is in right relations with God; the Fall was of humanity's choosing and not out of God's pre-programming. That being the case the sacred humanity of Jesus is more human than we are! Jesus is the new Adam. Just as the original Adam was created without sin, but caused sin to come into the world, so Jesus Christ arises as Adam 2.0 with no sin, so as to erase the sin of humanity.

Cont...St Paul in his Second Letter to the Corinthians writes:

God made Him who knew no sin to be sin on our behalf, so that in Him we might become the righteousness of God. (2 Cor 5:21)

In the desert then Jesus is able to be tempted, and this phenomenon is a part of his true humanity, as it is a regular experience of ours. Whilst temptation is not sin, it is that experience which tests us, tests our fidelity to God and to God's plan for us. Temptation, is, as it were, the alluring detour to happiness, and when we curiously take its route we find ourselves in the dead end of sin. Jesus then endures this painful experience, where his true humanity is tested to its limit. Yet, Jesus does not buckle under the pressure but fights back, not with human strength, but with the word of God.

So, these temptations which Jesus experiences hit home at the three most acute aspects of the human person - sensuality, presumption, and power.

By being invited to turn stones into bread the Deceiver suggests that it is only by a satisfaction of the senses that we can attain true happiness. All we need is sensual enjoyments and then we will have found our heaven. This mindset is truly beguiling for most people. Most of us do not have the discipline to rein in these inclinations, most of us have some weak point in our sensual desires. This inclination, and the temptation which accompanies it, is the most basic. More importantly, in response to Satan's suggestion, Jesus remarks that only God can truly satisfy the hungry soul. Augustine's most famous quote - 'you have made us for yourself O Lord, and our hearts are restless until they rest in thee' should be our realistic response then.

The temptation to power is also a weakness for some. To dominate, to aggrandize oneself, to seek honours, all these projects embark on one major goal - the fulfilment of the ego. The Evil One suggests that true happiness lies not really in the worship of the Devil but the worship of oneself. Satan announces to Jesus that all the kingdoms of the world are his, but this is a delusion. Satan himself has been intoxicated with a kind of power trip, and it is this intoxication which has led him to make such preposterous claims. The only person Satan worships is Satan. Jesus brings Satan, and us, back down to earth -any kind of idolatry is a delusion, only God is worthy of worship and not only worthy but demanding of such service.

The last temptation in St Luke's chronology is the temptation to presumption of God's mercy and assistance. The sin of presumption is a sin against the theological virtue of hope, it is opposed to despair by reason of excess. Presumption then is an excessive, foolhardy hope, the sort of hope that bullies headlong, reckless and careless forgetting its place in the scheme of things. It takes God for granted, thinks she'll be right, and lives a life which is thoughtless and perhaps even with some degree of feigned ignorance about God's demands. A person who is presumptuous trusts that he can be saved but without God's help, or by God's help but without his own efforts. It is a great sin to commit sin boldly pleading that God easily pardons sinners. Our confidence in God's mercy must always go hand in hand with his justice.

Cont...Furthermore, it is presumptuous to think that we will enter the kingdom of heaven by faith alone without attempting to accomplish good works; to hope to obtain forgiveness of our sins without penance; or while hoping in God's mercy, to remain in serious sin, and put off conversion. 'Do not put the Lord your God to the test', Jesus responds to the Tempters wiles, do not think you can play God, you will lose. Rather work with God, respond to his grace and be opened to what God wants for you. Yes, we do need to throw ourselves off the pinnacle of the Temple in some regard but in the knowledge that we do so faithfully commending ourselves to God not commending ourselves to a deluded sense of God.

As we embark on another Lenten season let us be vigilant over the needs of the flesh, let us monitor our desire to see our own wills fulfilled at the expense of others, and let us be mindful of the little presumptuous parts of our lives which we think God will ignore.


