

#### First Reading: Exodus 20:1-7 A reading from the book of Exodus

The Lord spoke all these words. He said, 'I am the Lord your God who brought you out of the house of slavery. 'You shall have no gods except me.

'You shall not make yourself a carved image or any likeness of anything in heaven or earth beneath or in the waters under the earth; you shall not bow down to them or serve them. For I, the Lord your God am a jealous God and I punish the father's fault in the sons, the grandsons, and the greatgrandsons of those who hate me; but I show kindness to thousands of those who love me and keep my commandments.

'You shall not utter the name of the Lord your God to misuse it, for the Lord will not leave unpunished the man who utters his name to misuse it.

'Remember the sabbath day and keep it holy. For six days you shall labour and do all your work, but the seventh day is a sabbath for the Lord your God. You shall do no work on that day, neither you nor your animals nor the stranger who lives with you. For in six days the Lord made the heavens and the earth and the sea and all that these hold, but on the seventh day he rested; that is why the Lord has blessed the sabbath day and made it sacred.

#### Gospel: John 2:13-25

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John

Just before the Jewish Passover Jesus went up to Jerusalem, and in the Temple he found people selling cattle and sheep and pigeons, and the money changers sitting at their counters there. Making a whip out of some cord, he drove them all out of the Temple, cattle and sheep as well, scattered the money changers' coins, knocked their tables over and said to the pigeon-sellers, 'Take all this out of here and stop turning my Father's house into a market.' Then his disciples remembered the words of scripture: Zeal for your house will devour me. The Jews intervened and said, 'What sign can you show us to justify what you have done?' Jesus answered, 'Destroy this sanctuary, and in three days I will raise it up.' The Jews replied, 'It has taken forty-six years to build this sanctuary: are you going to raise it up in three days?' But he was speaking of the sanctuary that was his body, and when Jesus rose from the dead, his disciples remembered that he had said this, and they believed the scripture and the words he had said.

**Cont...**During his stay in Jerusalem for the Passover many believed in his name when they saw the signs that he gave, but Jesus knew them all and did not trust himself to them; he never needed evidence about any man; he could tell what a man had in him.

#### THE PURPOSE OF ALMSGIVING

The case for an active, socially minded faith is very well rooted in the scriptures. For instance, we see in the twenty-fifth chapter of St Matthew's Gospel the well-known story of the separation of the sheep from the goats.

In this parable of the final judgment Our Lord does not discuss whether people prayed or fasted a lot but rather were they active in their generosity towards others:

> he will place the sheep at his right hand, but the goats at the left. 34 Then the King will say to those at his right hand, 'Come, O blessed of my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world; 35 for I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, 36 I was naked and you clothed me, I was sick and you visited me, I was in prison and you came to me.' 37 Then the righteous will answer him, 'Lord, when did we see thee hungry and feed thee, or thirsty and give thee drink? 38 And when did we see thee a stranger and welcome thee, or naked and clothe thee? 39 And when did we see thee sick or in prison and visit thee?' 40 And the King will answer them, 'Truly, I say to you, as you did it to one of the least of these my brethren, you did it to me.'

When we speak of charity we often mean doing good to others, a rather horizontal arrangement. Yet charity is first and foremost our relationship with God. I recently quoted in a homily this fine illustration of what I propose here from Pope Benedict XVI who wrote the following in his encyclical *Deus Caritas est* (God is Love):

Love of neighbour is thus shown to be possible in the way proclaimed by the Bible, by Jesus. It consists in the very fact that, in God and with God, I love even the person whom I do not like or even know. This can only take place on the basis of an intimate encounter with God, an encounter which has become a communion of will, even affecting my feelings. Then I learn to look on this other person not simply with my eyes and my feelings, but from the perspective of Jesus Christ. His friend is my friend. Going beyond exterior appearances, I perceive in others an interior desire for a sign of love, of concern. This I can offer them not only through the organizations intended for such purposes... [rather] Seeing with the eyes of Christ, I can give to others much more than their outward necessities; I can give them the look of love which they crave.

Our almsgiving is motivated and primarily urged on by our encounter with Christ. "Love of neighbor is shown to be possible in the way proclaimed by Jesus... It consists in the very fact that, in God and with God, I love even the person whom I do not like or even know. This can only take place on the basis of an intimate encounter with God...

#### THE PURPOSE OF PRAYER

Cont...Then I learn to look on this other person not simply with my eyes and my feelings, but from the perspective of Jesus Christ."

It is through an encounter with God in prayer that we can more readily and easily assist those in need. We should not, however, as Benedict teaches, rely solely on "the organisations intended for such purposes" but rather see with our own eyes the needs of the needy. Perhaps the needy aren't the people we think we're looking for, perhaps they're not the vagrant wandering around the local shopping centre, perhaps the needy is a parishioner, a neighbour, a relative? It is good to recall here the Corporal and Spiritual works of mercy too, these are the practical ways we can assist someone this Lent:

The Spiritual Works of Mercy are:

Instructing the ignorant ; Advising or counselling the doubtful; Admonishing the sinner; Consoling & comforting the sorrowful; Forgiving injuries; Bearing wrongs patiently; and Praying for the living and the dead.

Hence with these works of mercy it may be teaching in the School of Religion or helping in a parish organized programme like Alpha. It may be visiting a parishioner who's been recently bereaved or even praying for the deceased of the Parish and the forgotten souls in Purgatory, having a Mass offered for them too is a spiritual work of Mercy.

The corporal works of mercy are:

Feeding the hungry; Giving drink to the thirsty; Sheltering the homeless; Clothing the naked; Visiting the sick and imprisoned; Burying the dead; and Giving alms to the poor.

These works are fairly self-explanatory. However, they must always be motivated not out of sentiment or ticking boxes but out of a love of Christ who urges us to serve these the least of his brethren, and in doing so we are serving Him.

#### THE LIVING TEMPLE

The Gospel for today from St John is sometimes called 'The cleansing of the Temple'. It is not just about the upsetting of the traders in the Temple: the money changers and the sacrificial victim sellers. It bodes the destruction of the Temple. It bodes the renewed establishment of the Temple in the resurrected body of Jesus Christ, the new sanctuary. It is an event in Jesus' life leading into his future, but also pointing to the fulfilment of the past.

'The Temple was the sign of the presence of God in a special way. The presence of God was linked to the Covenant with God, the Commandments of God. This Covenant united a whole people in unity with the One True God. Their unity reflected His unity.

'St John in the Gospel sees the death of the Temple as foreshadowing the death of Jesus, but also the resurrected Jesus will be the New Temple of worship. For the Christian the resurrected Jesus is especially present in the Eucharist. This is a fulfilment of the Old Testament. Churches of a certain period and tradition would have the Ten Commandments printed on the walls of their churches. As we go towards Easter the catechumens' spiritual completion will be in receiving the Eucharist. The Old Testament elements are there in a new way.'
